TV TALKIES


KAALA PAANI

The plot takes place in the Andaman and Nicobar Islands in the year 2027, where the society portrayed has already faced the challenges of the pandemic and is currently confronting a comparable ailment known as LHF-27.


This waterborne illness displays resistance to antibiotics, and its abrupt, foreboding emergence takes people off guard, ultimately resulting in fatalities. Conversations about lockdowns, screening tests, and mandatory mask-wearing have become commonplace. Beyond these evident connections, this series evokes a sense of a pandemic because it reflects the past.

The seven-episode long series, penned by Biswapati Sarkar and brought to life by directors Sameer Saxena and Amit Golani, recalls the prevailing sense of death becoming a part of our daily lives. The opening episode, in fact, abruptly ends the life of a character presumed to be the protagonist of the show, and the pattern is repeated throughout the series. The idea that many characters never have the opportunity to experience a full life feels reminiscent of the pandemic era, where such experiences were often cut short.
