Ranbir Kapoor’s ‘Animal’ is now 4th highest Indian grosser in North America

Sandeep Reddy Vanga’s action film *Animal*, featuring Ranbir Kapoor, has amassed Rs 862.2 crore globally within three weeks since its release on December 1, as announced by the makers last Friday.

Film trade analyst Ramesh Bala, sharing an update on *Animal*’s North America (NA) box office on Sunday, revealed that the film is rapidly nearing



the USD 15 million mark and has already secured the position of the fourth highest Indian grosser.

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2018, a group of leaders and activists of BNP and its front organisations illegally gathered at the Panthapath intersection in Kalabagan to demand the release of BNP Chairperson Khaleda Zia.

They then threw brickbats at the police and obstructed them from discharging duties.

Sub-Inspector Amit Hasan filed a case with Kalabagan Police Station following the incident.

Also yesterday, another Dhaka court sentenced 10 BNP members to two years imprisonment over political violence in Sutrapur in September 2018.

Dhaka Metropolitan Magistrate Md Ataullah pronounced the judgement.

The court recorded statements of five prosecution witnesses during the trial.

Dhaka South BNP General Secretary Abdus Sattar and Jubo Dal’s former ward level president Delowar Hossain are among the convicts.

The case statement said a group of BNP leaders and activists gathered at the Ray Shaheb Bazar intersection in Sutrapur on September 3 during a political programme. They blasted one crude bomb, threw brickbats towards police, and obstructed them from discharging their duties.

SI Mohammad Hafizulla filed a case with Sutrapur Police Station.

The same magistrate yesterday jailed nine BNP members for two years for obstructing police from discharging their duties in the Victoria Park area of Sutrapur in September 2018.

Four prosecution witnesses gave their statements.

The case statement said a group of BNP leaders and activists gathered in front of the Victoria Park Jame Masjid in Sutrapur on September 17 during a political programme, assaulted policemen, and obstructed them from discharging their duties.

SI Shamal Chandra Debnath filed a case with Sutrapur Police Station in this regard.

In addition, Dhaka Metropolitan Magistrate Ahmed Humayun Kabir yesterday sentenced 10 BNP members to two years’ imprisonment over political violence in Cantonment area in September 2018.

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which spent \$7,627; two Facebook pages called “Banglar Samachar”, which spent \$5,129 and “Peoples Voice”, which spent \$4,378; the official page of Barishal Mayor Abul Khair Abdullah, which spent \$3,658; a page called “Nouka Manei”, which spent \$3,151; and the official fan page of Bangladesh Awami League, which spent \$2,856.

An overtly pro-AL media organisation called “Press Xpress” spent \$11,739 on ads, while another similar page claiming to be a media agency called “BD Peoples Voice” spent \$7,377.

Meta makes it mandatory for those advertising elections or politics to complete an authorisation procedure involving providing contact details. The ad also runs with a disclaimer declaring who paid for it.

However, the report found that Meta is inadequate when it comes to detecting political ads that are not declaring themselves as political. “It is crucial to regulate and identify political and electoral ads to ensure that voters are not being unduly influenced by any party,” it said.

“Fifty active advertisements obtained through keyword searches, containing clear political messages

and images, evaded Facebook’s detection system. Out of them, 48 percent originated directly from the pages of political figures and parties,” the organisation found.

“For the majority of the undetected advertisements, over 90 percent prominently displayed the names of a political party or a political person, and 72 percent of these ads included photos of a political leader or the insignia of a political organisation.”

Also, at least two units of Jamaat-e-Islami ran ads that were not detected as political, it found.

“In many cases, pages ran political ads without providing sufficient information in disclaimers for months and even years. It implies that once disclaimer information is provided, there is little effort in verifying “functionality” and “correctness” of the information,” the report added.

“As a result, to the users, the idea of identifying who is spending money for political advertisement remains as vague as the information advertisers provide in disclaimers.”

They recommended that the Election Commission mandate all platforms to disclose political ad policies that are specific to the country and provide access to relevant data.

The EC issued the order yesterday. On November 30, Chattogram-16 AL nominee Mustafizur Rahman Chowdhury beat up a journalist for his question about breaching of the electoral rules.

Mustafizur staged a “showdown” on his way to the office of returning officer to submit his nomination form. When asked, he scolded the reporter and beat him up.

The EC issued a notice yesterday saying it decided to file as a case against Mustafizur with the Chief Judicial Magistrate’s Court following an election enquiry committee probe report.

In Lalmonirhat-2 seat, AL candidate and Social Welfare Minister Nuruzzaman Ahmed at a meeting on Saturday night threatened to “break the neck” of a freedom fighter, a follower of an independent candidate.

In another development, Bangladesh Congress candidate for Bogura-4 Ashraful Alam, popularly known as Hero Alam, alleged that he came under attack by some AL activists at Kahalu Bazar yesterday evening.

Verdict in case

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and sought punishment for the accused.

On June 6, it framed charges against them. It also recorded statements of four prosecution witnesses in the case.

On September 9, 2021, Labour Inspector (general) SM Arifuzzaman of the Inspection for Factories and Establishments Department filed the case with the Third Labour Court of Dhaka.

According to the case documents, IFED officials on August 16, 2021 inspected the office of Grameen Telecom in the capital’s Mirpur and found several violations of labour laws.

On August 19 that year, the department sent a letter to the authorities of Grameen Telecom, mentioning that 67 of its employees were supposed to be made permanent employees. But it was not done, the case statement said.

Besides, the employee’s participation and welfare funds were yet to be formed, and five percent of the company’s dividends, supposed to be paid to the workers, were not given, it added.

Israel pounds Gaza

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in makeshift tents and forced into the south of Gaza even as ground fighting comes closer.

Near the far southern Gaza city of Rafah, Umm Amir Abu al-Awi, 27, suffered wounds to her hand and legs in a strike on her house early yesterday.

“Who won?” she said. “Nothing has been achieved except killing civilians... They keep saying Rafah is safe. It is not safe. Nowhere is safe. Every house has a martyr and injured.”

Israeli military spokesman Jonathan Conricus indicated that forces were close to gaining operational control in northern Gaza and that now “we focus our efforts against Hamas in southern Gaza”.

Fighting has raged in the main southern city of Khan Yunis, the birthplace of Yahya Sinwar, Hamas’ leader in Gaza and the man Israel holds most responsible for the October 7 attack.

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Khasru stood by him, provided all the treatment support, and took responsibility for his two children, giving his elder daughter a job,” he said.

Speaking to The Daily Star, 40 to 50 voters in the constituency comprising Netrokona Sadar and Barhata echoed the same sentiment. They said his record of effectively disbursing safety net schemes, including allowances for the elderly and widows and cash assistance, would keep him ahead in the January 7 national polls.

They also had good words to say about Joy, who seems to have returned to people’s good books after being in the news for the wrong reasons due to his brothers’ wrongdoings when he was the MP.

“He has a celebrity image here. The most important thing about Joy is that he can easily mix with people and is widely liked by the youth,” said Mahmudul Hasan, a resident of Barhata.

“People usually do not remember the past,” Mahmudul said, adding that it seems he has a lot of supporters.

“You will understand that if you look at his campaigns and processions, which are attended by a large number of people,” he added.

Many in the constituency expressed a similar opinion, saying it would not be easy for Khasru to win and that they expect a tough battle between the two candidates.

However, AL leaders and activists in the district predict a win for Khasru, noting that top AL leaders who were initially against him have united and started working for his campaign.

Previously, divisions existed among district unit AL leaders.

Leaders like Shamsul Islam Liton, general secretary of district AL, Nazrul Islam Khan, municipality mayor, Prashanta Kumar Roy, vice president of district AL, Lt Col Nur Khan, advisory member of district unit AL, and Arpita Khanom Shumi, president of municipality unit AL, collected nominations to run against Khasru.

Later, they withdrew their candidacies, joined Khasru’s campaign and started going door-to-door to garner support for Khasru.

On the other hand, only a few AL leaders and activists including Joy’s brothers – Nur Khan Mithu, vice-president of the district AL, and Masud Khan Jony, convener of

district Jubo League – and his uncle Golam Md Khan Pathan, member of the district unit AL, are working for Arif Khan Joy.

Some Jubo League leaders and activists, who are working with Joy’s campaign, said some district unit AL leaders and activists are secretly communicating with Joy and working for his victory.

However, Shamsul Islam Liton, general secretary of district AL, asserted that the local unit is highly organised with leaders and activists working extensively for Khasru. He predicted victory by a substantial margin.

Both Khasru and Joy expressed their hopes of winning the election, banking on people’s support.

A total of seven candidates are battling it out for the Netrokona-2 seat in parliament.

Local AL leader Shubrata Chandra Sarkar is running the race as another “AL independent”, while ABM Rafiqul Islam Talukder from Bangladesh Nationalist Movement, Rahima Akhter alias Asma Sultana from Jatiya party, Md Ilias from Islami Oikyajote, and Md Azharul Islam from Bangladesh Congress are contesting in this constituency.

Majed Ali Babul, joint convener of the district AL, said the news of the PM’s visit to her in-laws has created a lot of enthusiasm among the locals and party activists.

“A significant turnout is expected at the prime minister’s election rallies.”

On August 2, Hasina addressed a massive rally at Rangpur Zilla School playground.

Before that, her last visit to Rangpur was on December 23, 2018, ahead of the 11th national polls, when she addressed the election rallies in Taraganj and Pirganj constituencies.

In Barishal, Hasina will attend a public rally at the Bangabandhu Uddyan, AL sources said.

Preparations for her visit there are already underway as different areas of the city are being decorated and cleaned.

A six-member coordination committee has been established to oversee the preparations for the PM’s visit.
