The boat of hope

Floating school project for Manta children comes to an end

Four years flew by, children of the Manta community dared to dream. Then on a chilly winter morning, it all came to an end, rather abruptly.

The children woke up that day and witnessed the boat, which had arrived at the riverbank with promise of education, departing the area, leaving them in tears.

Harassment of Yunus must end 12 US senators urge Hasina

Twelve US Senators have written a letter to Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina urging her to end what they said the persistent harassment of Nobel Peace Prize Laureate Professor Muhammad Yunus.

They called for ending the pattern of "abusing the justice system" to target critics of the government more broadly.

For more than a decade, Prof Yunus has faced more than unsubstantiated cases brought against him in Bangladesh, the senators said in the letter on Monday.

Those who signed the letter include US Senate Majority Whip Dick Durbin (D-IL) and US Senator Todd Young (R-IN), along with US Senators Tim Kaine (D-VA), Dan Sullivan (R-AK), Jeff Merkley (D-OR), Jeanne Shaheen (D-NH), Ed Markey (D-MA), Sherrod Brown (D-OH), Peter Welch (D-VT), Sheldon Whitehouse (D-RI), Ron Wyden (D-OR), and Cory Booker (D-NJ).

The senators wrote that the UN High Commissioner Human Rights Volker Türk and human rights organisations such as Amnesty International have noted irregularities in proceedings against Yunus, including the most recent six-month prison sentence for allegedly violating the country's labour laws.

Speakers tell event

Compared to men, women are less aware of the Right to Information Act and use it even less, which bars them from actively participating in the decision-making process, said speakers at a project launch event yesterday.

With access to information, women can easily take advantage of opportunities and make more effective decisions about land use and ownership, agricultural practices, private enterprise, and education, they said.

The Carter Center, Information Commission, and USAID jointly launched the project titled "Advancing Women's Right of Access to Information in Bangladesh" (AWRTI) at the commission's headquarters in the

This project will be implemented in 10 districts till 2028 to unlock the potential of people, especially marginalised women, to fully utilise the RTI Act 2009.

Dr Abdul Malek, chief information commissioner, said, "Many women continue to face barriers to accessing critical information. The advancement of women's right to access information is a societal need. It is about developing a Bangladesh in which every woman has the tools she needs to shape her destiny, contribute to her SEE PAGE 4 COL 4

Will address confusion over textbook content Says education minister

Education Minister Mohibul Hasan Chowdhury yesterday said any confusion over the content in a new textbook will be addressed through the opinions of curriculum specialists. He said this while talking to reporters at his secretariat office.

The comments came in the wake of BRAC University terminating Asif Mahtab Utsha, an adjunct faculty member in the philosophy department, for criticising the inclusion of transgender issues in the class seven textbook.

About the issue, he said, "We will discuss the matter with BRAC University after talking to UGC Responding to journalists' queries, he said he

will also engage with the National Curriculum and Textbook Board (NCTB) about the issue. "If there is any confusion regarding the content, we will investigate the matter," he added.

"In our country, there is a tendency for certain groups to exploit religion to create anarchy and instability," he said.

67pc lawmakers are businesspeople Says Shujan report on current JS

Ninety percent of the 12th parliament's elected lawmakers hold assets exceeding Tk 1 crore, according to a report by Shushashoner Jonno Nagorik.

Of the 299 MPs in the current parliament, 269 have assets above Tk one crore, it said. A total of 193 MPs have assets worth over Tk 5 crore, while 200 lawmakers (67 percent) are businesspeople by profession, according to the data unveiled by Shujan at a virtual press


conference. "The number of lawmakers who have over Tk 1 crore of assets has been increasing gradually," said Dilip Kumar Sarkar, Shujan's central coordinator.

In terms of yearly income, 111 lawmakers earn over Tk 1 crore annually, while 51 lawmakers earn Tk 50 lakh per year.

Meanwhile, Shujan found that 230 MPs pay income taxes, and of them, 95 pay over Tk 10 lakh as income tax per year.

"İn many cases, the declarations of assets and income of the lawmakers do not match their tax returns. Election Commission and other institutions concerned should look into it," said Shujan Secretary Badiul Alam Majumder.

Regarding educational qualifications, Shujan found that 136 have a master's degree, while 111 completed graduation, 37 have an SEE PAGE 4 COL 7


A discussion will be held today to honour the milestone of 100 years since eminent litterateur, journalist, and politician Abul Mansur Ahmad's initiation into journalism.
