

## DOHA FORUM 2023 Momen discusses evolving trends in global trade

UNB, Dhaka

Foreign Minister AK Abdul Momen yesterday attended a high-level panel session on "Changing Priorities in Global Trade" at the Doha Forum that began in Doha, Qatar.

Momen discussed the evolving trends in global trade, the impact of trade measures, and redrawing the supply chain routes as well as focusing on the gains.

He also highlighted Bangladesh's achievements in vaccination efforts both during and before the pandemic.

Earlier, he attended the opening ceremony of the forum, inaugurated by Sheikh Tamim bin Hamad Al Thani, the Amir of the State of Qatar.

Momen is leading a five-member Bangladesh delegation at the invitation of the prime minister and minister of foreign affairs of Qatar, said the Ministry of Foreign Affairs.

This is the 21st edition of the Doha Forum with the theme "Building Shared futures". Held annually, the forum brings together policy makers, government leaders, private sector representatives, civil society and non-government organisations to discuss global challenges, promoting dialogue and diplomacy.

# Turning setbacks into success

Al Amin thrives in fibreglass motor parts making business

After losing his overseas job during the pandemic, Al Amin Howlader, a 35-year-old former expatriate from Patuakhali, encountered repeated setbacks in his quest for alternative employment. He turned the tide of his fortune by establishing a small factory in his village, crafting decorative motor parts from fibreglass.

Al Amin was first introduced to this business when he moved to Dhaka in 2004 and started working at a fibre parts factory. After four years in the sector, he moved to Dubai.

However, he decided to try his luck in this sector again after returning to the country during the pandemic, investing Tk 1 lakh to establish his own workshop in 2020.

"We built the factory in an abandoned piece of land next to our house and named it Ma Babar Doa Fibreglass,



manufacturing and selling 50 types of decorative parts for motorbikes, including tank and back seat covers, and wing-sets," said Al Amin, who now employs four workers in his factory.

Al Amin explained the manufacturing process, which includes blending chemicals

in Dhaka. They market these products through various companies," he said.

The products made of fibre are bendable but not easily breakable. Thus, it has gained a good reputation in markets across the nation, he said, adding that the products can become a marketable good abroad.

While locals take pride in Al Amin's success, challenges still knock at his factory doors.

"Price hike of raw materials is one of the major challenges at the moment. Last year, a roll of fibre, weighing 30kg, could be bought for Tk 4,000, but now the price is Tk 7,000. A drum of chemicals has to be bought for Tk 58,000 now, which was available at Tk 35,000 before," said Al Amin.

Md Alamgir Sikder, assistant manager of Patuakhali Bangladesh Small and Cottage Industries Corporation, said this is the first factory of this kind in the southern region.

## She still waits for her father

"My son was burned to death in such a manner that I couldn't even recognise his face. My heart was shattered to pieces seeing his corpse," said the mother of Abu Naim, a bus helper who was engulfed in flame after unidentified arsonists set fire to a bus of Achim Paribahan in the Demra area of the capital on October 29.

"My son was the lone breadwinner of our family; we are struggling to survive after his death," said the bereaved mother.

Gita Shil, who was injured in an arson attack in 2013, said no one is now safe from the arsonists. "They have brought back the terror of 2013. We are neither safe on

the roads nor on the buses. I have been bearing the brunt of arson attacks for the last 10 years. I can't use my hands to eat. I even face difficulties swallowing food," she said.

She also urged everyone to boycott BNP and Jamaat.

Nasima Ferdous, who was seriously injured in the grenade attack on an Awami League rally on August 21, 2004, said she is still carrying numerous splinters inside her body.

Maksuda Parvin, whose father was a sergeant in the Air Force in 1977, said she lost her father when she was three. "I have spent 47 years crying for my father," she said.

At the event's outset, a documentary was

screened, highlighting various incidents that took place at different times.

Apart from that, different acts of sabotage were displayed through symbolic representations.

Road Transport and Bridges Minister Obaidul Quader and Information Minister Hasan Mahmud, among others, were present on the occasion.

But none of them spoke.

Member of AL executive committee Tarana Halim, daughter of Col Khandaker Nazmul Huda (killed on November 7, 1975) Nahid Izahar Khan, and martyred intellectual Dr Alim Chowdhury's daughter Nuzhat Chowdhury moderated the event.

On October 28, Indian authorities set a minimum export price of onions at \$800 per tonne for the rest of the year. The price made it almost impossible for Bangladeshi traders to import the essential cooking ingredient.

On Friday, New Delhi extended the curb until the end of March.

Wholesale and grocery shop owners in Bangladesh blame India's move for the sudden hike in prices even

though the restriction is nothing new.

As rising prices of essentials have already been making it harder for people to make ends meet, the nearly twofold hike shocked consumers.

At Dhaka markets, a kg of onions was sold for around Tk 196 to Tk 220 yesterday.

The consumers rights directorate raided different kitchen markets across the country and punished over 130 businesses, but the initiative had little effect.

Border Guard Bangladesh has also started strict surveillance to prevent the smuggling of illegal arms.

The BGB will remain alert across the country to maintain law and order ahead of the national elections, said BGB Director General Maj Gen AKM Nazmul Hasan at a programme in Satkania upazila of Chattogram on December 5.

Meanwhile, the government has strengthened security at the country's three international airports ahead of the election.

Additional members of armed police have been deployed there, said sources at the Civil Aviation Authority of Bangladesh.

An additional 100 members of the Armed Police Battalion (APBN) are on duty at Hazrat Shahjalal International Airport in Dhaka.

Similarly, 60 more APBN members have been deployed at Sylhet

International Airport.

On the other hand, an additional 54 Ansar members are discharging their duties at Shah Amanat International Airport in Chattogram.

According to sources, a meeting chaired by State Minister for Civil Aviation M Mahub Ali at the Ministry of Civil Aviation reviewed the security of the airports.

On December 5, the ministry in a letter asked CAAB to follow a 12-point instruction to beef up the security at the three international airports.

Law Minister Anisul Huq, NHRC Chairman Kamal Uddin Ahmed and NHRC full-time member Md Selim Reza also spoke at the event.

A documentary of NHRC was screened on the occasion.

citizenship rights for every individual, she added.

Fauzia Moslem, president of Bangladesh Mahila Parishad, said the absence of women's equal rights in inheritance and family property perpetuates their subordination in both family and society. This situation is identified as the fundamental factor contributing to violence against women and girls, encompassing issues like dowry and child marriage.

Barrister Tania Amir said according to the constitution, all citizens should have equal rights.

Articles 16, 27, 28 of the constitution notes that the state will not discriminate. Even if there is any legal provision anywhere, it will be void. Sections of the Succession Act

are inconsistent with the provisions of the constitution, so they should be repealed. Yet, we are yet to see this change and women are deprived of equal rights.

Shyamal Dutta, general secretary of Jatiya Press Club, said violence against women and girls disrupts the peace and stability of the family, society and state. It increases costs in various areas such as healthcare, education,

social protection, justice and productivity, which harms families, societies and national economies. Violence must be prevented to overcome this situation.

Indiscriminate use of technology has also made women's lives more vulnerable. Unfortunately, efforts are still being made to prevent women's right to vote by fatwas in some areas of the country, he added.
