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BNP calls blockade for 48 more hours

To enforce it from tomorrow, says Rizvi; six buses, truck torched

The BNP yesterday called for a fresh 48-hour countrywide blockade starting tomorrow morning.

Ruhul Kabir Rizvi, the party's senior joint secretary general, made the announcement at a virtual press briefing yesterday evening after the party's 48-hour hartal ended amid arson attacks on public transport,

Six buses and a truck were set on fire across the country, while two people were caught in the act of torching a parked truck in Jashore Sadar early yesterday.

In front of the Dhaka Metropolitan Sessions Judges Court, a crude bomb went off; however, no one was reported to have been hurt.

During the 48-hour hartal, 16 vehicles were torched across the country, with four reported in Dhaka city, according to Fire Service and Civil Defence. The traffic movement across the country increased on

the last day of the 48-hour hartal yesterday. However, few inter-district buses left the capital.

With the fresh blockade, it would be the party's sixth round of blockades since October 28. The BNP claimed 14,200 party leaders and activists,

including the 480 yesterday, were arrested since October 28. During this period, 331 cases were filed against party leaders and workers, it added.

Rab said it arrested 562 people in connection with violence since October 28.

Alongside police, Rab deployed over 425 patrol teams SEE PAGE 6 COL 2

The Election Commission will consider rescheduling the upcoming national polls if major opposition BNP decides to join it following political consensus. Two election commissioners said they have time to

push the election date by five to seven days, as the five-year term of parliament will end on January 29. They, however, said election commissioners have not

held any discussions about the issue.

Asked whether there would be any scope for BNP and other parties to take part in the polls, Election Commissioner Rashida Sultana said, "If they want to join the election, we will surely discuss to find a way."

"We will make a decision. We will welcome the BNP if it decides to join the polls. We of course respond to its call if the party wants to contest the election," she said while talking to reporters at her EC office.

On November 15, the EC announced the polls schedule, slating that the 12th parliamentary election will be held

The last day for submitting nomination forms is November 30 while the forms will be scrutinised on December 1-4 and the last date for candidature withdrawal is December 17.

Twenty-eight premature babies were evacuated from war-torn Gaza to Egypt yesterday as the enclave's health ministry accused Israel of launching a deadly strike on the territory's Indonesian Hospital.

Frantic diplomatic efforts were meanwhile underway to seal a deal for the release of some of the 240 hostages Hamas fighters took during their October 7 attacks on Israel.

The Gaza health ministry charged that Israel's army killed at least 12 people in a strike on the Indonesian Hospital in the Palestinian territory's north, a war zone where entire city blocks have been reduced to rubble.

Those killed included patients, said Ashraf al-Qudra, a spokesman for the ministry which has reported a death toll of more than 13,000 as the Gaza war rages on into its seventh week.

Dozens more were wounded and 700 people remained trapped inside the "besieged" medical centre, Qudra said.

More than 2.4 million Palestinians are trapped in Gaza and only several hundred war-wounded, foreign have been allowed out. UN

As trains and BRTC buses are being attacked, the authorities are stepping up security to keep the services going amid hartal and blockade enforced by the BNP and

At an inter-ministerial meeting yesterday, the railways ministry decided to take several measures, including intensifying security on trains, rail lines and in other establishments

Around 4,000 more Ansar members will be deployed to ensure the safety of railways and its passengers, said meeting sources.

Meanwhile, Bangladesh Road Transport Corporation (BRTC) has already tightened security at its depots across the country. Dhaka Mass Transit Company Ltd has called a meeting today to review the safety of the metro rail

At least seven BRTC buses were torched and 12 other buses of the state-owned agency vandalised during the hartal and blockade, said BRTC sources.

Two trains came under arson attacks while crude bombs were hurled at running trains on several occasions, BR Director General Quamrul Ahsan told The Daily Star

Besides, many attempts were made to set the rail tracks on fire in different areas, he said.

Officials of BR, police and the ministries of rail, home, and finance were present at the meeting at the Rail Bhaban.

Railways Secretary Humayun Kabir told this correspondent, "The meeting was held to find out safety loopholes and devise a plan to save railway properties and its passengers.'

The deceased identified as Syed Amin, 34, a resident of Block B at Rohingya Camp 3 under the Rajapalang union.

A clash broke out at the camp between the Myanmar-based groups Arakan Rohingva Salvation Army (ARSA) and Rohingya Solidarity Organisation (RSO) broke out, followed by a gunfight 8:00pm, said around Shamim Hossain, officerin-charge of Ukhiya Police Station.

Napoleon hat fetches record \$2.1m at auction

A bicorne hat believed to have belonged to Napoleon Bonaparte sold for a record 1,932,000 euros million) at the Drouot auction house in Paris on Sunday. It was initially estimated

at 600,000 to 800,000 euros. The price beat the 1,884,000 euros paid for another Napoleon hat at Drouot in 2014, an official at the auction house said.

"One million four hundred fifty thousand (euros) to my left, 1.5 million, we have 1.5 million in the room, 1.5 million for Napoleon's hat. We're leaving it at 1.5 million for this major Napoleon symbol, I'm selling for 1.5 million (before fees), no regrets, sold," auctioneer Jean-Pierre Osenat said as he brought down the hammer to applause.

Ahead of the auction, Osenat told Reuters the black beaver felt hat in the traditional bicorne shape was a trademark for Napoleon, who had owned about 120 such hats throughout his life.

The hat was part of the image he constructed, as Napoleon was a man of communication," Osenat said, adding that Napoleon always wore the hat with the corners aligned with his shoulders, while most people at the time wore it with the corners front to back.
