Richard Roundtree, action hero of 'Shaft', is no more




Richard Roundtree, a pioneering African American actor renowned for his portrayal of the detective John Shaft in the 1970s *Shaft* movie franchise, passed away at the age of 81 on Tuesday.

Roundtree succumbed to pancreatic cancer at his residence in Los Angeles, confirmed his manager, Patrick McMinn.

Richard, also known for his significant role in addressing issues of racial relations in the United States, made notable appearances in the groundbreaking ABC television series *Roots* in 1977, which is centered on slavery. He took on significant roles in other prominent projects of that era, such as portraying the motorcycle daredevil Miles in the 1974 film *Earthquake*.

Arab-Israeli actress Maisa arrested over pro-Palestine social media post



During the crackdown on Gaza supporters, Israeli police arrested Arab-Israeli actress Maisa Abdel Hadi. Her recent social media post 'provoked' local officials to call it an 'incitement to terrorism.'

The actress allegedly posted a picture of a bulldozer breaching the fence between the Gaza Strip and Israel during the October 7 Israeli attack. Israeli military has been regularly bombarding Gaza since then.

Maisa Abdel Hadi lives in Nazareth, a city in northern Israel. According to authorities, she was arrested on Monday and is to be held in detention until Thursday. She is one of the Arab Israelis detained for posting pro-Palestine posts on social media.

Khmelnytskyi nuclear power plant. As a result of the explosion, windows in administrative and laboratory buildings have been damaged," the Energy Ministry said on the Telegram messaging app.

Power lines were also damaged, it added, with more than 1,800 consumers in the towns of Netishyn and Slavuta facing power cuts. Netishyn is about 5 km from the Khmelnytskyi nuclear power plant; Slavuta is about 20 km away.

It was unclear exactly how close the damage was to the nuclear plant.

In Slavuta, 20 buildings were damaged by falling debris. A building used by a fire and rescue unit and another by a police department were

hit by the blast wave, Interior Minister Ihor Klymenko said on Telegram.

The town's mayor, Vasiliy Sydor, said 20 people were hurt.

The Khmelnytskyi region has regularly been a target of attacks by Russian drones and missiles, which analysts link to a military airfield in the region.

Meanwhile, Russia's parliament yesterday completed the passage of a law withdrawing ratification of the global treaty banning nuclear weapons tests, evidence of the deep chill in relations with the United States as Moscow pursues its war in Ukraine.

Deputy Foreign Minister Sergei Ryabkov said Russia was not prepared to resume discussing nuclear issues

with the US unless Washington dropped its "hostile" policy.

The bill to deratify the Comprehensive Nuclear Test Ban Treaty (CTBT) was approved by 156 votes to zero in the upper house after the lower house also passed it unanimously. It now goes to President Vladimir Putin for signing.

Putin had requested the change to "mirror" the position of the United States, which signed the CTBT in 1996 but never ratified it.

Though it has never formally come into force, the CTBT has made nuclear testing a taboo - no country except North Korea has conducted a test involving a nuclear explosion this century.

Hasina said Bangladesh hopes to see the forum as a great platform for lasting peace and sustainable development.

Over 40 high-level government representatives from EU and partner countries, as well as representatives from financial institutions, the private sector, civil society, and international organisations are attending the October 25-26 conference.

They will discuss and share experiences on issues relating to global investment in infrastructure.

In her speech, the PM asked the EU investors to explore facilities in Bangladesh economic zones and hi-tech parks.

Hasina said Bangladesh offers one of the most attractive investment environments in South Asia.

She said the road, rail, and port infrastructure is being built in Bangladesh as part of regional economic corridors. The country has also offered access to the Bay of Bengal to land-locked countries and territories like Nepal, Bhutan, and Northeast India.

The airports of Bangladesh can serve as gateways between the East and the West, she added.

The PM said Bangladesh is now the world's 35th largest economy and its 70-billion-dollar economy has grown to \$465 billion in less than 15 years.

On the 50th anniversary of Bangladesh-EU relations, she reaffirmed Bangladesh's commitment to further strengthen its strategic engagements with the bloc.

"We have fruitful cooperation in security, climate change, and human mobility. Our shared values and commitments remain at the heart of our engagements with the EU," she added.

Bangladesh is willing to join the EU's efforts in promoting green hydrogen, the PM said.

"We can benefit from the EU's expertise in the sustainable use of marine resources. We need investment in cold chain networks to preserve our agricultural outputs," she continued.

She said her government appreciates the Global Gateway's focus on transport networks, health security, green energy, digital transformation, research, and innovation.

"Our dynamic young population is ready to join the EU's skills and talent partnership programmes. We trust that the Global Gateway will help realise our vision for a 'Smart Bangladesh' by 2041," said the PM.

Meanwhile, EU Commission President Leyen said Bangladesh and the EU have been "reliable and trusted" partners for 50 years.

"Now, we are taking this partnership even further to reap the opportunities of the green transition under Global Gateway. Dear Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina, the 50th anniversary of EU-Bangladesh relations is the occasion to take our partnership to the next level."

Ansars won't get powers

About the "Ansar Battalion Bill-2023", which was placed in parliament on Monday, Asaduzzaman said it is currently under analysis and review.

The standing committee members will thoroughly examine the proposals, and if there is any such thing it will be addressed, he said.

The section 8 of the bill stipulates that an Ansar battalion member shall, if an offence is committed in front of him, with the approval of the superior officer concerned, arrest the offender and immediately hand him over to the police and, as the case may be, as per the directives of the judicial magistrate or the executive magistrate or the official concerned, will frisk the detainee, and enter any place, conduct a search and seize goods.

The minister added that

"misinformation" was being spread by various media outlets and the notion that Ansar members have already been given powers to arrest was entirely "false".

He said both Ansar and police personnel were an integral part of the national law and order. No one is above the basic rule of law, he added.

On Sunday, a day before the bill was placed, top police officials, including leaders of the Bangladesh Police Service Association, opposed the decision to give Ansar members the authority to make arrests. The officials held a meeting with the home minister and expressed their concern.

The officials also held another meeting with the minister yesterday and objected to the decision.

Meanwhile, Jatiya Party Chairman

Speaking at the meeting, AL General Secretary Obaidul Quader said, "Gayeshwar [BNP leader] has said they will occupy the streets and allies if the permission [for the rally] is not granted. He spoke as if all the doors would be opened to welcome him if the streets and allies were captured. We are absolutely prepared. You will not find a way to escape even in allies."

Quader said, "We were not in the attack before we are on guard this time."

"If any attack happens, we will launch a counterattack. We will not spare them. We must stop the evil forces united."

According to AL sources, the

leaders have been instructed to gather on the streets with sticks under the cover of placards, flags, and banners.

If any situation arises, the party supporters will use the sticks. But they will not launch an attack first, the sources added.

The AL leaders have also been asked to enquire about any unknown person roaming around. If necessary, the party supporters would take help from police.

AL Joint General Secretary Bahauddin Nasim said that they have made preparations to mount a counterattack.

"We are mentally prepared to prevent their attacks," he told The Daily Star.

POLICE PREPARATIONS

Police have planned three-tier security centring the rallies.

Checkpoints will be set up a day before the rallies at all entrances to the capital to check firearms and explosives.

Besides, monitoring of messes and hotels have been beefed up, and social media watch has been strengthened to stop spreading of rumours, officials said.

Police are also planning to hold a meeting with the BNP to discuss details about its rally before making a

decision on granting permission.

Kh Mahid Uddin, additional commissioner (crime and operation) of Dhaka Metropolitan Police, said they will ask the BNP to change the venue.

He hoped that the BNP as a major political party will realise that there would problems if the programme is held on a street.
