Families trapped in saline water

Health crisis grips Bagerhat villages, vested groups demanding bribes to install water desalination facilities

A silent health crisis is unfolding in Gulishakhali village in Bagerhat's Morrelganj upazila. Take the case of Putul Akhter, a 32-year-old resident who, along with her family, is grappling with a myriad of health complications, including diabetes, kidney, liver and skin-related issues. Doctors attribute these ailments to the persistent use of saline water for bathing and consumption.

"I consulted doctors multiple times in the last two years. They told me the diseases have developed due to bathing and consuming saline water, and I would not get well if I don't stop using saline water," she said.

Putul lives with her mother-in-law and two children in a small house on the bank of Bhola river, adjacent to the Sundarbans, while her husband lives in Dhaka for work.

"Due to poverty, we are unable to relocate, away from saline water. We don't know how we will survive in this way," she said.

Putul's mother-in-law Shefali Begum has also been suffering from skin and bone diseases for a long time. Their stories are emblematic of a larger problem affecting thousands in Bagerhat's Sadar, Morrelganj, Sharankhola, Mongla, and Rampal upazilas.

This correspondent, after speaking to more than 50 villagers, found a similar pattern of health concerns plaguing the community. The root cause lies in the relentless intrusion of saline water, a consequence of factors such as sea level rise and geographical vulnerability.

"It seems we are living in a salt mine. We have to drink and use saline water all year round except in the monsoon. That is why we are always ill with complications including diarrhoea, dysentery, hypertension, and skin diseases," said Piara Begum of Gulishakhali.

Sakina Begum of Baruikhali village echoed her.

Amzad Hossain, 85, of Guatla village, said,"Around 50 years ago, we could use water of Baleshwar river. Later, salt water of nearby Pashur river gradually started to intrude into the Baleshwar," said Amzad Hossain, 85,

The surge in winter patients has resulted in increased pressure on doctors and nurses at the district hospital, while a bed shortage has forced some patients to receive treatment on the hospital floor.

The re-excavation of seven canals is going on in Barishal to protect the city from waterlogging.

The Tk 6.7 crore project being implemented by Bangladesh Water Development Board, said WDB officials.

Of them, 3km of Amanatganj, 1.7km of Palashpur, 2.35km of Jail, 180 metres of Bhatar, 1.8km of Chandmari, 3km of Sagardi and 1,100 metres of Rupatali canals will be dug up, said WDB Executive Engineer Khalid Bin Walid.

According to Barishal WDB sources, tenders were invited on March 29, 2022 for the project. Later fund related complication caused a delay in it.

JP chairman GM Quader yesterday relieved JP Co-Chairman Kazi Firoz Rashid and JP presidium member Shunil Subho Roy, exercising the power bestowed upon him by the JP charter, the party said in a press release.

GM Quader took the decision a day after several hundred JP leaders and activists staged a demonstration in front of the JP chairman's Banani office, demanding resignation of Quader and secretary general Mujibul Haque Chunnu.

Shrinking rivers **SHRINK LIVELIHOODS**

Boatmen in Lalmonirhat and Kurigram are struggling to remain afloat, facing a situation of seasonal unemployment.

Amid the dry winter, around 26 rivers in the districts, including Brahmaputra, Teesta, and Dharla, have dried up and lost navigability, with shoals

appearing across them. Around 200 ghats in the districts, which remain busy for rest of the year, are now empty, leaving around 1,000 boatmen amid a livelihood crisis.

"I am unable to ply my boat while people are crossing the situation was different. The Teesta on foot. Every year we face a livelihood crisis during navigable, and we could ply dry season," said Julhas Mia, a boatman in Kalmati area of

Lalmonirhat. "Of the seven boatmen in this

ghat, three have started pulling rickshaws, while the other four are also considering joining other professions," he said.
