



KHALEDA'S TREATMENT Legal issues being used as pretext

Says BNP about govt decision not to allow her to go abroad

The BNP yesterday alleged that the government is depriving party Chairperson Khaleda Zia of treatment and pushing her towards death on the pretext of legal complications.

Speaking at a press conference, BNP Secretary General Mirza Fakhrul Islam Alamgir said denying treatment to a former prime minister, who is a seriously ill senior citizen, is not only inhuman but also a violation of the constitution.

"The consequences of pushing a political opponent towards death will never be good," he said at the party chairperson's Gulshan office.

Fakhrul urged the government to allow Khaleda to go abroad for treatment as having treatment is a citizen's fundamental right.

Tigers land in Dharamshala

After completing their warm-up phase in Guwahati with a 50 percent success rate, the Bangladesh team reached Dharamshala yesterday for their first two matches in the ICC ODi World Cup.

The Tigers will begin their World Cup

campaign against Afghanistan October 7. Shakib Al Hasan and his troops will then take on defending champions England in their second fixture on October 10.



In their two warm-up matches, Bangladesh defeated Sri Lanka by seven wickets on September 29 but lost their second practice match against England by four wickets in Duckworth-Lewis method (DLS).

This is the second time the Tigers have been to Dharamshala to play at the picturesque Himachal Pradesh Cricket Stadium. They had previously played three first round matches of the ICC Twenty20 World Cup 2016 at the venue, where they won against the Netherlands and Oman while the match against Ireland got washed out.

Listed criminal 'took part' in police raid

Pictures of the incident go viral; Natore SP says probe body to be formed soon

A listed criminal had recently accompanied two police officers arresting a suspect in Natore.

In photos and a video footage that went viral on social media, Golam Kibria Selim, who is accused in at least six cases of battery and named in a police list of local criminals, is seen with Sub-inspector

In the photos, Selim is seen standing next to the arrested suspect who is in handcuffs. Selim is grabbing one arm of the arrestee while SI Mintu is grabbing the other. The other officer who participated in the operation is Sub-inspector Ariful



Both officers were transferred from the police station on September 29, amid criticisms over their conduct.

Several other men known as Selim's associates were also seen in the photos taken during the incident that, according to locals, took place on September 28. Awami League leaders and activists in the district also

expressed outrage over the matter. Contacted, Tariqul Islam, superintendent of police in

the district, said police sometimes take help from locals to catch suspects, but it is unexpected for a policeman to take help from a listed criminal.

He added that a committee will be formed to investigate the matter. If the officers are found guilty, they will face departmental action.

Singapore said it was expecting more arrests and seizures as the Asian financial hub investigates one of its biggest cases of money laundering, in which the value of assets seized now stands at S\$2.8 billion (\$2 billion).

Simultaneous raids in mid-August

authorities of the city state known for its low crime rate led to the arrest of 10 foreigners and the seizure of luxury properties, cars, gold bars, designer handbags jewellery worth S\$1 billion.

"This case is a reminder that even the most

stringent preventive measures can be circumvented by determined criminals," Josephine Teo, the second minister for home affairs, told parliament yesterday.

The government would set up an inter-ministerial panel to review the anti-money laundering regime, reflecting learning points drawn from the case, she added.

But Singapore's arrests and

investigations showed its system was able to detect suspicious individuals and activities, Teo said.

Trio win Nobel in physics for work ón electrons

Scientists Pierre Agostini, Ferenc Krausz and Anne L'Huillier won the 2023 Nobel Prize in Physics for creating ultra-short pulses of light that can give a snapshot of changes within atoms, potentially leading to better detection of disease.

The prize-awarding academy said their studies had given humanity new tools for exploring the movement of electrons inside atoms and molecules, a phenomenon that was long thought impossible to trace.

Changes in electrons occur in a few tenths of an attosecond - a unit so short that there are as many attoseconds in one second as there have been seconds since the birth of the universe.

"The ability to generate attosecond pulses of light has opened the door on a tiny, extremely tiny, time scale and it's also opened the door to the world of electrons," said Eva Olsson, member of the Nobel Prize in Physics Selection Committee, yesterday.

There are potential applications of the findings in many different areas. In electronics, it is important to understand and control how electrons behave in a

The field also holds promise in areas such as a new in-vitro diagnostic technique to detect characteristic

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Solar airship targets nonstop flight

A French company is aiming to complete a nonstop circumnavigation of the Earth using a solarpowered airship in a bid to test a new form of zeroemission travel.

France-based Airship is building the Solar Airship One with the aim of completing the round-theworld journey without fossil fuels in less than a month.

Flying at an altitude of around 20,000 feet (6,000 metres), the futuristic craft uses a casing of solar panels, batteries, and hydrogen fuel cells to deliver power day and night, making it theoretically possible to fly forever.

The good thing is that we're not doing this world tour flight just for an exhibition or for an adventure... There is an additional process after that for our technology," French aerobatic pilot Dorine Bourneton, one of the pilots of the airship, told Flying magazine.

Lawyer's aide dies in DB custody Family alleges he was tortured to death

A lawyers' assistant died in police custody in Bogura last night.

A team of the Detective Branch of police picked up Habibur Rahman, 42, and took him to the DB office. They later admitted him to Bogura Mohammad Ali Hospital around 7:00pm. He died around two hours later.

Habibur, a resident of Chakjora village in Bogura's Shahjahanpur upazila, was the joint secretary of the Bogura Advocates' Assistant Association.

His family members alleged that detectives picked up Habibur from the Bogura court premises without any arrest warrant and tortured him to death at the DB office. Snigdha Aktar, additional superintendent of

police (administration and finance), said Habibur was picked up as he was a murder suspect. As he fell sick, police admitted him to the

hospital where he died, the official added. Atiqur Rahman, medical officer at the Bogura

Mohammad Ali Hospital, told reporters that Habibur was unconscious when police took him to the hospital at 6:55pm.

"Police told us that he was suffering from chest pain. We gave him basic treatment. He passed away around 8.45pm," he added.
