Death toll rises to 73

Survivors face freezing rain, threat of landslides

Rescuers raced against the clock yesterday searching for survivors of an earthquake in western Japan that killed at least 73, while evacuees continued to wait for further aid amid freezing temperatures and heavy rain.

The quake with a preliminary magnitude of 7.6 struck the Noto peninsula on New Year's Day, levelling houses and cutting off remote areas from aid.

Heavy rain was forecast in the quake-hit areas yesterday, raising fears of landslides that could further hinder efforts to free many more people still trapped under rubble.

roads, infrastructure, and remote location of the hardest-hit areas have complicated rescue efforts. The full extent of damage and casualties remains unclear two days after quake.

In Suzu, a town of about 13,000 people near the quake's epicentre, 90 percent of houses may have been destroyed, its mayor said on Tuesday, calling the damage "catastrophic".

Ishikawa prefecture has confirmed 65 deaths, up from 55 late on Tuesday, making the earthquake the deadliest in Japan since at least 2016. Smaller quakes continue to hit the peninsula.

Firefighters from Osaka and Nara prefectures pressed on despite the rain and aftershocks in hard-hit Wajima city, searching for a woman trapped in a wooden structure squashed by a seven-floor building that toppled over in the quake and landed on its side.

The rescuers were removing rubble to try to reach the woman, who was not showing any vital signs, a firefighter said. They dashed out from under the collapsed building as an earthquake warning alarm sounded yet again yesterday evening.

Huthi rebels fire on commercial ships

US military says 'none have reported any damage'

late Tuesday toward merchant ships travelling in the Red Sea near the strategic Bab el-Mandeb Strait, the US military said following a report by the British maritime security agency UKMTO.

United Kingdom Maritime Trade Operations had initially reported explosions near a cargo ship sailing between the coasts of Eritrea and Yemen.

"Master reports no damage to the vessel and crew are reported safe at present," the agency, run by Britain's Royal Navy, said in a brief message.

The US Central Command later said Huthi rebels had fired two anti-ship ballistic missiles into the southern Red Sea, where there were multiple commercial ships but "none have reported any

"These illegal actions endangered the lives of dozens of innocent mariners and continue to disrupt the free flow of international commerce," CENTCOM said on X, formerly Twitter, adding it was the 24th attack against merchant shipping in the area since November 19.

Japanese authorities said yesterday a passenger jet that collided with a Coast Guard turboprop at a Tokyo airport was given permission to land, but the smaller plane was not cleared for take-off, based on transcripts of conversations with the control tower.

All 379 people aboard the Japan Airlines (JAL) 9201.T Airbus A350 had a miraculous escape after it erupted in flames following Tuesday's crash with a De Havilland Dash-8 Coast Guard turboprop shortly after landing at Haneda airport.

But five died among the six Coast Guard crew, while the captain, who escaped the wreckage. was badly injured.

Ukraine attacks **Belgorod region** with missiles

Says Russia; Nato to buy 1,000 Patriot missiles

Ukraine launched 12 missiles and several drones in the early hours of vesterday on Russia's southern region of Belgorod, Russia's defence ministry and local authorities said. Regional governor Vyacheslav Gladkov said the situation "continues to remain tense" in Belgorod, where Russia says 25 civilians including five

children were killed in Ukrainian attacks on Saturday. There was no word of any casualties from the latest attacks. Gladkov said the extent of damage would be assessed throughout the day. An aerial attack damaged several infrastructures and caused power cuts in the Kursk region, to the north of Belgorod. Meanwhile, Nato members in Europe have signed a contract for up to 1,000 Patriot missiles to bolster air defences in the face of the threat from Russia, the alliance said vesterday. Ukraine's escalation of attacks on Belgorod has come as Russia launched some of its most intense strikes on Ukraine since the war began almost two years ago.

Sweden sees coldest weather in 25 years

Sweden yesterday recorded its coldest January night in 25 years, with a reading of minus 43.6 degrees Celsius in the far north as a cold snap hit the country and neighbouring Finland. "To put that into perspective, that is the lowest January temperature in Sweden since 1999," Mattias Lind, meteorologist at Sweden's national weather agency SMHI, told AFP. In January 1999, a temperature of minus 49 degrees Celsius (minus 56.2 Fahrenheit) was recorded in Sweden, which then tied the record set in 1951. Lind said that yesterday's measurement was made at the Kvikkjokk-Arrenjarka station in Sweden's far north. "It is the lowest temperature that has been recorded in this specific spot since measurements began" at the site in 1888, he said. Several other stations recorded temperatures of below minus 40C in northern parts. While the region is used to seeing freezing temperatures, the recent cold snap has forced local bus operators to cancel services, and train operator Vy said Tuesday that it had cancelled all trains north of the city of Umea for several days. Trains were also disrupted in neighbouring Finland, where a seasonal record of minus 38.7 Celsius was recorded Tuesday evening in Lapland region. Several instances of frozen water pipes were also reported, and Finnish broadcaster YLE said around 300 people in the city of Tampere were left without running water



But the total recorded Palestinian death toll has now reached 22,313, according to the Gaza health ministry. Some 128 Palestinians were killed and 261 injured in the past 24 hours, it added.

In the Al-Maghazi refugee camp, health officials said at least four people were killed in an Israeli air strike on a house. They said three people were also killed in an air strike on a house in Rafah in the south of the Gaza Strip.
