HC to hear Fakhrul's bail petition December 7

The High Court has set December 7 for the bail BNP hearing of Secretary General Fakhrul Mirza Islam Alamgir in a case filed over



the vandalism of the chief justice's residence on October 28.

The HC bench of justices Md Salim and Shahed Nuruddin set the date yesterday after Fakhrul's lawyer Zainul Abedin asked for the hearing.

Fakhrul filed the petition with the HC on Sunday through his lawyers after a Dhaka court on November 22 denied him bail.

His lawyer, Sagir Hossain Leon, said, "Fakhrul was not involved in the vandalism of the chief justice's residence in any manner. He is an elderly person and he has been suffering from various ailments, including heart problems."

Fakhrul landed in jail on October 29 in connection with the case that was filed with Ramna Police Station.

NATIONAL POLLS 118 aspirants defaulted on loans: BB

At least 118 aspirant MPs who have filed nomination papers out of the total 2,713 for the January 7 national election have been identified as loan defaulters, said Bangladesh Bank

The CIB reports of the 118 were not clean before the submission of their nomination papers, which is why their nomination papers may be cancelled, said a senior official of the central bank's Credit Information

Article-12 of the Representation of the People Order-1972 stipulates that a person shall be disqualified from contesting an election if they fail to repay their defaulted loans seven days before the submission of nomination

A director of a company or a partner of a firm will be disqualified if they fail to clear their defaulted loans a day before the submission of nomination papers, it adds.

Restore all rivers, canals in and around the capital

PM directs the authorities concerned

Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina yesterday directed the authorities concerned to restore all the rivers and canals in and around the capital as soon as possible.

She gave the directive at a meeting in the cabinet room of her office. The meeting was organised to make a presentation on the survey report on preventing pollution and taking up a project to protect the water bodies in light of the master plan adopted in this regard.

Prime Minister's Press Secretary Ihsanul Karim briefed reporters after the

Directing the authorities to stop river pollution, Hasina said, "We have to save our rivers if we want to save Bangladesh."

She mentioned that the rivers are for Bangladesh, just like body's veins for blood circulation. "Survival of Bangladesh also depends on rivers."

The meeting identified seven spots for restoration of navigability of the rivers and canals in and around Dhaka. These are Gazipur, Garanchatbari, Savar, Purbachal, Kalyanpur, Narayanganj, and

CASE OVER ILLEGAL ENTRY HC stays trial against photojournalist Kajol

The High Court yesterday stayed for six months the trial proceedings against photojournalist Shafiqul Islam Kajol in a case filed by the BGB on May 3, 2020, for his alleged entry to Bangladesh from India without a passport.

The HC also issued a rule asking the state to explain why the trial proceedings in the case against Kajol should not be scrapped.

The bench of Justices SM Kuddus Zaman and Md Aminul Islam issued the order and rule after hearing a petition seeking cancellation of the case. Advocate Nazmus Shakib represented Kajol

while Deputy Attorney General Sujit Chatterjee

Bappi represented the state. Kajol had disappeared on March 10, 2020, and was "found" by the Border Guard Bangladesh

roaming around the Benapole border 53 days later. He then landed in jail for three DSA cases filed

by lawmaker Saifuzzaman Shikhor, and two Jubo Mahila League activists over a Facebook post. His bail appeals were rejected multiple times

by the lower court, until the High Court on November 24, 2020, granted him bail in one case. On December 17, 2020, the HC ordered bail in two remaining cases. He was released from jail on December 25, 2020.

POLITICAL VIOLENCE Charges framed against Rizvi, Aman, 43 others

A Dhaka court yesterday framed charges against 45 leaders and activists of the BNP and Jamaat-e-Islami and their front organisations in a case filed over political violence in the capital in 2015.

BNP leaders Aman Ullah Aman, Ruhul Kabir Rizvi, Barkat Ullah Bulu, Ruhul Kuddus Talukder Dulu and Jubo Dal's former president Saiful Alam Nirob are among the accused.

Aman and Nirob in jail and 23 others on bail pleaded not guilty after Additional Chief Metropolitan Magistrate Md Tofazzal Hossain read out the charges to them.

Before that, the magistrate dismissed petitions for discharging them from the case.

The court also cancelled bail petition of 20 other accused, including Dulu, Rizvi, and Bulu as they were absent.

The court set December 25 for starting the trial of the case.

According to the case statement, a group of leaders and activists of the BNP and Jamaat and their front organisations led by Aman, brought out a procession in front of Zaker Dairy Farm in the city's Mohammadpur area around 8:50pm on January 17, 2015. They also torched a bus by throwing a petrol bomb.

Following the incident, police filed a case against Aman, Dulu, Bulu, Rizvi and 19 others with Mohammadpur Police Station.

After an investigation, police submitted a harge sheet against 45 people on August 2

The Rajshahi lawmaker faced allegations of election code violation in the past as well. During the Rajshahi City Corporation election in July 2018, he held a meeting with local influentials to seek votes for a candidate. Earlier, during the union parishad polls, he was served a showcause notice for breaking the election law, according to media reports.

He did not respond to our calls and text message for comments.

On November 30, Election Commissioner Brig Gen (retd) Ahsan Habib Khan warned against election code violations.

Labour bill put on the shelf

Tk 20,000 from Tk 5,000. "It appears that Section 54 of the bill will lead to confusion. Therefore, it is necessary to reconsider this section," said the president's note for the bill.

A senior official at the Jatiya Sangsad told The Daily Star that since parliament is not in session and as there is no possibility of holding any session before the formation of a new government.

"The new government will have to place a bill before the 12th parliament... ," the official said wishing anonymity.

Prior to this, a bill was last sent back in 1998 when Justice Shahabuddin

Ahmed was president. According to the law, all bills passed by parliament must be

presented before the president who will either consent to it or reject it within 15 days. If the bill is passed again, after his rejection, and is sent back to the president, he has seven days to give consent.

The bill was passed in parliament on November 2 and the president signed his note on November 20.

Rights leaders alleged their consent was not taken before the bill was placed in parliament, even though discussions among all stakeholders had been on since 2021.
