Top 5 tourist attractions in Mymensingh

From the Brahmaputra River and handcrafted Nakshikantha to the eponymous Maimansingha Gitika, Mymensingh has a rich history and magnificent heritage. In its more than two centuries of existence as a district, this area has been home to numerous historical figures. With its convenient rail and bus connections to Dhaka, Mymensingh has all the makings of a bustling tourism hub. So, here is a list of places you can visit in Mymensingh on your next trip.

Muktagacha Zamindar Bari

Found right in the middle of the town of Muktagacha, this is a great place to see a site frozen in time. Even though the majority of the buildings are in a deteriorating state, it covers a relatively large area. It is a widely held belief that the jamindar originally came from North Bengal.

From Mymensingh's town hall, you can take an auto-rickshaw or a local bus for Tk 30 and reach Muktagacha in 30 minutes.

Muktagacha monda sweet shop

The most incredible monda, a traditional dessert, can be found in Muktagacha. The original sweet was created by Ram Gopal Pal in 1824, who presented it to Jamindar

Surya Kanta. The current owner, a member of the local Pal family, is the fifth generation to work in the family business, so rest assured the quality of the monda will leave your tastebuds singing!

Ririshiri

The hills of Garo and Meghalaya surround Birishiri, and the Someshwari and Kangsho rivers flow through the area. In winter, Birishiri's white sands and shallow blue water provide a picturesque setting among the river's sandstone banks and verdant hills. Birishiri also has friendly Garo people and a rich cultural history.

If you can rent a car in Mymensingh, the drive to Birishiri will take around 2 hours, as you pass through endless greenery along the way.

Alexander Castle

Lohar Kuthi, established by Maharaja Surya Kanta Acharya Chowdhury, is the historical name for Alexander Castle since it was once primarily an iron structure. The whole castle is remarkably raised on a tall pedestal to protect it from the great Brahmaputra River, which flows nearby. Gardens surround the castle, which was formerly flanked by two shattered Greek sculptures. It is presently serving as the Teacher's College library, and eight rooms on the

With its beautiful scenery and the sounds of nature, Moyna Dip is bound to leave people captivated. Calmness encompasses the island as does the Brahmaputra River's crystal-clear waters. The surrounding lemon grove is also a visually and aromatically stunning addition to the landscape. It is said that an anti-British movement activist Moyna Mia formerly lived here and enjoyed spending time playing the flute in the shade of a tree. Riverside communities,

boat rides, and local fauna will provide a gorgeous backdrop to spend your time in this peaceful place.

How to get there...

Mymensingh is accessible in numerous ways. It has rail and transport links to Dhaka. Direct trains from Kamalapur

Railway Station can take 3-4 hours.
Additionally, trains to Jamalpur also travel through this area so you could take one of those as well. The trains include Jamuna, Brahmaputra, Teesta, and Agnibina Express. Buses go from the Mohakhali Station to Mymensingh; the road journey generally takes 4-5 hours, depending on the traffic.

You may take a day trip from Dhaka if you leave first thing in the morning and come back late at night. For those staying more than a day though, the city has plenty of accommodation options. Several well-known hotels in the area include the Hotel Silver Castle, Hotel Le Marian, Hotel Amir International, etc.

Exploring Bangladesh's rich history

Eliza Binte Elahi's extraordinary story

Eliza Binte Elahi is a woman with many monikers and identities. She is a travel vlogger with over 28,000 followers on Facebook. She is a travelogue writer who contributes to major news outlets in Bangladesh and has also published two books. She is also an educator working as an assistant professor at the University of South East Asia. But more than anything else, she is a traveller who loves to explore Bangladesh and indeed the world to uncover all of its history, indulge in different cultures, and learn about its heritage.

Since her early years, Eliza often found herself gravitating towards anything and everything related to heritage and history. However, this fascination started to slowly manifest itself into a full-blown passion while she was pursuing her degree in English literature.

"I was doing a course on Greek and Roman Literature. Being someone who was naturally drawn towards history, this course had a huge impact on me and I found myself wanting to explore the world and learn all about it. It also motivated me to learn more about the history of my own land," Eliza answered, when asked about what kickstarted her journey.

Travelling, however, is not as easy as it sounds and Eliza's quest saw her having to overcome an array of obstacles. "Obviously, being a woman, getting permission from family for travelling is never easy. Society does not encourage women to travel, and even if you overcome that, there can be housing trouble, transport trouble, and social stigma towards travel attire which do not exactly align with many societies, particularly in Bangladesh districts," she lamented.

These obstacles have not been able to stop Eliza though. She travelled across international borders for the first time in 1999, with Nepal being her first country and since then, she has accumulated 53 countries under her belt. However, the journey is far from over.

"I want to visit all the countries in the world. I love travelling and continue writing books, making travel documentaries, and creating digital content. I want to continue fuelling my love for it until the day I die," Elizbeth stated. When asked about her most favourite destinations so far, she mentioned the likes of Greece, Morocco, Egypt, Turkiye, Jordan, and Cambodia. She will be embarking on a new journey soon as she hopes to start travelling across Africa later this year.

As impressive as her international travel resume is, it is her adventures across Bangladesh and the change in the tourism landscape she

is trying to bring about that really makes Eliza an iconic figure.

Eliza has come a very long way but she regretfully conceded that there is a lot that she still needs to achieve before realising the vision she has for Bangladesh's tourism sector. She provided us with insight into the numerous gaps that exist in our infrastructure, which include information inadequacy, lack of guides or a central travel agency, communication issues to

name a few and the urgent need to mitigate these

However, with that being said, she also shared with us her desire to bring about necessary changes through her work and

"I want to use my platform to inspire and create young entrepreneurs who are invested in the tourism sector. I want to use my platform to empower more women through the tourism industry. Many countries use their tourism industry to bring economic prosperity and I want to help Bangladesh channel all of its untapped potential," she professed, when asked about her future plans.

With its rich history and culture, most places in Bangladesh offer something of interest. Not only is there plenty to see, but also there's plenty to taste. Here is a short list (and in no way comprehensive) of places you can travel while treating your palate.







TASTE THE BEST OF BANGLADESH Must-try dishes and destinations

RAISHAH

There are a number of tourist spots in Rajshahi like Choto Sona Masjid, Darasbari Masjid, Bagha Masjid, and Varendra Research Museum. Some are located in the centre while others are scattered around the city or its outskirts. Rajshahi is historically rich and local cuisine is not far behind either.

The best time to visit Rajshahi is in the summer when the mangoes are ready to harvest. Do you want Himsagar? Of the fabled Langra? How about Fazlee? Ask and you shall receive.

Another delicacy of Rajshahi is the kalai ruti, which is found in Chapainawabganj. Kalai ruti with beef is quite the dish but if you try it with smashed aubergine, you will remember it for the rest of your life. There are also mango pickles, bot parota, and one may

try kachagolla from Natore which is not far from the city.

KHULNA

The Sixty Dome Mosque at Bagerhat can be quite the spectacle. If you prefer natural beauty, Padmabeel of Bhutia, Hiran Point, and Putney Island are waiting for you. One may go to Khulna by train, which itself can be a fun experience with the clickety-clack and the constant swaying.


All these jaunts are bound to make you hungry, and Khulna will not disappoint. The signature dish of this region is chuijhal gost. Chuijhal is a spice that comes from a vine-like plant and parts of the stem, roots, and even the skin may be used for cooking. It adds a noticeable boost to the dish, one that you will certainly remember.

Chuknagar's Abbas Hotel is well known for their chuiJhal mutton. Kamrul Hotel at Zero Point is another chuijhal destination for the travellers. Apart from chuijhal dishes, there are a number of other options that are memorable. For example, chingri bhorta or mashed shrimp, malaikari, and hilsa head with mung beans can be a treat for those who prefer savoury dishes. And the locally produced date molasses will appease the sweet tooth for sure.

CHATTOGRAM

Travelling to Chattogram can be tricky to plan because there are so many great places to visit. Just gazing at the sea while sitting on the beach could be the highlight of your travel if you want it to be. From Patenga Beach to Khoiyachora Waterfall or Chandranath Temple, it's a place that takes your breath away.





However, travellers may try 'Mezzan Haile Aiyun,' a restaurant where this traditional dish is available. There's also kala bhuna which has become quite popular all over the country lately. The combination of kala bhuna with khichuri is something to look forward to, especially if it's a rainy day. There's also akhni, an iteration of tehari that is popular in this region. And of course, shutki or dried fish.

SYLHET

There are multiple waterfalls and vegetation you can visit. Ratargul Swamp Forest is a freshwater swamp forest and can be one of your destinations. Jaflong, Bisanakandi, Sadapathor and Shapla Bill will appease your eyes. There are also numerous tea gardens, lakes, and the city itself; all of them can be your stoppage.

Now off to the question of cuisine. Beef satkora is arguably the most popular dish in this region. Satkora is a citrus fruit that is used in the curry. Mutton can be cooked with satkora as well. The flavour of it really makes sure that you know the difference between the regular curry and this particular dish. One should also try 'duck with bamboo shoots', which is a mildly spicy curry with a refreshing taste on the tongue. And of course, if you are in Sylhet, do not forget tea. If nothing else, at least keep the seven-layer tea on your list.

BARISHAL

Barishal can be a busy tour. There's Kuakata sea beach where you can just idly sit by watching the tides. Or take a walk through the Jhau forest. For historical interest, one may visit any of the numerous Zamindar baris. The floating guava market on Kirtipasha Canal is a spectacle.

The place is bustling and offers a lasting experience.

Nothing here is as famous as the Hilsa fish. We Bengalis sure love our share of the delectable fish and Barishal is the place to

to treat your tastebuds. The colours alone are vibrant with the mustard paste adding characters to it. One can only imagine the soothing caress of the tastebuds at the bite of 'shorshe ilish.'

Coconut shrimp is another dish of Barishal that is quite appealing. There's also a pitha you may try called Shirgoja. It is fried and sweet to taste. The cake is quite common in the greater Barishal region.

HONOURABLE MENTIONS

Mymensingh comes to mind because there are tourist spots like Shoshi Lodge, a number of Zamindar baris, Botanical Garden, and Moyna Island. Mymensingh is famous for Muktagachar monda, a traditional sweet that is not perhaps much to look at but it sure makes up for it with its originality and taste.

Old Dhaka should always make any list that speaks about food. Old Dhaka itself is a place to be roamed. It's not only historical, it also offers you an experience that only old Dhaka can offer. As for food, bakharkhani and kachchi biriyani are two of the most famous items in the country. There are also different kinds of kebabs and iconic beverages like Beauty Lassi.

Old Dhaka's restaurants are quite busy at midnight, as is Mawa Ghat, which can be another destination to try out shrimp, freshly fried hilsa, and fried aubergine; all of which taste great with warm rice.

As mentioned at the beginning, this list is not comprehensive because Bangladesh is culturally rich. Of course, there are many other places you can visit in the country and a hundred other dishes you can try, but taste is subjective and may change from person to person. What are your picks for memorable dishes in Bangladesh?

#INTERNATIONAL TRAVEL VLOGGERS

Several foreign travel vloggers have visited our country, entertaining Bangladeshis and the rest of the world with their videos on our food, culture, sights and sounds, and people. Their vlogs never fail to create a buzz on YouTube and social media. In the spirit of World Tourism Day tomorrow, we decided to speak to three such vloggers — Mark Wiens, Doug Barnard, and Brent Timm — to find out their experiences and thoughts on tourism in Bangladesh.





THE BANGLADESH EXPERIENCE

3 global travel vloggers reveal their stories

They have bragworthy numbers of subscribers and followers; they have those staggering numbers of likes and views — now, for their insights...

TRAVELLING THROUGH BANGLADESH: MEMORIES AND HIGHLIGHTS

First of all, if you watch their videos, you would become pleasantly surprised by the extent of their journeys. From rural escapades to bustling areas, our three vloggers covered quite a lot of Bangladesh.

To illustrate, when Doug Barnard came to our country, he attended two weddings, took the steamer to Barishal, and celebrated Valentine's Day and the spring festival at Dhaka University, among other things.

One of his favourites was a trip to Bandarban. "When people think of Bangladesh, they picture crowds and a very busy and hectic place. Many foreigners don't know about the serenity that exists here," he expressed.

Meanwhile, Brent Timm went to a premiere of Barbie, visited a garment factory, haggled in local markets, hiked through Lawachara National Park, and much more.

He also spent an Eid in our country, which is a memory he cherishes. Another is watching a cricket match in Sylhet. "I had never seen a cricket match live before. The excitement was just insane. It was crazy — the experience, the energy!" he exclaimed.

On the other hand, Mark Wiens is a food vlogger travelling around the world. In Bangladesh, his taste buds were surely hard at work — with street food, the bhortas, kachchi biriyani, mezbani beef, and so on.

If he had to pick just one as his favourite, he informed that it would be hilsa curry with mustard oil (perhaps referring to shorshe ilish).

THE BUMPS ALONG THE WAY: ANY CHALLENGES OR FEEDBACK?

"You could always say the traffic!" Mark laughed out loud.

An eerily similar answer came from Brent; it was even that same laughter!

Also, stating that change and progress take time, he shared, "I really wanted to go to the Sundarbans and Sajek. It seemed very difficult to get information to go to those places and to find easy transportation."

He admitted that even as a seasoned

traveller, he had to struggle.

Doug too pointed out about the lack of tourism infrastructure.

PUTTING BANGLADESH ON THE TOURISM MAP

"I think Bangladesh has a big tourism potential," Doug continued. "For now, it may mostly appeal to those who want real, authentic, unfiltered, travel experience; which, in my experience, is the best kind of travel.

"There's a ton of potential to promote ecotourism. Before I went there, I really didn't know much about Bandarban and Sundarban and all these places. If you look at Bangladesh on a map, it's a fairly small country. I was amazed by the diversity of the different areas."

Meanwhile, Mark, the gastronomic

Bangladeshi food is not as well-represented as some other cuisines. So it's harder to learn about Bangladeshi cuisine when you're not in Bangladesh

globetrotter (who lives in Thailand) had tried out a couple of Bangladeshi restaurants in Bangkok. He loved the food there, but visiting our country elevated the whole impression.

"The food was spectacular," he opined. "But, I think still in comparison to some other cuisines, Bangladeshi food is not as well-represented as some other cuisines. So it's harder to learn about Bangladeshi cuisine when you're not in Bangladesh."

Putting our food "very high" on the culinary map, he elaborated, "It should be one of the world's great cuisines. It is very unique: the use of mustard oil in many dishes is so evident, and also, the bhortas are amazing."

And as for Brent, he said that the "real Bangladesh" lies in the tea gardens, paddy fields, and all the beautiful places and people. For him, it is not just about Dhaka, the traffic and the like, which, many might get the impression if they

did a quick image search on the internet, based off some of the first few results.

FOREIGN VLOGGERS AND THE LOCALS

The final point, which would be grossly unfair to miss out, is the experience of these vloggers with the people.

You must have seen at least one or two of these travel videos. An underlying theme is that the vlogger simply walks down the road, gets greeted by countless people, sometimes asking for selfies or to have a quick chat.

Seeing these videos, one may claim that, generally speaking, Bangladeshi locals are excited and indeed really curious around foreigners, that also with a camera.

All the three vloggers we spoke to were very passionate and positive about it.

"I was very surprised by the kindness of the local people. I was greeted with a tremendous amount of love and compassion. So many people would offer to help me," Brent reflected.

But wasn't it overwhelming at some point? Well, possibly; but the vloggers seem to take it in good spirit.

"I like travelling to places that are more interactive," Doug answered. "For me, travelling is not just about sightseeing: I travel to meet people. I really try to dive deep into culture, and Bangladesh is perfect for that."

And hence, with great food, great people, and diversity of places, Bangladesh had been an amazing experience for them all.

The concluding remark of Mark Wiens — when asked about his favourite memory from our country — would summarise the people experience and to a great extent the Bangladesh experience at large.

Guided by a local friend, when he went to a home at a village, he was astonished to see the huge number of delicacies served: "Yes, I was there to film. But even if we didn't have the cameras, they would have treated us the same way. It wasn't a show for the cameras. It was the gracious hospitality that made them do this."

Young children are innately curious; my daughter grew up so much, so fast on that trip. From a demure 9-year-old, she transformed into this confident, uninhibited girl.
