## **HC** defers Fakhrul's bail hearing till next week

The High Court yesterday deferred till next week the hearing on the rule

The HC bench of Justice Md Salim and Justice Shahed Nuruddin passed the order following a time petition by Fakhrul's lawyer Waliur Rahman.

senior backed by BNP appeared for Fakhrul as they were observing a court boycott across the country since January 1 on different demands. On December 7 last year, the HC bench issued the rule asking the state to explain in seven days why Fakhrul should not be granted bail.

### Yunus is our national asset, but he committed crime: Momen

Laureate Muhammad Yunus is a national asset, but he has been punished for his criminal activities, said Foreign Minister AK Abdul Momen.

"We respect him a lot. But there are many Nobel Laureates in the world who have done wrong and committed criminal acts, they have been punished. In this case, our Nobel Laureate has committed crime," he said.

Momen, also the Awami League candidate from Sylhet-1 in the January 7 national election, made this remark while talking to journalists on Tuesday night at his election office in Sylhet city. "As far as I know. he [Yunus] did not pay his labourers and cheated them. The judgment has been delivered against him for that reason. It's a matter of court."

"He got his opportunity to fight it legally. He got the opportunity to argue. Then they [the court] pronounced the verdict based on evidence," he said.

# 1,970 candidates vying for 300 seats

EC reinstates candidacy of 77 for upcoming polls

The total number of candidates for the January 7 polls now stands at 1,970 as the Election Commission reinstated the candidature of 77 aspirants until yesterday following the order of the High Court.

The candidates who got back candidacy include three from Awami League and 10 from Ganotantri Party.

As the candidates of Ganotantri Party got back their candidacy, the total number of political parties joining the national polls is now

EC sources said they have also restored the candidacy of two aspirants each from Trinamool BNP, Bangladesh Nationalist Movement, and Jatiya Samajtantrik Dal (Inu), and one each from Bangladesh Krishak Sramik Janata League and Bangladesh Congress, along with 56 independent candidates, EC sources said.

Among the 1,970 candidates, 266 are vying for the polls with the "boat" symbol of the ruling AL.

Meanwhile, Jatiyo Party nominated 265 candidates to run the electoral race. However, around 26 JP candidates have withdrawn so far.

The number of women candidates is now 90, while 79 candidates from religious and ethnic minorities are contesting the polls.

to move to the HC as their candidacies were rejected by either the Returning Officers or the Election Commission during the hearing of appeals.

AL candidates who regained candidacy are Enamul Haque Babul from Jashore-4, Abdus Salam from Mymensingh-9, and Shahmim Haque from Faridpur-1.

The EC during the appeal, cancelled the candidature of Babul and Salam on the allegation of loan defaulting, while Shamim's candidacy was cancelled for having dual citizenship.

The EC on December 12 decided to cancel the candidature of all aspirants of the ruling alliance member Ganotantri Party as the party has no commissionapproved central committee.

The party moved to the HC against the decision.

Supreme Court on December 26 ordered the EC to allow the participation of Gonatantri Party in the upcoming 12th parliamentary elections.

Meanwhile, 16 political parties, including the major opposition BNP and its allies, are boycotting the upcoming polls, saying a free and fair election is not possible under the current government.

The dengue death toll rose to two this year as the country witnessed one more death in the last 24 hours, according to the Directorate General of

Health Services. A total of 70 new infections were reported during this period, taking the number of cases this year to 215.

At least 561 dengue patients are still under treatment at different hospitals across the country, 259 of whom are from Dhaka. Meanwhile, 379 patients, including 114 from Dhaka, have already been released.

Last year, the country witnessed 1,705 dengue deaths while 3,21,179 cases of the mosquito-borne disease were reported.
