Minister Sheikh Prime Hasina has once again accused the BNP and Jamaat-e-Islami of trying to foil the January national election.

'The consequences will not be good if anyone tries to foil the election," she

Hasina, also the Awami League president, was speaking at a meeting of the AL Parliamentary Nomination Board at its Dhaka district office in Tejgaon. The meeting was convened to finalise the party nominees for the election. The premier said the BNP-Jamaat alliance did not

the 2018 elections, they failed to produce any specific evidence of irregularities in support of their claims.

killing people and destroying properties. Hasina admitted that the BNP's acceptance among the people had been on the rise when it was holding peaceful

rallies and doing healthy politics. "But when they resorted to violence like they did in the

### Another bout of 48-hr blockade from Sunday

The BNP and its allies have called another 48-hour blockade from Sunday morning.

At a virtual press briefing yesterday, Ruhul Kabir Rizvi, senior joint secretary general of the party, announced the programme demanding the national election under a non-partisan administration and cancellation of the election schedule.

The party's ongoing 48-hour blockade ends at 6:00am today.

A bus was torched in the capital and tnree otner venicies were set alignt in Gazipur and Kishoreganj yesterday, while two constables were injured as criminals hurled a crude bomb at a human haulier carrying police personnel in Rajshahi on Wednesday night.

During this blockade, arsonists set fire to six vehicles across the country, with two reported in the capital, according to the fire service.

Traffic across the country increased on the last day of the blockade yesterday. A few inter-district buses left the capital, The Daily Star learnt this after talking to transport workers.

With blockade that would begin on Sunday would be BNP's seventh round since October 28, when BNP activists and

## Webb captures glimpse of the heart of Milky Way

The James Webb Space Telescope has looked into the heart of the Milky Way galaxy, unveiling new features and mysteries within the chaotic region that could help astronomers unravel more details about the early universe.

The space observatory's ability to view the universe in infrared light, which is invisible to the human

captured neverbefore-seen details in the image, released by Astronomers used

Webb to glimpse Sagittarius C, or Sgr C, an active region of star formation located about light-years the galaxy's central supermassive black hole Sagittarius A\*.

"The image from Webb is stunning, and the science we will get from it is even better," said Samuel Crowe, principal investigator of the observations and an undergraduate student at the University of Virginia, in a statement.

"Massive stars are factories that produce heavy elements in their nuclear cores, so understanding them better is like learning the origin story of much of the universe," Crowe said.

Studying the Milky Way's centre with Webb could provide insights into how many stars form there and whether massive stars are more likely to form near the galactic centre rather than the galaxy's spiral arms.

## **DUTCH ELECTION** Far-right Wilders aims to be PM after shock win

Far-right populist Geert Wilders wants to be the Netherlands' next prime minister and would focus his efforts on curbing immigration, he said following a landmark election win that will have repercussions in the Netherlands and Europe.

A fan of former US President Donald Trump and Hungary's eurosceptic Prime Minister Viktor Orban, the vocally anti-Islam, anti-EU Wilders has also vowed to slash Dutch payments to the European Union and block the entrance of any new members, including Ukraine. Though Wilders' most radical



ideas will be rejected by other parties he must work with in order to form a coalition government, fellow populists including Italy's Deputy Prime Minister and leader of the hard-right League Matteo Salvini welcomed his win as showing that "a new Europe is possible."

Beating all predictions, Wilders' Freedom Party (PVV) won 37 seats out of 150 on Wednesday, well ahead of 25 for a joint Labour/Green ticket and 24 for the conservative People's Party for Freedom and Democracy (VVD) of outgoing Prime Minister Mark Rutte.

Wilders told Dutch media yesterday he wanted to be prime minister and that he was in favour of a referendum on whether the Netherlands should leave the EU.
