# Focus on clean cooking for healthier future

Speakers tell roundtable

Speakers at a roundtable yesterday opined Bangladesh should focus more on clean and modern cooking technologies considering the health hazards to women and children, and the environmental impact posed by traditional methods.

"Clean cooking is not only a technical shift, but also a very critical step towards a sustainable and healthier future for communities," said Ismene RAC Stalpers, country director at SNV Bangladesh.

"With over 30 million people in Bangladesh still dependent on firewood, we need to think about how to move towards renewable energy," she said

"We are targeting businesses and small-medium enterprises in the higher-tier clean cooking -- the tier two and above categories. We believe that we can strengthen the ecosystem in Bangladesh through e-cooking (electric cooking)," Ismene added.


Nirod Chandra Mondal, joint secretary to the Renewable Energy Wing, Power Division of the Ministry of Power, Energy, and Mineral Resources, pointed out the challenges for Bangladesh in this context.

"Our present electricity generation mix is mostly gas-based. About 50 percent is gas-based generation, while the rest is from coal, diesel or heavy fuel oil, with some from renewable energy," he said.

"If you want to make the countries shift to clean cooking processes, then you have to convert the entire power generation mix from fossil fuel to

renewable energy," he said. "If we can generate 40 percent of electricity from renewable sources, it will significantly pave way for a clean cooking system. About 80 percent of our people live in rural areas. If we convert solar energy for cooking purposes, then it will be a great

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# HC seeks list of courtrooms with metal cages

The High Court yesterday sought a list of courtrooms across the country where there are iron cages to keep the accused during case proceedings.

It ordered the law secretary to submit the list in 60 days. The HC issued a rule asking the government to explain why they should not be directed to remove the metal cages from the courtrooms and to reestablish wooden docks in courtrooms throughout the country.

The HC bench of Justice Mustafa Zaman Islam and Justice Md Atabullah issued the order and rule following a petition filed by 10 Supreme Court lawyers on January 22.

Advocate Mohammad Shishir Manir, on behalf of the 10 lawyers, submitted the petition and requested the HC to direct the law secretary to submit a report providing list of courtrooms throughout the country where the metal cages have been installed.

The accused persons are imprisoned in an iron cage in open court before being found guilty at trial and the presumption of innocence is being violated, which is also against the existing laws of the country and established international norms, they said in the petition.

Putting someone in an iron cage before the open court is nothing but humiliation and mental torture, they added.

Metro rail services from Uttara North to Motijheel remained halted for over one hour yesterday due to a "technical glitch".

Trains were seen running in both directions since around 4:00pm.

MAN Siddique, managing director of Dhaka Mass Transit Company Limited (DMTCL), said there were problems in the electricity supply, leading to suspension

"The operation resumed after checking the entire line manually. The suspension lasted for around 45 minutes,"

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Families of Benapole Express fire victims await DNA results SAJJAD HOSSAIN

One month... 30 long days have passed since the nation was shaken by the horrifying images of fire victims on Benapole Express on the night of January 5.

The acrid scent of smoke and the desperate screams of passengers are still etched into the memories of the first responders -- mainly locals of Golapbagh -- who rushed in to help with everything they had.

Four people were burned to death and several others injured as miscreants set fire to the train.

However, the bodies are vet to be identified and DNA test results have

not been announced. While talking to the family members, this correspondent saw they are still hoping that their loved ones will return one day, as they

have not been declared dead.

Indrani Sarker's voice was choking with grief when this correspondent visited her recently. Her daughter, Chandrima, a pharmacy graduate, still remains not found".



"My hopes rise every time the phone rings, wondering if it's news about my Chandrima. But a month has gone by, and no one has called. I don't even know where my child is,"

Abdul Haq carries the weight of a father's despair. His son, Abu Talha, a student at Bangladesh Army University of Engineering & Technology, is also missing. Each inquiry, each unanswered question, is a shard of glass tearing his soul.

"We still cling on to the hope of his return, but each day without him feels like a nightmare," said

"Talha's mother is devastated. All of our smiles have disappeared

with him," he said. Asif Khan, his body scarred and spirit broken, grapples with the unbearable absence of his wife, Natasha. He escaped the inferno, but she remained trapped in its nightmarish grip.

### Govt has no plan to arrest Dr Yunus unnecessarily Says law minister

Law Minister Anisul Huq yesterday said the government has no plan to unnecessarily arrest Nobel Laureate Prof Muhammad Yunus or send

"I am telling once again that the government has no plan to arrest him [Yunus]. There are some pending cases against him. First of all, there are some cases filed by NBR and some cases filed under a labour court. These cases will be heard, and the judges will deliver verdicts based on the merits. Of course, the government has the responsibility to execute the verdicts and will do so. But the government has no plan to unnecessarily arrest Dr Yunus or send him to jail," he said.

The minister said these while talking to reporters after inaugurating the 49th foundation training course for assistant judges and equivalent judicial officials at Judicial Administration Training Institute in the capital.
