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Four more die of dengue

Four dengue patients died in the last 24 hours till yesterday morning.

The total number of deaths rose to 1,682, of which 970 are from Dhaka, according to the Directorate General of Health Services (DGHS).

Earlier on Saturday, Bangladesh saw no deaths from dengue, a first since June 29.

With 254 new dengue cases, the total number of cases this year rose to 3,19,236, of which 1,09,511 were from Dhaka.

A total of 1,563 dengue patients are still undergoing treatment at different hospitals across the country, 474 of which are in Dhaka.

Among the total cases, 3,15,991 dengue patients have already been released.

Upskill migrant workers: speakers

15 journos, a media house get BRAC Migration Media Award

Given the vital role of remittances from expatriate Bangladeshis in the country's economy, it is imperative for the government to prioritise the well-being of remitters, speakers told a discussion yesterday.

Upskilling workers will help them earn higher wages and send home more remittance. Reducing migration cost and addressing the migrant workers' plight are also necessary, they said.

BRAC organised the discussion as part of the 8th BRAC Migration Media Award at its auditorium in the capital's Mohakhali.

This year, 15 journalists and a media house were awarded in six categories -- newspaper (national), newspaper (regional), television, media house, radio and online news outlet.

BRAC introduced the award in 2015. BRAC Executive Director Asif Saleh said the migration sector's importance is more apparent now as remittance has

been playing a crucial role in overcoming the crisis regarding the country's depleting forex reserve.

Asif also said the media needs to highlight the challenges faced by the migrant workers, including health hazards of working in extreme weather conditions in the Middle East.

BRAC has been working to ensure safe and regular migration and combat human trafficking, while developing a model on low-cost migration of skilled workers, he added.

Addressing the event as chief guest, The Daily Star Editor and Publisher Mahfuz Anam said workers go abroad paying their own migration cost, work arduously there facing health challenges and send valuable remittance to boost Bangladesh's economy.

Despite that, the migration sector is the least benefited compared to other forex-earning sectors in getting government incentives, he said.

Of rights violations and heartbreaks

The challenges faced by Bangladeshi migrants

Despite a surge in labour migration, many Bangladeshi migrant workers encounter challenges in host countries, including job loss due to fraud, leading to economic loss and psychological stress.

Amid this, Bangladesh will observe International Migrants Day today.

In 2000, the United Nations General Assembly proclaimed December 18 as International Migrants Day, taking into account the large and increasing number of migrants worldwide.

In the 2022-2023 fiscal, Bangladeshis sent home \$21.6 billion in remittance, which accounted for 4.76 percent of the country's GDP, according to the Bangladesh Bank.

Shakirul Islam, chairperson of Ovbashi Karmi Unnayan Program, said workers face exploitation mainly because of their low skills.

"If we want development in our labour migration sector, we should redesign our skills training programme based on demand of destination countries," he said.

He called on the government to critically review its various bilateral agreements and

memorandums of understanding (MoUs) with host countries to alleviate the plight of workers.

"Workers' rights will not be protected if ethical recruitment is not ensured," he added.

A telephone survey conducted by the Refugee and Migratory Movements Research Unit (RMMRU) on 218 returnee migrants,

including 42 females, revealed that 64 percent of respondents experienced some form of rights violation in the destination country.

The survey, conducted in October-November this year, shows 15 percent migrants returned in less than 30 days of

migration, 14 percent within one to three months, and another 29 percent within three to six months.

The key reasons behind their untimely return include arrest and deportation (in 34 cases), not getting any job (33 cases), not getting promised job and wage (44), employer's misconduct (17), not having valid visa (23), and low wage (31).

Of the respondents, 116 migrants went to Saudi Arabia and 51 percent of them returned within six months.

Due to their untimely return, 161 migrants counted financial loss and 32 suffered psychological pressure, shows the survey, which interviewed individuals who had returned home after the pandemic.

The "Labour Force Survey 2022" by the Bangladesh Bureau of Statistics shows that the average recruitment cost for a Bangladeshi migrant worker is Tk 3.81 lakh, requiring 14.6 months of income for cost recovery.

This year, out of approximately 12.1 lakh workers departing for foreign countries by November, Malaysia received 3.29 lakh workers, as per data from the Bureau of

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Why policy should not be enacted for their development?

Asks HC on children living in condemned cells with mothers

The High Court yesterday issued a rule asking the government to explain why it should not be directed to formulate a regulation to ensure physical and mental development of children living in condemned cells with their mothers.

It also ordered the authorities concerned to inquire about the condition of 10-month-old Mahida, who has been living with her mother, Husna Akter, in the condemned cell of Habiganj district prison. Husna was convicted in a criminal case on October 26.

The court asked to submit a report by January 18.

Inspector general of prisons and Habiganj jail authorities have been asked to comply with the directive.

HC also asked respondents to explain why their inaction to ensure sufficient food, a healthy environment, and other needs for Mahida should not be declared illegal.

The rule's respondents included secretaries at the ministries of home, law, women and children affairs, IG (prisons), DIG (prisons) of Sylhet, and inspector of Habiganj prison.
