Candidates kick off electioneering

Candidates across the country began their electoral campaign right after being allocated symbols by returning officers yesterday.

In Mymensingh-4, AL candidate Muhit Ur Rahman organised a rally at the city's Shilpacharya Zainul Abedin Park area yesterday afternoon.

Supporters of independent candidate Aminul Haque Shamim, also the Mymensingh district unit AL vice president, along with Jatiya Party's candidate Abu Musa Sarker, also started their campaigns for the same constituency.

In Gazipur, the city's former mayor Jahangir Alam staged a showdown with three independent candidates from three constituencies -- Md Rezaul Karim of Gazipur-1, Kazi Alimuddin of Gazipur-2, and Akhtaruzzaman of Gazipur-5.

Right after getting their symbols, the three independents went to the Rajbari field adjacent to the RO's office, where Jahangir was already present

‘Eagle’ their symbol of choice

The allocation of symbols for the upcoming national polls started yesterday, with eagle being the most preferred one for independent candidates. Ten out of 16 independent contenders from 15 constituencies in Dhaka metropolitan wanted it for their electoral battle. Five of them were ultimately allocated the eagle symbol.

Meanwhile, four candidates will campaign with the second most desired symbol- ‘truck’.

Returning Officer Sabirul Islam oversaw the allocation of election symbols for 122 candidates from Dhaka metropolitan. Notably, one independent candidate

was absent during yesterday's proceedings, meaning he would get a symbol later.

Symbol allocation operated on a straightforward principle: if a candidate applied for a symbol unclaimed by others, they secured it. However, when multiple candidates vied for the same symbol, a lottery determined the allocation.

An exciting competition unfolded for the coveted eagle symbol.

Take the case of Dhaka-14 constituency for example, independent candidates ZI Russel and Sabina Akhter Tuhin both sought the Eagle symbol; ultimately, Russel secured it, and Tuhin received the “truck”

Polls boost printing press business

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21,835 BNP men detained since Oct 28

Allege pro-BNP lawyers

Bangladesh Jatiotabadi Ainjibi Forum (BJAF), a body of pro-BNP lawyers, yesterday alleged that the “unelected” government has illegally detained 21,835 BNP men since October 28 to foil the party's movement for restoring democracy and people's right to vote.

A total of 1,249 BNP leaders and activists have been sentenced to different terms of imprisonment in connection with 79 cases over the last 14 weeks, BJAF Secretary General Kayser Kamal said in a written statement during a press conference.

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Training of 9 lakh polling officials starts

The Election Commission will start training over 9 lakh polling officials across the country from today.

In Dhaka, presiding officers, assistant presiding officers, polling officers will be given a one-day training at Dania College, said Electoral Training Institute (ETI) Director General SM Asaduzzaman Arzu.

Similar trainings will take place at upazila and district level till January 4.

As many as 46,364 presiding officers, 2,87,722 assistant presiding officers and 5,75,443 polling officers will be trained this year.

In Chattogram, legacy matters

Children of 6 AL leaders contesting national polls

The Awami League has chosen to entrust children of veteran party leaders in six constituencies of Chattogram for the upcoming national polls. Reflecting a pattern seen in Bangladesh and across South Asian politics, these nominees, now the torchbearers of their political dynasties, include four re-nominees and two newcomers vying for victory under the “boat” symbol.

In Chattogram-1 (Mirsarai), Mahbubur Rahman Ruhel, son of incumbent MP and former minister Mosharraf Hossain, got AL nomination for the first time.

In Chattogram-4 (Sitakunda), SM Al Mamun, son of former lawmaker from the constituency late Abul Kashem Master, also got debut nomination.

In Chattogram-2 (Fatikchhari), Khadizatul Anwar Sony, daughter of Rafiqul Anwar, former MP from the constituency, got nominated by AL. Earlier, she was a member of the Jatiya Sangsad from reserved seat.

Legacy in politics has emerged as a culture, with wife or children getting nominated after a leader's death. But political parties in a democratic country should nominate candidates in a democratic way.

In Chattogram-9 (Kotwali-Bakalia), Mohibul Hasan Chowdhury, the son of three-time mayor Mohiuddin Chowdhury, has been re-nominated.

In Chattogram-13 (Anwara), Saifuzzaman Chowdhury, incumbent lawmaker from the seat and son of the former AL leader Aktaruzzaman Chowdhury, got re-nominated.

In Chattogram-3 (Sandwip), AL has nominated incumbent lawmaker Mahfuzur Rahman Mita, whose father Mostafizur Rahman served as a two-time MP from the same constituency.

Local politicians and analysts have mixed reactions over these children of AL leaders.

“Dynasty politics frustrates grassroots activists and promotes factionalism. It also breaks the chain of command in local politics,” said Sheikh Ataur Rahman Ata, general secretary of Chattogram north AL. He, however, said some legacy politicians are seen to perform better as they gather political knowledge from the family.

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
