about how he would return as it was not possible for him to buy a return ticket. Sharmin Aktar had to wait 30 minutes at a ticket vending machine of Uttara North Station as it was not functioning. "It is really painful when you have to start

from the beginning after standing in line for so long."

Adani firms up NDTV takeover His conglomerate now owns 64.71 PC stake

Indian tycoon Gautam Adani yesterday secured a majority stake in leading news broadcaster NDTV, finalising a hostile takeover that has sparked press freedom fears in the world's biggest democracy.

Adani, 60, is the world's third-richest person, with an estimated net worth of \$130 billion and interests ranging from Australian coal mines to India's busiest ports.

Mild cold wave sweeping over the north

Poor, elderly people suffering

A mild cold wave sweeping over Naogaon, Panchagarh, Jashore and Chuadanga is causing immense suffering to poor people.

Yesterday's lowest temperature, 8.7 degrees Celsius, was recorded in Tentulia, Panchagarh, according to the Bangladesh Meteorological Department.

A 24-hour bulletin released at 6:00pm yesterday said, "Weather may remain dry with temporary partly cloudy skies over the country."

Night and day temperatures may remain nearly nchanged over the country today it said

Meteorologist Bazlur Rashid yesterday evening said the weather might remain almost like this for the next three to four days. "But the mild cold wave may spread to some

other districts on January 5-6." Low-income people, especially the elderly ones, have been suffering a lot and many could not work yesterday in

different areas of Panchagarh. "It is difficult to stay at home. How can we go to the farm for work when it is much colder outside?" said Anukul Barman, 50, a farmer of Maidan Dighi area of Boda.

"It is time to cultivate winter vegetables. But I have not been able to leave home in the last few days.'

Shariful Islam, a 55-year-old rickshaw puller in Sakowa village of the same upazila, said, "It feels like my body does not want to move. But I am trying to pull my rickshaw. If I don't work, my family will starve to death."

Tributes pour in for The King

Football fans were united in mourning on Thursday after the death of Pele at the age of 82, with tributes pouring in for the Brazil great who defined his sport and inspired generations.

Brazil's government declared three days of mourning and the arch at soccer's cathedral, Wembley Stadium, was lit in the colours Brazil, while icons of sport and heads of state bowed to the man who rose up from childhood poverty to become a

legend. "I had the privilege that younger Brazilians didn't have: I saw Pele play, live, at Pacaembu and Morumbi. Play, no. I saw Pele give a show," said Lula, the presidentelect of Brazil.

"Because when he got the ball he always did something special, which often ended up in a goal."

Former Brazil President Dilma wrote: "The world mourns. The Rousseff wrote: "Thank you for the joy you gave the Brazilian people and the people of the world. No one has been a king so loved."

Sao Paulo's government said it would name a new road complex to the city of Santos, where Pele played club soccer, "Rei Pele" ('King Pele').

FIFA President Gianni Infantino wrote in a lengthy tribute that Pele had "achieved immortality," recalling the top moments from his career, including the "Pele runaround" at the 1970 World Cup and his goal in the 1958 World Cup final at the age of only 17.

"The sight of him punching the air in celebration is one of the most iconic in our sport, and is etched and a minute's into our history," said Infantino, who recalled as a child watching Olympique Pele starring alongside Hollywood star Sylvester Stallone in the 1981 film "Escape to Victory."

"In fact, because televised football was still in its infancy at the time, we only saw small glimpses of what he was capable of.'

With 1,281 goals in 1,366 games, according to FIFA, his on-field statistics were matched only by his social impact. The Brazilian Football Confederation (CBF) declared Pele, the only player to win the World Cup three times, "The King of Soccer."

Women more empathetic than men: study

Women are on average more empathetic and better than men at putting themselves in others shoes, according to a new study involving over 300,000 people in 57 countries.

One fundamental quality of being human is the ability to imagine what another person is thinking or feeling, applying what is known as the "theory of mind", also known as "cognitive empathy".

The research, published in the journal PNAS, found women across all ages in most countries had more cognitive empathy than men.

Women scored more than men in a widely used test called the "Reading the Mind in the Eyes" Test - or Eyes Test for short - that measures cognitive empathy.

To study the development of the "theory of mind" using the Eyes Test, participants are told to look at a photo of a person and pick a word that best describes what that person is thinking

A Jubo League leader was hacked to death and at least five others were injured in a clash over a land-related dispute in Chatmohar upazila of Pabna yesterday.

GRAFT, OTHER CHARGES Junta jails Suu Kyi for 33yrs

US, EU condemn the ruling

Ousted Myanmar democracy leader Aung San Suu Kyi was sentenced to another seven years in jail as her long series of trials ended yesterday, with the Nobel laureate now facing more than three decades behind bars.

A prisoner of the military since a coup last year, Suu Kyi, 77, has been convicted on every

charge levelled against her ranging from corruption to illegally possessing walkie-talkies and flouting Covid restrictions.

Yesterday she was jailed for seven years on five counts of corruption related to the hiring, maintaining and purchase of a helicopter for a government minister, a case in which she allegedly caused "a loss to the state".

Suu Kyi - sentenced to a total of 33 years following 18 months of court proceedings that rights groups have dismissed as a sham -- appeared in

good health, a legal source familiar with the case told AFP. "All her cases were finished and there are no more charges against her," said the source, who requested anonymity as they were not authorised to speak to the
