"At least 12 to 15 people are getting killed every day... We have to ensure road safety and to do so we all have to follow traffic laws," said BRTA Chairman Nur Mohammad Mazumder.

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
The comments came If we want to enforce during a press briefing at the BRTA headquarters, ahead of National Road Safety Day.

Mazumder said evervbody transport owners, workers and road users -- have to be aware and follow traffic rules, otherwise it would not be possible to ensure road

"If we want to enforce traffic rules strictly, only in Dhaka city, it will require 100 magistrates. But we only have five to six magistrates... so. ensuring road safety is not possible unless we can create a

social movement," he said. Besides, mobile courts are taking action against fitness

The BRTA chairman also said they have chalked out a series of programmes -- including rallies, processions and campaigns -- to create awareness.

# Tk 536cr climate fund stuck in bank

JS body expresses concern to environment ministry

A parliamentary body yesterday expressed deep concern over the stuck Bangladesh Climate Change Trust Fund, which was deposited with the then Farmers Bank, now known as Padma Bank Limited.

The parliamentary standing committee on Environment, Forest and Climate Change Ministry asked the officials concerned to take necessary measures to recover Tk 536 crore, which was kept in the bank as FDR.

Awami League MP and chief of the parliamentary watchdog Saber Hossain Chowdhury presided over the meeting held at the Jatiya Sangsad Bhaban.

The Bangladesh Climate Change Trust was due to receive Tk 536 crore in 2016, along with the accumulated interest, but received iust Tk 74 crore after around seven years, said sources.

The trust, which operates under

the environment ministry, made was given eight more years by the the fixed deposit in 2015 for one vear, so the money was due in 2016, said the trust's officials.

Including the nine percent

investment will get even longer as Farmers Bank, now Padma Bank,

Ministry of Environment to pay back the money.

After the meeting, Saber Hossain told The Daily Star that the bank had made a fresh commitment to pay the money back but couldn't keep their commitment.

During a special investigation in 2015, Bangladesh Bank found significant violations of banking rules by Farmers Bank management in loan disbursement. Following that, people rushed to withdraw their deposits, crippling the bank's ability to conduct its operations.

As per the Climate Change Trust Act-2010, the trust can deposit 34 percent of its funds in various banks to earn interest so that it can fund projects aimed at creating resilience against climate change impacts.

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### 'Govt trying to stage farcical polls' Says Left Democratic Alliance

The Left Democratic Alliance yesterday said the incumbent government is trying to stage a drama of farcical elections but they would resist it.

Leaders of the alliance also said the Election Commission led by CEC Kazi Habibul Awal is not neutral and will not be able to conduct the 12th parliamentary elections in a free and fair manner.

LDA organised a programme to besiege the EC in the capital's Agargaon yesterday, demanding the establishment of a polls-time caretaker government and the resignation of the EC.

The activists of the left-leaning parties gathered in front of IDB Bhaban from 11:00am and held a rally there. After completing the rally, the alliance faced police blockade when they marched towards the EC Office in Agargaon around 12:15pm.

"If the government tries to hold another farcical election like the 2014 and 2018 polls, we will resist the election schedule and wage stern movement against it," said Ikbal Kabir Jahid, coordinator of the alliance.

"The election will not be free and fair with an election commission that is obedient to the government," said Bazlur Rashid Firoj, general secretary of Socialist Party of Bangladesh.

Ruhin Hossain Prince, general secretary, Communist Party of Bangladesh, asked the government to resign, dissolve the parliament, and sit for a dialogue.

## Eye test for drivers shows grim picture

### 243 out of 446 have vision problems

At least 76 percent of 446 drivers, who recently went for eye tests over three days, were found to have various eye problems, raising serous question about road safety.

Out of 446 drivers, 243 were found to have vision problems, while 96 had other eye-related issues.

Bangladesh Road Transport Authority, in association with several other organisations, carried out the tests earlier this month, in preparation for the upcoming National Road Safety Day on October 22.

Besides, 393 drivers went through other tests, where 381 were found to have problems such as high blood

pressure and blood sugar.

BRTA Chairman Nur Mohammad Mazumder revealed the information at a press conference at BRTA's headquarters held in the capital's Banani yesterday. Road Transport and Highways Division Secretary ABM

Amin Ullah Nuri inaugurated the campaign on October 11 at BRTA training centre in Nikunja. On that day, 289 drivers underwent eyesight tests, where 164 were found to have vision problems, while 67

suffered from other issues. On October 12, 112 drivers were tested at BRTA's Diabari circle office, where 48 were found to have vision problems,

while 22 had other issues. Eyes of 45 drivers were tested at Sayedabad Bus Terminal on October 14, where 31 were found having vision problems and seven others had other issues.

Asked about the tests, BRTA chairman said if these problems were found during the field test of drivers, they would not have been given driving licences. Besides, they are also planning to launch lab test for the drivers before issuing driving licences, he said.
