ISRAEL-HAMAS WAR World's biggest book fair hit by tensions

The world's biggest book fair in Frankfurt lamented a "disaster" yesterday after publishing groups from several Muslim countries predominantly withdrew in protest at organisers' support

Organisations that pulled out -- including from the UAE, Indonesia, Malaysia, Egypt were also angered at a decision to postpone an award ceremony for Palestinian author Adania Shibli following the outbreak of the Israel-Hamas war.

Asked about the withdrawals, fair director Juergen Boos said "That's a complete disaster for us, for myself. I want people to be here, to have a (frank) discourse, to have discussions even if it might be controversial."

Indonesian Publishers Association said organisers' decision to "take sides and give Israel a platform" has undermined the ideals of dialogue and efforts to build mutual understanding.

DEATH OF JOURNO Reuters demands 'swift' Israeli probe

Reuters has called on Israel to conduct a quick and comprehensive investigation into cross-border fire that killed one of its journalists and wounded other reporters in Lebanon last week.

Video journalist Issam Abdallah died and six other journalists were injured in firing in southern Lebanon on Friday. The journalists believe they were hit by fire coming from the Israeli side of the border.

"I am reiterating my call to the Israeli authorities, who have said they are investigating, to conduct a swift, thorough and transparent probe into what happened," Reuters Editor-in-Chief Alessandra Galloni said in a video posted on X yesterday.

'Gaza food situation getting worse by minute'

Four or five days of stock left in shops, says WFP

The UN's World Food Programme said the food situation in the besieged and blockaded Gaza Strip was worsening, with only four or five days of stocks left in

WFP said stocks were getting low in warehouses inside the Palestinian enclave, but at the shop level, the situation was even more acute.

"The situation in Gaza is getting worse by the minute: the humanitarian situation but also of course the food security situation," WFP's Middle East spokeswoman Abeer Etefa, told reporters unavailability of fuel.

"The current stocks of essential food commodities are sufficient for only two weeks -- and that's at the wholesalers' level," she said, with the warehouses located in Gaza City in the north of the territory and shops having difficulties replenishing supplies.

'Inside the shops, the stocks are getting close to less than a few days, maybe four or five days of food stocks left."

Etefa said that out of five flour mills in the Gaza Strip, only one was operating due to security concerns and the

Only five bakeries out of 23 in Gaza contracted by WFP were still in operation, she added. "Our food supplies within Gaza are running really short," said Etefa.

Aid agencies have been flying supplies into El Arish airport in Egypt -- around 20 kilometres away from the Rafah border crossing and the only one into the Gaza Strip not controlled by Israel.

So far Egypt has kept the crossing closed to aid going in or foreign nationals trying to flee, as Israel has repeatedly struck the Palestinian side of the crossing.

SAME-SEX MARRIAGE India's top court refuses legalisation

India's top court refused yesterday to legalise same-sex marriages but said the country had a duty to acknowledge LGBTQ relationships and to protect them from discrimination. "It lies within the domain of parliament and state legislatures to determine the law on marriage," Supreme Court Chief Justice D Y Chandrachud said during his verdict. The court's ruling held that the fundamental right to marriage for same-sex couples was not guaranteed by India's constitution under existing law. It did grant marriage rights to couples where one or both members were transgender, provided one participant in the union identified as a man and the other as a woman. Chandrachud added that India still had a duty to acknowledge same-sex relationships and protect those in them from discrimination. "Our ability to feel love and affection for one another makes us feel human," he said from the bench. "This court has recognised that equality demands that queer unions and queer persons are not discriminated against." The court's ruling directed the government to form a committee that would determine the scope of rights for same-sex couples in the future, without compelling government recognition. Its verdict was greeted with sadness and disappointment by a crowd outside the court.

Iran bans teaching kids foreign languages

Iran has banned the teaching of all foreign languages, including English and Arabic, in kindergartens and primary schools, with immediate effect, state media reported yesterday. "The teaching of foreign languages is prohibited in kindergartens, nursery schools and primary schools, because at this age, the Iranian identity of the child is being formed," said Massoud Tehrani-Fariad, an education ministry official, according to IRNA news agency. "The ban on the teaching of foreign languages does not only concern English, but also other languages, including Arabic," underlined Tehrani-Farjad. Persian, the only official language in Iran, is strongly influenced by Arabic but also borrows from French and English.
