At least eight out of 21 constituencies in Barishal division are unlikely to witness any significant contest in the January 7 polls, causing the voters of these constituencies to lose interest in exercising their franchise on the voting day.

The constituencies in question are Barishal-1 and 4, Jhalakathi-1 and 2, and all four constituencies of Bhola. **BARISHAL 1, 4**

(Gournadi-Agailjhara), Barishal-1 In incumbent lawmaker and Awami League candidate Abul Hasnat Abdullah has conducted vibrant campaigns from the very start to the end of the electioneering period. In contrast, Jatiyo Party candidate Serniabat Sekhander Ali and National People's Party candidate Md Tuhin have hardly campaigned ahead of the polls. Contacted, Serniabat said, "We are

going from door to door even if we are not campaigning."

Meanwhile, voters of the Barishal-4 (Mehendiganj) constituency believe independent candidate Pankaj Nath is likely to have smooth sailing due to a lack of strong opponents, as the candidature of the AL candidate for this constituency, Shammi Ahmed, got cancelled due to his dual citizenship.

"There is hardly going to be any contest, so voters are not much interested in going to the polling stations," said Raihan, a young voter from the seat.

JHALAKATHI 1, 2

In Jhalakathi-1 (Rajapur-Kathalia), AL candidate Shahjahan Omar won't face much challenge as AL independent from the constituency, Md Moniruzzaman, withdrew his candidature. There are no other strong contenders for this seat.

Local AL leaders and activists, however, have not been active in supporting Omar. As a result, voters from this constituency hardly have any interest in the polls, said locals.

Elsewhere in Jhalakathi-2 (Sadar Nalcity), veteran AL leader and incumbent lawmaker Amir Hossain Amu will have a smooth run with no other strong candidate contesting from this constituency.

Partha Sarthi Das, a freedom fighter and resident of Jhalakathi Sadar, said people are losing interest in going to polling stations in a likely one-sided election. BHOLA 1,2,3 and 4

The polls in Bhola are likely to be a onesided affair, with AL aspirants clearly ahead, as there are no strong contestants in all four constituencies.

In Bhola-3, former lawmaker Jasim Uddin is vying independently against AL's Nurunnabi Chowdhury, but locals said he did not campaign actively.

Besides, Biswanath municipality mayor and local AL leader Muhibur Rahman, who got his candidacy back following a High Court order last week, also surfaced into the contest as an independent aspirant.

Trinamool BNP's candidate Abdur

Rab Mallik will also try to give a tough contest.

AL candidate and incumbent lawmaker Habibur Rahman is facing five other contenders, including independent aspirant and AL leader Ihteshamul Huq Chowdhury, and JP candidate Atiqur Rahman.

Atique previously lost to Habibur in the 2021 by-polls, and may not give much contest this time too.

However, the electoral field in the constituency, comprising of Dakshin Surma, Fenchuganj and Balaganj upazilas, has heated up as Ihteshamul, also general secretary of Bangladesh Medical Association, recently alleged that Habibur's supporters have been obstructing his campaign activities. SYLHET-5

AL grassroots rooting for independents

At least three Awami League candidates in Khulna, contesting the upcoming national polls with the "boat" symbol, are facing hurdles to win support of the party grassroots.

21 BARISHAL SEATS 250 centres get ballots a day ahead

All necessary preparations have been completed for holding the national polls in 21 constituencies of six districts under Barishal division.

Meanwhile, 250 of the 2,812 polling stations in the division, are considered risk-prone and located in remote areas, where the ballots will be sent a day ahead.

"The ballots will be sent to risk-prone polling stations in remote locations and riverine areas in the six districts on Saturday," said Md Alauddin, regional election officer in Barishal.

The other 2,568 centres will receive them in early morning on the voting day, he added.

However, around 1,457 polling stations are marked as highly important regarding fear of sabotage, and influence of candidates, after analysing information from previous polls.

Alauddin said they have taken all necessary steps to ensure a free and fair election. "We will shut down voting if we find information regarding violence from any polling station," he added.

Barishal division has 74,23,522 voters, including 37,74,148 men, 36,49,317 women, and 57 hijra voters.

University Teachers' Network rejects national elections

The University Teachers' Network rejected the upcoming election, calling it questionable and suggesting it could lead the country down a dark path. In an open statement

released vesterday, they called for the government to address the escalating political crisis through democratic means.

The statement, signed by Dhaka University Prof Gitiara Nasreen, cites the past two "questionable" elections as evidence of a dangerous trend towards an authoritarian one-party regime.

During this period, the constitutional rights of the people of this country, especially the freedom of expression and demonstrations, and human rights have been violated, the statement read.

"We hoped for a collaborative effort towards a free, fair, and impartial election. However, we are deeply disappointed about the next election, which appears to be designed solely to perpetuate the absolute power of the ruling regime," it added.
