

Indo-Bangla ties a 'model relationship'

Says Jaishankar

India has said its ties with Bangladesh stand out as a "model relationship" in the Indian subcontinent in terms of benefits of regional cooperation.

"Today our relationship stands out in the Indian subcontinent as a model relationship in terms of benefits of regional cooperation," said Indian External Affairs Minister S Jaishankar, highlighting the progress in bilateral relations in the past decade.

Jaishankar's remarks came in response to a question by Saida Muna Tasneem, Bangladesh's high commissioner to the UK, during a conversation titled 'How a Billion People See the World' in London on Wednesday.

Tasneem asked Jaishankar about the importance of Bangladesh in India's foreign policy when it comes to security, regional connectivity, shared prosperity and the Indo-Pacific region.

Jaishankar said they had tried to restructure the neighbourhood.

"Obviously it's not something unilateral by us. For example, with Bangladesh, we have settled our land boundary, which is really a big deal."

There were disputes over the maritime boundary and both the countries opted for arbitration.

"We agreed that whatever the arbitral award would be, we would both follow. We did that when the arbitral award came. A lot of it was not in our favour. It's a good example for the region and countries."

In the last ten years, there have been rail links between the two countries and a power plant.

India is using Bangladesh's ports for the northeast and Bangladesh is benefiting from more traffic coming through the port, according to Jaishankar.

The election will be a farce if the EC moves forward with this schedule, he adds.

Biden calls Xi a dictator after planned summit

China 'strongly opposes' the remark

US President Joe Biden said early yesterday he had not changed his view that Chinese President Xi Jinping was effectively a dictator, a comment likely to land with a thud in Beijing after the two leaders held straightforward summit talks.

Biden held a solo news conference after four hours of talks with Xi on the outskirts of San Francisco. At the end of the news conference, he was asked whether he still held the view that Xi was a dictator, something he said in June.

"Look, he is. He's a dictator in the sense that he's a guy who runs a country that is a communist country that's based on a form of government totally different than

ours," Biden said.

In response, China's foreign ministry said it "strongly opposes" the remarks, without mentioning Biden by name.

"This statement is extremely wrong and irresponsible political manipulation," foreign ministry spokesperson Mao Ning told reporters yesterday at a routine briefing.

"It should be pointed out that there will always be some people with ulterior motives who attempt to incite and damage US-China relations, they are doomed to fail."

Mao refused to specify the identity of "some people" in answer to a follow-up question.

Last March Xi clinched a third term as

president when nearly 3,000 members of China's rubber-stamp parliament, the National People's Congress, voted unanimously for him in an election in which there was no other candidate.

Xi is considered the most powerful Chinese leader since Mao Zedong, after a decade of consolidating power in policy-making and the military, and stifling media freedoms.

There was no immediate reaction from the Chinese delegation, which had come to the United States to attend the Asia-Pacific Economic Cooperation summit in San Francisco. Hundreds of critics of Beijing marched through the city's downtown around noon, chanting "free Tibet" and "free Hong Kong."

"We have a seven-layer security system and there is no scope for leakage from our system."

He also insisted that it was just sample data and incorrect data.

"We have to give data to our vendors so that they can develop their products. We do not give them authentic data. It is some of that data which got leaked," he said insisting that the leak was inconsequential.

Maj Gen Ahsan claimed that the NTMC system was not linked to any cloud or even the internet, which highly placed sources inside the government's ICT ministry refuted.

In Mumbai, Kohli bowed down as he surpassed the India legend's 49 ODI hundreds.

The record 50th ODI ton from Kohli ensured the continuation of India's marauding run — powering them to the highest ever total recorded in a World Cup knockout game, resulting in a convincing win to see the 1983 and 2011 champions to their fourth World Cup final.

Even long before Wednesday's milestone — which is one of many from the perennial record breaker Kohli — the right-handed batter had been crowned the best in the business in the modern era. And rightly so, as Kohli remains only one of the few in modern cricket who will be the first pick for any eleven — regardless of formats.

His 117 on Wednesday was not the smoothest. In fact, his World Cup 2023 aggregate of 711 at a staggering 101.57 average — the highest ever by any batter in one edition of the showpiece event — has seen more than a fair share of wobbles as Kohli was dropped a number of times throughout the tournament.

It is only logical that when you are that good, your every move is scrutinised to the tiniest detail. With not many to be compared to, you are measured against the standards that you have set.

But despite having millions of eyes set on you, many of which are intrigued to question the slightest of inaccuracies, it is the ability to shrug off those periods of shakiness to emerge as a hero, almost on every occasion, that acts as the true mark of a champion.

Railway official demoted over graft charges

Railways ministry has demoted a mid level official of Bangladesh Railway on charges of corruption.

AMM Shahnewaz, the then chief commercial manager of BR west zone, was demoted to 5th grade from 4th, according to an order signed by Railways Secretary Humayun Kabir.

A copy of the order, issued on November 13, is now available on the ministry's website.

The ministry in December 2020 suspended three BR officials, including Shahnewaz, for their involvement in irregularities and corruption, while purchasing materials.

The order was issued following the recommendation of a probe committee, formed on September 20, 2020, following a news report published in a Bangla daily on rampant corruption in purchases in the BR west zone during the 2018-19 fiscal year.

The two other officials are Belal Hossain Sarker, then controller of stores of BR west zone, and Zahid Kawsar, the then assistant controller of stores.

Divisional cases have been filed against them also but cases against the two have not been disposed of so far, a ministry official said seeking anonymity.

The Daily Star could not reach Shahnewaz or the Railways secretary over the phone for comments.

DSA CASE AGAINST PROTHOM ALO EDITOR, REPORTER

Cop asked to submit probe report by Dec 27

A Dhaka court yesterday asked the investigation officer to submit by December 27 the probe report of a case filed against Prothom Alo Editor and Publisher Matiur Rahman and its staff reporter Samsuzzaman Shams under the Digital Security Act.

Matiur Rahman and Shams, now on bail, were present at the court during the hearing, said general recording officer SI Nizamuddin Fakir.

Dhaka Additional Chief Metropolitan Magistrate Md Sultan Sohag Uddin passed the order after police failed to submit any probe report by yesterday.

Lawyer Abdul Malek Mashirul Malek, 61, filed the case against Matiur Rahman, Shams, an unnamed assistant cameraman, and unnamed others on March 29 with Ramna Police Station, accusing them of using print, online, and electronic media to tarnish the image and reputation of the state, according to the FIR.
