Israeli forces kill two Palestinians

Israeli forces killed two Palestinians, including a fighter of the Islamist Hamas group, during a raid on a refugee camp in the occupied West Bank yesterday, emergency workers and Hamas said.

Israeli forces raided the Nur Shams camp near the city of Tulkarm in the early hours of yesterday morning, setting off an hours-long gun battle with Palestinian fighters, witnesses said.

The Israeli military said it conducted "counterterrorism activity" in the camp, dismantled an operational command centre, equipped with computers and surveillance cameras, and uncovered dozens of explosive devices and bomb-making components.

"During the activity, suspects opened fire and hurled explosive devices at the forces, who responded with live fire. Hits were identified," the military said in a statement, adding that an Israeli soldier was moderately wounded.

Hamas, which has been extending its reach away from its base in Gaza and into the West Bank, said one of the men, 21-year-old Osama Abu Ali, was a member of its armed wing.

The family of the other man, 32-year-old Abdel Rahman Abu Daghash, said he had stepped onto the terrace of his house to observe what was going on when he was killed by a sniper.

"He went up to the rooftop to film the ambulances. He barely had the chance to look and the sniper targeted him," said his brother Mo'men Abu Daghash. "He has nothing to do with it and he has kids and his wife is about to give birth."

There was no immediate comment from the Israeli military.

**Schoolgirl drowns in pond**

A fourth grader drowned in a pond at Gachbaria Nayapara in Chandanaish upazila of Chattogram yesterday afternoon.

Jannatul Tahseen, 10, daughter of Md Rubel of Gachbaria Talukderpara area, was a student of Gachbaria Model Govt Primary School.

Deceased's father said she went to visit a relative in the Gachbaria Nayapara area and drowned while taking a bath in the pond.

Later, locals rescued her and took her to Chandanaish Health Complex where doctors declared her dead.

white sugar was selling at Tk 135 to Tk 140 per kg and packaged sugar at Tk 140 per kg.

Let's have a look at the present status of CNG or petrol-run four stroke three-wheelers.

In 2015, the government fixed the rental rates for CNG-run four-stroke three-wheelers along with the daily deposits, the fare per kilometre, the fare per minute of breaks, and the mandatory minimum fare for passenger transport over any distance.

Since then, the CNG price has gone up by Tk 8 per cubic metre, but the government did not make the corresponding adjustment. So, nothing is working as per the government set rates.

It is very difficult to find a single CNG-run three-wheeler that is willing to go by the meter.

The Daily Star spoke with at least seven three-wheeler drivers about the issues to get a clear picture.

Anwar Hossain, a driver for 15 years, said he is paying the daily deposit as per the vehicle owner's demand and not at the government-fixed rate.

"So, it is not possible for me to follow the government's pricing. Besides, if we transport passengers at the fare fixed by the government, it won't be possible for me to survive in this city with my family."

Sometimes, the law enforcers impose fines for not carrying passengers at the government-fixed fare and for not having the meter but Anwar is willing to take that risk.

The government fixed the rates of non-judicial stamps, which are used to carry out any non-judicial commercial arrangements between parties like all kinds of property transfer agreements, leasing agreements and affidavits.

But none can buy stamps at that rate due to inadequate supply against the demand. Customers have to buy this stamp by paying Tk 20 to Tk 50 more than the fixed price.

Amid rising dengue cases, IV saline price is now between Tk 130 and Tk



at home and abroad. Be that as it may, I believe the European Union will nonetheless continue to support, in whatever way deemed expedient, our efforts in making the ensuing general parliamentary elections free, fair, participatory and credible," reads the letter.

Election Commissioner Brig Gen (retd) Ahsan Habib Khan said the letter was sent yesterday to EU Ambassador Charles Whiteley.

Talking to reporters at his office, Ahsan said, "We hope that the European Union will send observers, even if it's a small group. If more observers monitor the election, the polls will be more transparent."

What these events prove is that the law of demand and supply will find its way.

"Market works at its own pace -- it is driven by three things: supply, demand and expectation. So, the government cannot control the market if it wants," said Ahsan H Mansur, executive director of the Policy Research of Bangladesh.

A handful of companies account for the supply of oil, sugar and eggs in Bangladesh.

"Those have become natural monopolies."

The government should monitor these big business groups instead of keeping watch on the end sellers like the corner shops or the kitchen market vendors.

"But for the prices of everything else, leave it to the law of demand and supply," said Mansur, a former economist of the International Monetary Fund.

The government should look to break the market syndicate, which has consolidated over time due to weak monitoring, said Moinul Islam, a former professor at Chittagong University's economics department.

The current initiative of setting the prices of essentials by the government will not work, said AB Mirza Azizul Islam, a former finance adviser to a caretaker government.

To keep the prices under control, the supply of products in the market should be increased either through normal channels or alternative ways, he added.

The EU letter sent to the EC on September 20 said, "The High Representative's decision [not to send a fully fledged polls observation mission] reflects the fact that, at the present time, it is not sufficiently clear whether the necessary conditions will be met at the point in time when the elections take place."

The last time the EU sent an election observation mission to Bangladesh was in 2008. The mission had at least 150 observers.

The EU sent election observation missions to 15 countries, including Guatemala, Liberia, the Maldives, Nigeria, Paraguay, Sierra Leone and Zimbabwe, between 2021 and 2023, says the EU website.

"Within this time, a patient's blood pressure may drop, kidney may stop functioning ... Many of them require ICU support. As a result, many die on the way to the hospital or within some hours of admission. We don't get enough time to treat them."

The situation is similar at Shaheed Suhrawardy Medical College Hospital.

While around 248 people are currently being treated there, over 40 percent of them are from outside Dhaka.

Dr Khalilur Rahman, director of Suhrawardy hospital, said, "A majority of the patients from outside Dhaka are coming here with severe dengue shock syndrome and in need of ICU support. Many of them come without any referral after visiting various hospitals in their respective districts."

"Mainly critical patients with platelet deficiency, shock syndrome, and low blood pressure are still being referred here."


According to hospital officials, most of those from outside the capital are from Narayanganj, Munshiganj, Gazipur and Madaripur.

Prof Md Niyatuzzaman, director of the hospital, said, "The directive from the DGHS is that patients should not be referred to Dhaka under any circumstances. However, local hospitals are not following this directive. Moreover, many of the patients' families are bringing the patients without any referral."

He added that it takes around seven to eight hours for many of these patients to reach Dhaka and for those in critical condition, these hours are crucial.

**GANG RAPE IN FENI**

**Swechchhasebak League leader, aide land in jail**

A Feni court yesterday sent a local Swechchhasebak League leader and one of his associates to jail in a case filed over gangraping a teenage girl in the district's Sonagazi upazila.

Police said they detained the duo -- Imam Hossain, 45, general secretary of Chardarbeh union unit Swechchhasebak League, and his associate Md Riad, 28 -- for interrogation on Saturday after the 15-year-old victim filed a complaint with Sonagazi Police Station.

The teenager filed the complaint Saturday afternoon alleging that she was gangraped by the two on September 20.

Hasan Imam, officer-in-charge of the police station, said after a primary investigation, police found the allegation against them to be true.

Later, in the night, the victim's father filed a rape case against them, he said.

Today, the accused were produced before the court, which sent them to jail, added the OC.

**ACC ASI held for extortion in Ctg**

Police on Saturday arrested an assistant sub-inspector of the Anti-Corruption Commission for bribing a jeweler in Chattogram city's Panchlaish.

Arrestee ASI Kamrul Huda, from Cox's Bazar's Kutubdia upazila, was an official of the Cumilla ACC, police said.

Santosh Kumar Chakma, officer-in-charge of Panchlaish Police Station, said police detained him from a restaurant in the area around 10:30pm and showed him arrested in a case filed against him.

"A few days ago, ASI Kamrul Huda phoned Chattogram-based gold ornament trader Parimal Dhar, saying a complaint was filed against him and he could fix the matter if he paid Kamrul Tk 20 lakh."

Parimal agreed to meet Kamrul at a restaurant in the area.

**Mother attempts suicide after killing 3 children**

A woman tried to commit suicide over a family dispute yesterday after allegedly killing her three children with pesticide in Sunamganj's Jamalganj upazila.

According to police, Jamuna Begum (35) gave insecticide to her children -- Shakiba, 14, Tamzid, 13 and Shahed, 8 -- after an altercation with her husband on Saturday night over the family's financial issues.

Police have detained Jamuna's husband Jahangir Alam, 40, a fisherman in Shantipur village, said Abu Sayeed, additional superintendent (admin) of Sunamganj Police.

Yesterday morning, when Jahangir went out to catch fish, she gave insecticide to her children before taking it herself, he added.

The children died on the way to the Sunamganj Sadar Hospital. The mother has been admitted to Sylhet MAG Osmani Medical College Hospital.

A case will be filed against Jahangir for provoking suicide, said the additional SP.
