

100 TREES felled at JU without permission

Nearly a hundred trees were felled on Jahangirnagar University campus, sparking protest among students. The Institute of Business Administration cut down the trees near Mir Mosharraf Hossain Hall early yesterday and removed those from the spot, alleged JU Deputy Registrar (Estate) Abdur Rahman Babul. “No one took any permission from us for felling trees. We came to know this in the morning. We heard this was done by IBA, and later informed the administration,” he said. The university authorities in 2018 allocated IBA 20 bighas of land to construct three academic buildings there. The IBA-JU authorities said the company which is constructing the buildings cut down the trees.

“We don’t need permission to cut trees. We don’t even need to ask.. The construction company cut the trees,” said KM Zahidul Islam, director of IBA-JU. A group of JU students yesterday brought out a rally and besieged the administrative building, before planting new trees at the place. JU Proctor ASM Firoz-ul-Hasan said IBA authorities asked him several times for felling the trees, but he did not comply with it. The Daily Star could not get in touch with the construction company for comments.

Besides, there are risks of getting attacked,” manager of a bus company said. “Some of our leaders and local ruling party leaders assured us that they will work to get compensation for us. But we are not assured by their words, we want assurance from top brass of the government,” he said, seeking anonymity. A top workers’ leader said they want assurance from the prime minister about three issues – protection for operating buses, compensation for both the owners, in case vehicles get damaged and for workers, in case they sustain injuries or die. In yesterday’s meeting with the home minister, Shajahan Khan, also a ruling party lawmaker, Federation’s secretary general Osman Ali, Owners’ Association’s president and secretary general Mashiur Rahman Ranga and Khandaker Enayet Ullah respectively, Abu Raihan, general secretary of Bangladesh Bus Truck Owners Association and two top police officials were present. “Yes, we had a meeting with the home minister. As per the decision of the meeting, the minister will come to our Gabtoli Terminal on Friday and give an announcement on behalf of the prime minister,” Abu Raihan said.

Oman suspends visa for Bangladeshis

Oman has suspended the issuance of visas across all categories for Bangladeshis from Tuesday until further notice, reported T h e

Times of Oman yesterday, quoting Royal Oman Police (ROP), the Gulf country’s immigration authority. Besides, ROP confirmed the suspension of “visa conversions” for expatriates arriving in Oman on tourist and visit visas, the report says. Previously, expatriates entering the country on visit visas could convert their status to employment visas. However, they will now be required to leave the country and return on a work visa, it says. In a statement, ROP said, “The ROP, within its review of the policies for obtaining some types of visas, announces the suspension of the conversion of all types of tourist and visit visas to work visas for all nationalities coming to the Sultanate of Oman, as well as the issuance of all types of new visas for Bangladeshi citizens, effective Tuesday (October 31, 2023) till further notice.” Wishing anonymity, multiple officials at the Bangladesh Embassy in Muscat yesterday said they got to know about the

issue from Oman media, and the Gulf country’s authority had yet to officially inform the Bangladesh mission about it. Usually, labour-receiving countries in the Gulf impose such visa restrictions on the source countries when the number of labourers from a particular country exceeds the expected level, said an official at the Bangladesh mission. This could be a reason for suspending new visas for Bangladeshis, the official said. Oman hosts more than 7,00,000 Bangladeshi migrant workers, including undocumented ones, making them the top migrant workers community there, the official said. Another official said the mission is expected to hold a meeting with Oman’s foreign ministry on Thursday to learn details about the visa suspension. According to Bureau of Manpower, Employment and Training data, Oman has recruited 18.33 lakh or 11.91 percent of the total Bangladeshi workers migrating abroad from 1976 till June this year. This made Oman a top destination for Bangladeshi migrant workers. In the first six months of this year, 76,679 workers have migrated to Oman for employment.

WB approves \$210m for early childhood dev

The World Bank has approved US \$210 million for a project to improve early childhood development in Bangladesh, according to a press release. The Bangladesh Enhancing Investments and Benefits for Early Years (BEIBEY) project aims at providing cash transfers and counseling services to improve nutrition – directly benefitting 1.7 million pregnant women and mothers of children under the age of four, in vulnerable households. Abdoulaye Seck, country director of World Bank Bangladesh and Bhutan, said, “Under current education and health systems, a child born today in Bangladesh would only be 46 percent as productive as they could potentially be.”

“Ensuring adequate nutrition prenatally in the first 1,000 days of life and responsive caregiving throughout childhood help maximise a child’s development,” he added. Aneeka Rahman, senior social protection economist and team leader of the project, said, “Supporting children from the earliest stages can greatly boost Bangladesh’s

economic and demographic potential. Investing early in a child’s life, especially during their crucial developmental years, can lead to significant benefits for the entire nation.” The project is financed by WB’s International Development Association that provides concessional financing and has a 30-year term with five-year grace period.

The minister also urged the editors to take legal action against the BNP culprits responsible for attacking on-duty journalists on Saturday. “The attackers have been identified and they are leaders and activists of BNP Jamaat. They cannot avoid the responsibility,” he said. BNP killed a cop and burnt down about 19 vehicles including ambulances at Razarbagh Police Hospital and their brutality has crossed all limits like Israeli forces in Gaza, he said. Journalists, editors and mass media can mould public opinion. But people of the country are unaware of their (BNP) brutality even after the attack on 30 on-duty journalists, said the minister.

“It’s the responsibility of the media to inform people about BNP’s mayhem. And newspapers need to publish reports on how the journalists were attacked,” he said. Says home minister on undocumented Bangladeshis living in UK

Home Minister Asaduzzaman Khan yesterday said steps will be taken to sign standard operating procedures (SOPs) soon to bring back undocumented Bangladeshis living in the UK. The minister was talking to reporters after a meeting with the British High Commissioner in Dhaka at his Secretariat office. “Some undocumented Bangladeshis are in Britain.
