Hasina springs cabinet surprises

Some big names left out as new faces win berth in 37-member council of ministers

In a surprise move, Sheikh Hasina has dropped 30 of her old colleagues, including some heavyweights, to form her new council of ministers that is set to take oath of office this evening.

There will be 15 new ministers in the upcoming council of ministers comprising 37 members, the smallest in recent decades if no other members are inducted.

Hasina will herself take oath today as prime minister for a record fourth straight term, making her the longest serving PM yet in Bangladesh's history.

President Mohammed Shahabuddin yesterday invited Hasina, also the Awami League chief, to form the new government

The other ministers who were shown the door are Social Welfare Minister Nuruzzaman Ahmed, Fisheries and Livestock Minister SM Rezaul Karim, Environment Minister Md Shahab Uddin, Chattogram Hill Tracks Minister Bir Bahadur Ushwe Sing, Land Minister Saifuzzaman Chowdhury and Expatriate Welfare Minister Imran Ahmad.

after AL's win in Sunday's election. Cabinet Secretary Mahbub Hossain unveiled the names of the 37 council of ministers. Other than prime minister, there will be 25 ministers and 11 state

"I have called them to inform about their appointment and congratulated them," he said.

The president will administer the oath at Bangabhaban at 7:00pm.

The portfolios will be distributed later. The 30 ministers, state ministers and deputy ministers dropped from the 48-member outgoing council of ministers include Agriculture Minister Abdur Razzaque, Finance Minister AHM Mustafa Kamal, Foreign Minister AK Abdul Momen, Planning Minister MA Mannan Textile and Jute Minister Golam Dastagir

Among the 30 shown the door are 15 ministers, 13 state ministers and two deputy ministers.

The 25-member cabinet will have 15 new faces, including two state ministers and a deputy minister from the outgoing council of ministers who will now become full minister. The cabinet will also include two technocrats.

Of the 37 members in the new council of ministers, 14 are first timers --

State Minister for Public Administration Farhad Hossain, State Minister for Religious Affairs Faridul Haque Khan and Deputy Minister for Education Mohibul Hasan

Polls lacked participation

Say Australia, Canada; Japan terms election peaceful but cites some irregularities

Canada has expressed its disappointment over the January 7 parliamentary polls, saying the electoral process had fallen short of the principles of democracy and the freedom upon which Bangladesh was founded.

On the other hand, Australia expressed concern over the violence and arrests of the opposition, while regretting that theelection took place in an environment where not all stakeholders could participate meaningfully and substantially. Japan, meanwhile, said the election was held peacefully

though there were some instances of irregularities. Global Affairs Canada in a statement yesterday called on

the relevant authorities to work transparently with all political parties to move forward towards democracy, respect of human rights and fundamental freedoms in line with the interests of the people of Bangladesh.

'Canada commends and supports the democratic aspirations of Bangladeshi citizens and condemns the acts of intimidation and violence that took place ahead of and during the election. We extend our sympathy to all of those who have been affected

Nobody can say election was rigged

Hasina tells rally at **Suhrawardy Udyan**

UNB, Dhaka

Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina yesterday said no one can question the 12th parliamentary election as it was held in a free, fair, and neutral manner.

"Nobody can say ballots were cast at night instead of daytime or votes were rigged during this election. This is because the election was held in a very transparent, free, and neutral manner,"

Addressing a rally at the Suhrawardy Udyan in Dhaka, the premier said her government never interfered in the Election Commission's activities, rather it assisted the commission.

Hasina, also the Awami League president, thanked the administration, law enforcement agencies and the armed forces for assisting the EC in holding the election in a free and fair manner.

She said nobody can hinder the country's advancement as her party is assuming power again following a landslide victory in the January 7 polls.

Bail in 9 cases not enough for Fakhrul's release He is yet to secure bail in 2 more cases

A Dhaka court yesterday granted BNP Secretary General Mirza Fakhrul Islam Alamgir bail in nine cases filed over violence centring the October 28 BNP rally

However, Fakhrul will remain incarcerated as he is yet to secure bail in two other cases for which he has been in jail since October 29, said Sheikh Shakil Ahmed Ripon, one of his lawyers.

JP seeks role of opposition again

GM Quader says polls 'not held in proper manner'; party activists stage demo in the capital for resignation of Quader, Chunnu STAFF CORRESPONDENT

Jatiyo Party Chairman GM Quader has said his party wants to play the role of an opposition party in the 12th parliament.

"We had been on the opposition bench and this time too we want to sit on the opposition bench," he told reporters after taking oath as an MP at the Jatiya Sangsad Bhaban yesterday.

Earlier in the day, several hundred JP leaders and activists staged protests in front of the party chairman's Banani office demanding resignation of Quader and Mujibul Haque Chunnu, secretary general of the party.

Quader said, "We want to play a people-oriented role and raise

public interest issues before parliament."

Asked about the JP's poor showing in Sunday's polls, he said, "The election was not held in a proper manner. In some cases, the
