Second-time infection drives up dengue deaths

Show DGHS findings; 1,699 fatalities recorded so far this year

One of the main reasons behind dengue deaths this year was secondtime infection, while other reasons include late hospitalisation and comorbidity, according to the recent findings of the health directorate's death review committee.

'In our review, we've tried to find the reasons for this year's severity [of the infection]. We found that most of the patients were infected [with dengue] for the second time, which increased the mortality rate," said Prof Ahmedul Kabir, head of the committee and additional director general (administration) of the Directorate General of Health Services.

He said the risk for patients infected with dengue for the first time is far less than those infected for the second time. "And those who are infected for the third time, their condition turns fatal."

The death review committee assessed the background information of patients who have died from dengue so far this year, their medical documents, treatment records and causes of death.

Experts said the changing patterns of the dengue virus, false results in testing kits, and the presence of serotypes DEN-2 and DEN-3 are some other reasons for the staggering number of deaths this year.

The sample size was over half of the total deaths, Kabir said. According to DGHS data, at least 1,699 dengue patients died, and

3,20,835 others were hospitalised till yesterday (December 27) Experts said the changing patterns of the dengue virus, false results in testing kits, and the presence of serotypes DEN-2 and DEN-3 are some $\,$ other reasons for the staggering number of deaths this year.

HM Nazmul Ahsan, associate professor of Shaheed Suhrawardy Medical College Hospital, said, "This year we got many patients coming to hospital in critical conditions within just a few days of getting infected. They had conditions like fluid in the abdomen and chest and a drop in blood pressure in a span of two or three days. We also found many patients without rashes [a common dengue symptom]."

In many cases, he said, test kits give false results. "As a result, patients end up coming to hospital only when their condition is already critical." Nazmul said this year the presence of serotypes DEN-2 and DEN-3 was higher compared to previous years. "Among the four dengue serotypes, 2 and 3 are most dangerous."

The four viruses are called serotypes because each has different interactions with the antibodies in human blood serum. HOW TO PREVENT DEATHS

Public health expert Mushtaq Hossain said changes in the current treatment management and strategy are necessary in order to bring down the dengue mortality rate in the country.

"If the government classifies dengue treatment and divides it into three parts -- primary, secondary and tertiary -- it would be easier to manage all the patients and the number of deaths would be reduced."

Palestinian president Mahmud Abbas yesterday said the Israeli offensive in Gaza is worse than genocide as the death toll in the besieged Palestinian territory surged above 21,000.

Israel again pounded Gaza with air strikes and shelling after its armed forces chief warned the offensive will last "many more months".

Explosion lit up the sky over the southern Gaza city of Khan Yunis - a focus of heavy urban combat since the Israeli army said it had largely gained operational control Gaza's north.

firefights Heavy however also raged again around Gaza City in the north, while an air strike wounded 11 near Rafah,

a far-southern city crowded with internally

displaced people, witnesses said. Gaza's spiralling humanitarian crisis has

amplified calls for an end to the hostilities. "Our objectives are essential and not simple to achieve," Israel's armed forces chief Herzi Halevi said Tuesday. "Therefore, the offensive will continue for many more months."

Since October 7, Israel's relentless bombardment has killed at least 21,110 people, according to the latest toll issued by Gaza's health ministry, which added that more than 55,000 people had been wounded

It said at least 195 people killed were killed and another 325 injured in the past 24 hours

Gaza's 2.4 million people have suffered severe shortages of water, food,

fuel and medicines, with only limited aid entering the territory.

An estimated 1.9 million Gazans have been displaced, according to the UN.

The Israel's offensive "goes beyond catastrophe and Palestinian genocide," president Mahmud Abbas charged in an interview on Egyptian television.

The Palestinian Authority chief argued the offensive "is much uglier than what happened" during the 1948 war that accompanied Israel's creation when 760,000 Palestinians fled or were expelled from their homes.

Govt to ensure free, fair polls

Says foreign minister

Foreign Minister AK Abdul Momen yesterday said Dhaka wants to demonstrate that it can hold a free, fair, and acceptable election.

Speaking to reporters, he said the government never felt any external pressure ahead of the national polls but it wants to make sure the election is free, fair, and peaceful.

Talking about Bangladesh's relations with India, the US and the European Union, Momen said they are Dhaka's friends and development partners. "We have a longstanding relationship with them."

He said the US stood against Bangladesh during the Liberation War in 1971, but it started supporting Bangladesh since the country achieved its independence.

"We have been maintaining very good relations with India since the independence. The relations are in "golden chapter". The European Union is a big market for us," the

Highlighting the importance of peace and stability in the region for greater development, Momen said Dhaka do not want to see any proxy war here.

"Problems remain wherever there are proxy wars. Europe has fallen into a proxy war and is facing challenges," he said, adding that there might be efforts to

Independent candidate brings allegations against AL pick

AK Azad, a local Awami League leader running for parliament as an independent in Faridpur-3, yesterday alleged that 20 of his supporters were assaulted and his makeshift campaign offices were vandalised by his party nominee Shamim Haque's

at least 19 times in the last nine days," he told reporters at a press conference at his home in Faridpur town, adding that law enforcers were reluctant to do anything about it.

"So far, five cases and 13 general diaries have been filed with Kotwali Police Station over the incidents... But they are going to the houses of my supporters and threatening them.'

If the attacks don't stop, Azad said he and his supporters will take to the streets.

"The workers of boat [the attacked my activists ruling party's symbol] have been unleashing terror."


of Faridpur town, he said.
