AL plans big social media campaign

The ruling Awami League is set to launch a social media campaign portraying Sheikh Hasina as the only leader who as a prime minister can tackle the challenges the country may face going forward.

The sponsored campaign will fully roll out on social media from November and continue at least until the upcoming national election in January next year.

The ruling party aims to reach about 2.20 crore active Facebook users, and the top leaders believe that they are prepared for the task, AL insiders say.

AL's research wing Centre for Research and Information (CRI) has trained nearly 8,000 people -- mainly Chhatra League and Jubo League members -- on planning and producing social media campaigns.

The activists are already campaigning on the

Besides this, the AL will hold concerts featuring popular singers and rock bands in the districts to gain the attention of young people. Video contents will be screened on giant screens and flyers will be distributed

among the audience members, AL sources said.

On social media, users will see content created specifically for the residents of their neighbourhoods. The text and visuals will highlight development and other changes in their areas, AL insiders say.

The CRI in May and June conducted a survey in 61 districts and found that people were mainly frustrated with the government because of unemployment and runaway prices of essentials.

However, the study found a major portion of the people having faith in Sheikh Hasina's leadership, according to insiders with knowledge of the matter.

Besides, people believe the government has been successful in Covid vaccine rollout, mega development projects, reaching electricity to rural areas, and constructing paved roads.

In light of the findings, the social media campaign will portray Hasina as "the best crisis manager" and the best leader to solve the problems people currently face or may face in the future.

The content will raise the question as to who would lead the country if the BNP comes to power. The BNP-Jamaat's "misrule" will be juxtaposed with the "development milestones reached" in the last 15 years with the AL in office.

Subsidies for the agriculture sector under the AL government will be shown alongside old newspaper reports on "farmers getting shot for demanding fertiliser"

Window for Gazans to flee closes

Netanyahu visits border as Israel readies troops for ground invasion defying ceasefire calls

Israel pummelled northern Gaza with fresh air strikes yesterday, one week on from the deadliest attack in its history, as a window for Gazans to flee closed before an expected ground offensive against Hamas militants.

On Friday, the Israeli military gave 24 hours to residents of north Gaza to flee to the south near Egypt's border.

AFP reporters near the southern Israeli city of Sderot saw troops fire at the densely populated enclave, sending huge plumes of black smoke into the sky.

meanwhile visited troops on the border frontline, raising expectations of an imminent invasion.

"Are you ready for what is coming? More is coming," he is heard telling several soldiers on a video released by his office.

The US government also advised its citizens in Gaza to move south toward the Rafah border crossing with Egypt. There has been no let-up in

Israel's response to the Islamist fighters' dawn raid, which saw them break through the heavily fortified border and gun down, stab and burn to death more than 1,300 people.

On the Gazan side, health officials said more than 2,200 people, including 724 children, had been killed. As on the Israeli side, most of them were civilians.

Meanwhile, clashes in the occupied West Bank have killed 53 Palestinians in the past week.



India continue WC dominance over Pakistan

Skipper Rohit Sharma's 86 and an inspired bowling display helped India hammer Pakistan by seven wickets in their high-profile World Cup clash at the 132,000-capacity Ahmedabad stadium on Saturday.

India bowled out Pakistan for 191 after their rivals collapsed from 155-2.

They overhauled the total with 117 balls to spare to extend their unbeaten against their streak neighbours to eight in the 50-over showpiece

tournament. Rohit stood out in his 63-ball knock laced with six fours and six sixes to keep India, who began the event as favourites to win the title, unbeaten in their three matches in this



edition. Pakistan now have two wins and one defeat in the

10-nation tournament. "It felt good," said man of the match, Indian fast bowler Jasprit Bumrah who had figures of 2-19 off nine overs.

Rohit hit the ball to all parts of the ground with his delightful flicks and pulls to entertain an almost all-Indian crowd at the world's biggest cricket stadium after Pakistanis were effectively banned from attending. India lost Shubman Gill and Virat Kohli -- both for 16
