US destroyer downs 14 drones in the Red Sea

CENTCOM blames Yemen's rebels

An American destroyer on Saturday shot down more than a dozen drones in the Red Sea launched from Huthi-controlled areas of Yemen, the US military said, as the impact of the Israel-Hamas conflict spreads to global shipping lanes.

"The Arleigh Burke-class guided missile destroyer USS CARNEY... operating in the Red Sea, successfully engaged 14 unmanned aerial systems launched as a drone wave from Huthicontrolled areas of Yemen," US Central Command (CENTCOM) said on X, formerly known as Twitter.

The aerial vehicles were "assessed to be oneway attack drones and were shot down with no damage to ships in the area or reported injuries," according to the statement.



Mother, daughter killed by Israeli soldier

A Christian mother and daughter were shot dead by an Israeli soldier on grounds of a Catholic church in Gaza City on Saturday, the Latin Patriarchate of Jerusalem said.

"Around noon (1000 GMT) today... a sniper of the IDF (Israeli army) murdered two Christian women inside the Holy Family Parish in Gaza," where Christian families have been sheltering since the Israel-Hamas war broke out, the patriarchate said in a statement.

"Nahida and her daughter Samar were shot and killed as they walked to Sister's Convent. One was killed as she tried to carry the other to safety." it added. Seven more people were wounded by gunfire as they tried to protect others, the statement said.

According to Vatican press agency, citing Pierbattista Pizzaballa, the Latin patriarch of Jerusalem, the victims were an elderly woman and her daughter.

Approached comment, the Israeli army said it was looking into the incident, which took place on the grounds of the Gaza Strip's only Catholic church.

Hamas turns streets into deadly maze

Vast tunnel network remains a major challenge for Israeli troops, say experts

The Israeli army's death toll in Gaza is already almost twice as high as during a ground offensive in 2014, a reflection of how far it has pushed into the enclave and of Hamas' effective use of guerrilla tactics and an expanded arsenal.

Israeli military experts, an Israeli commander and a Hamas source described how the Palestinian group has used a big weapons stockpile, its knowledge of terrain and a vast tunnel network to turn Gaza's streets into a deadly maze.

At their disposal they have arms ranging from drones rigged with grenades to anti-tank weapons with powerful twin charges.

Israel's military said yesterday that 121 soldiers had been killed past decade. since the ground campaign began on October 27, when tanks and infantry began to push into Gaza's cities and refugee camps.

That compares with 66 in the 2014 conflict, when Israel launched a more limited three-week ground incursion but the goal then was not to eliminate Hamas.

"There is no comparing the scope of this war to 2014, when our forces mostly operated no deeper than a kilometre inside Gaza," said Yaacov Amidror, a retired Israeli major-general and former national security adviser who is now at the Jewish Institute for National



Security of America (JINSA).

He said the army "has yet to find a "huge price" in Israeli soldiers. a good solution for the tunnels," a network hugely expanded in the

Since the war began on October 7, close to 19,000 people have been killed in Gaza, sparking international demands for a ceasefire and even calls from Israel's staunch ally the United States for a shift in strategy and more precise strikes.

Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu said on Thursday Israel would wage war "until absolute victory". Israeli officials have said it could take months before being complete.

"It has been a challenge from day one," Ophir Falk, foreign policy adviser to Netanyahu, told Reuters,

saying the offensive had come with

"We know that we're going to probably have to pay an additional price to complete the mission."

Hamas has posted videos on its Telegram channel this month showing fighters with bodycams weaving through buildings to launch shoulder-held rockets at armoured vehicles. One of them, posted on December 7, was from Shejaiya, east of Gaza City, an area where both sides reported heavy fighting.

In another post on December 5, a camera emerges from a tunnel, like a periscope, to scan an Israeli camp where soldiers rested. The post said it was later hit by an underground blast. Reuters could not verify the videos.

HOUSE BREACH India's PM Modi calls for

Indian Prime Minister Narendra Modi called for a detailed investigation into last week's major security breach of parliament, countering demands from opposition parties for a debate in the chamber on the incident.

"What happened is very serious," Modi told the Dainik Jagran newspaper in an interview published his yesterday, comments on Wednesday's breach. "There is no need to debate this, there should be a detailed investigation into this."

arrested six Police people, filing terrorism charges against four, after a man jumped into the lower house chamber while members were in session, shouted slogans and set off a smoke canister. A second man tried to follow him. Both were caught by lawmakers and security personnel, and taken away.

The incident occurred on the 22nd anniversary of an attack on parliament complex in which more than a dozen people were killed, including five gunmen.

Members of parliament told local media the two men had chanted slogans, including "dictatorship won't be accepted".

MIGRANT CRISIS

Over 60 drown in shipwreck off Libya: IOM

Sixty-one migrants, including women and children, drowned following a shipwreck off Libya, the International Organization for Migration (IOM) in Libya said.

IOM, in a post on social media platform X, quoted survivors as saying the boat, carrying around 86 people, departed the Libyan city of Zwara, about 110 km (68 miles) from the capital,

"The central Mediterranean continues to be one of the world's most dangerous migration routes," IOM said on Saturday.

Deadly incidents this year included one in June, when a fishing boat packed with hundreds of migrants sank off Greece after departing from Tobruk, Libya. The voyage, which was supposed to end in Italy, resulted in 78 recorded deaths with the fate of 518 others unknown, according to an IOM report.

Drowning was the main cause of death on migration routes globally in the first half of 2023, with 2,200 recorded fatalities in the period, according to the IOM report.

The central Mediterranean route was the deadliest, accounting for a total of 1,727 deaths and disappearances along its shores in the period, the IOM report said. The majority of the deaths were recorded in Tunisia, followed by Libya, it said.

Ukraine shoots down 2 missiles, 20 drones

Russia foils 33 drone attacks in three border regions with Ukraine

Ukraine said yesterday that it had repelled two Russian missile and 20 drone attacks overnight, as Moscow reported downing 33 drones fired from Ukraine. "The Russian occupying forces attacked with the Iskander-K cruise missile, the Kh-59 guided air missile..., as well as 20

Shahed-type strike drones,' the Ukrainian air force said

> in a statement. Ukraine forces shot down the drones and the Kh-59 missile, while "Iskander-K cruise missile did not reach its goal", the air force said. It said the missiles were launched from Crimea and the occupied Kherson region, without saying if there were any

victims or damage. Russia in turn said that it had foiled 33 drone attacks in three border regions with Ukraine. The Russian defence ministry said in a statement its air defence systems "destroyed and intercepted 33 Ukrainian unmanned aerial vehicles over the territories of the Lipetsk, Rostov and Volgograd regions". Drone attacks have been almost daily occurrences in Russia's border regions, though mass attacks are less common. The capital Moscow and its outskirts have also been targets of Ukrainian drone attacks. Russia, meanwhile, bombards Ukrainian towns almost daily. Last week, it launched a massive drone attack on southern Ukraine and fired ballistic missiles at Kyiv, where about 50 people

were wounded by debris.

Battle for Wad Madani opens up new front

Thousands flee

Sudan's paramilitary Rapid Support Forces battled the army outside the central city of Wad Madani on Saturday, pressing an attack that has opened a new front in the eight-month-old war and forced thousands to flee,

Crowds of people - many of whom had taken refuge in the city from violence in the capital Khartoum - could be seen packing up belongings and leaving on foot in video posted on social media.

'The war has followed us to Madani so I am looking for a bus so me and my family can flee," 45-year-old Ahmed Salih told Reuters by phone.

We are living in hell and there is no one to help us." He said he planned to head south to Sennar.

Sudan's army, which has held the city since the start of the conflict, launched air strikes on RSF forces to the east of the city, the capital of Gezira state, as it tried to push back the assault that started on Friday, witnesses said.

The RSF responded with artillery and RSF reinforcements were seen moving in the direction of the fighting, the witnesses added.

RSF soldiers have also been seen in villages to the north and west of the city in recent days and weeks, residents said.

The United Nations said 14,000 people had fled the area so far, and a few thousand had already reached other cities.

9 dead, several hurt in India factory blast

At least nine workers were killed and several injured in a blast at an explosives factory in Nagpur, a central district in Maharashtra state yesterday morning, a local police officer told Reuters over the phone.

The blast occurred around 8:30 am (0300 GMT) at a factory run by Solar Industries India SLIN.NS, the police officer surnamed Salve said. The factory manufactures industrial and military explosives, as well as propellants and warheads for India's defence sector, according to Industries' website.

The injured were shifted to nearby hospitals, Salve said. Salve was part of the team that went to the site of the explosion yesterday morning.

The police are still investigating the cause of the blast, which occurred in the factory's packing area.
