Comilla's BPL future uncertain

Four-time champions Comilla Victorians are the most successful team in the Bangladesh Premier League (BPL). Under owner Nafisa Kamal, they have been able to establish some form of a brand value, something that the country's lone franchise T20 tournament is yet to see the light of day.

Nafisa feels that BPL franchises do not get the rights that are afforded in other franchise leagues around the world, adding that it will not be possible for Comilla to play the next BPL without revenue-sharing rights, for instance.

As things stand, the broadcasting rights are still difficult to sell and franchises do not have a share of tickets which hinders branding.

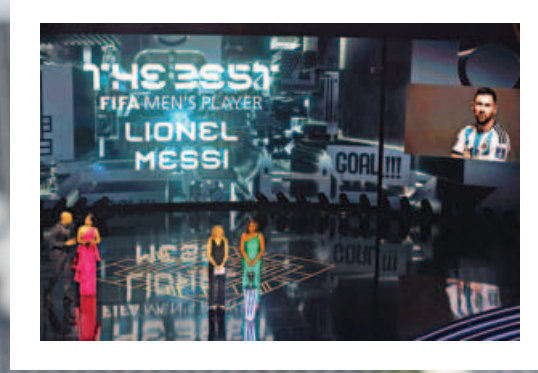
"Not a ticket would remain unsold if we had 50 percent of the ticket selling rights. BCB does not give us the rights, neither media nor ground rights," Nafisa said during a talk with reporters.

"The way a franchise tournament should run on paper, in concept, is not at all applicable to the BPL. We don't get any of the rights that a franchise should have," she added.

At the time of filing this report, a title sponsor was yet to be announced for the BPL. There has been no continuity of title sponsors, unlike what is seen elsewhere with Tata Indian Premier League or KFC Big Bash.

"How does it not hamper? Our task would have been easier if BPL had proper brand value in the market, or had BCB gotten a consistent sponsor for 10 years," she continued.

Nafisa regrets the fact that the leading team owners

How Messi again became THE BEST

In a rather surprising turn of events, Lionel Messi was declared FIFA's best men's player for 2023 in the early hours of Tuesday (Bangladesh time).

The current Ballon d'Or holder was a surprise winner, edging past Erling Haaland and Kylian Mbappe, considering he hadn't done anything substantial since winning the FIFA World Cup with Argentina in 2022, which was not considered for this award.

FIFA's selection criteria for the 2023 men's awards were based on achievements during the period from December 19, 2022 to August 20, 2023.

The 2022 awards had covered the 2022 FIFA World Cup, which ended on December 18.

Still, Messi edged Haaland in the voting by the barest of margins.

There were four separate votes conducted, with each contributing 25 per cent of the overall result.

The journalists voted overwhelmingly in favour of Haaland. The Norwegian also topped in the votes of the national team coaches while Messi topped among the national team captains.

Every coach and captain under FIFA could vote for three players, awarding five points to their first pick, three to their second and one to their third.

There was also a public vote, which Messi won by a landslide.

After the voting, Messi and Haaland were tied on 48 points while Mbappe had 35.

picked Haaland as his first choice, followed by Kylian Mbappe, who finished third, and fellow countryman Julian Alvarez.

Mbappe, who also voted as the captain of France, named former PSG teammate Messi as his first choice, followed by Haaland and Manchester City midfielder Kevin de Bruyne.



As per FIFA's tie-breaking rules, Messi was then declared the winner because he had received the highest number of five-point scores from the votes cast by the men's national team captains.

Haaland couldn't cast a vote as he is not the captain of Norway.

In the coach's category, Messi picked his former Barcelona coach and the current Manchester City manager Pep Guardiola as the first choice, who won in the category, followed by current Barca coach Xavi and Italy coach Luciano Spalletti.

Nasir slapped with two-year ban

Bangladesh all-rounder Nasir Hossain was banned by the ICC on all cricket on Tuesday until April 2025 after accepting charges of breaching the ICC Anti-Corruption Code while playing in the Abu Dhabi T10 League in 2021.



Nasir, who was charged by the ICC in September 2023, admitted to three charges and has been handed a two-year ban, with six months suspended.

The ban follows an investigation into seven other players and officials for reported breaching of anti-corruption rules and alleged match-fixing during the tournament.

The 32-year-old failed to tell anti-graft officials of the "receipt of a gift" of a new iPhone 12, valued at \$750, and the "full details of the approach or invitation he received to engage in Corrupt Conduct" via the phone, the ICC said.

He also admitted he had "failed or refused" to cooperate with the anti-graft officials in the probe into possible corruption.

"Subject to him satisfying the conditions in respect of the suspended part of the sanction, he will be free to resume international cricket on 7 April 2025," an ICC statement read.

Nasir will be free to resume international cricket on April 7, 2025, provided he satisfies the conditions in rest to the suspended part of the sanction.

He played 115 matches for Bangladesh across formats between 2011 and 2018, scoring 2695 runs and taking 39 wickets. He has since featured largely in the domestic circuit, most recently turning out in the Dhaka Premier League for Prime Bank Cricket Club.

Scaloni to stay on as Argentina coach

Lionel Scaloni will stay on as Argentina's coach at least until the end of this summer's Copa America, where the country will defend their title, local media reported on Monday.

The news comes after the Argentina FA President Claudio Tapia met with Scaloni to discuss the national team's upcoming friendlies in China ahead of the June 20-July 14 continental tournament in the United States.

Scaloni had cast doubt over his future in the post in November, saying: "It's complicated to keep going and it's complicated to keep winning."

Roma sack Mourinho

Jose Mourinho has been sacked as coach of Roma, the Serie A side announced Tuesday, saying it was "in the best interests of the club".

Mourinho, whose contract was due to expire in June, would leave the club alongside his technical team "with immediate effect", Roma said. The 60-year-old Portuguese took over in 2021 and guided Roma to the inaugural Europa Conference League trophy in 2022 and the final of last season's Europa League.

However Roma have struggled this campaign and currently sit ninth in Serie A. Former Roma captain Daniele De Rossi replaced the Portuguese in the Roma hotseat.

Washington hits season's first hat-trick

Brazilian forward Washington Brandao scored the season's first hat-trick as Abahani began their Federation Cup campaign with a 6-0 demolition of Brothers Union at the Bashundhara Kings Arena yesterday. Cornelius Stewart scored twice while Nabib Newaj Jibon scored the other for the Sky Blues. Defending champions Mohammedan, meanwhile, earned a 2-1 win over Chittagong Abahani. **Read the full stories on The Daily Star website
