Student dies amid jaundice outbreak in Rajshahi univ

A Rajshahi University student died of kidney failure and jaundice at Rajshahi Medical College Hospital on Monday evening, say the hospital authorities.

Md Murad Ahmed Mridha, son of Abdul Sattar Mridha of Natore's Boraigram, was a final-year student of mathematics department.

The death occurred when the number of students suffering from iaundice was going up. A total of 131 students were

Daily illegal currency trade amounts to Tk 100cr

Finds ACC team raiding Dhaka airport

UNB, Dhaka

Bangladesh is being deprived of dollars equivalent to Tk 100 crore every day due to illegal buying and selling of foreign currency at the airport, said Mahbub Hossain, secretary of the Anti-Corruption Commission.

The ACC has found evidence that some money changers inside the airport are involved in illegal buying and selling of foreign currency worth more than Tk 100 crore every day and money laundering, he said.

Thousands of expatriate workers and travellers arrive in Bangladesh every day

After receiving information from intelligence sources and following a specific written complaint, an enforcement operation was conducted yesterday under the supervision of the Deputy Director of the Commission Syed Nazrul Islam.

The ACC raids involved the booths of Janata, Sonali, Agrani, Mutual Trust, Pubali, Probashi Kalyan, Jamuna banks and the money changers Etiya Money Exchange and Imperial Money Exchange at the Hazrat Shahjalal International Airport.

More Myanmar troops take refuge

Myanmar envoy handed protest note; foreign minister says death of Bangladeshi unacceptable

At least 264 members of Myanmar forces and border guards had taken refuge in Bangladesh as of yesterday, fleeing the ongoing battle between Myanmar troops and the armed group called the Arakan Army.

As many as 114 of them crossed the border vesterday morning, and 35 others came later, according to Mohammad Ashrafuzzaman Siddiqui, director general of the Border Guard Bangladesh (BGB).

'We gave them shelter and provided them with food," he said, adding that eight of the 15 injured were taken to hospitals in critical conditions. The shelter seekers include members of immigration police and other agencies, said Shariful Islam, public relations officer of the BGB, adding that the BGB members disarmed them and took them to safety.

Meanwhile, Foreign Minister Hasan Mahmud yesterday said it was unacceptable that people were dying

and getting injured in Bangladesh because of the conflict in Myanmar. In addition, a group of at least 24 Myanmar nationals with firearms went to the Palongkhali area of Ukhiya, Cox's Bazar, around 10:30am, said local Union Parishad Chairman

Gafuruddin Chowdhury. They had four machine guns. They shot a Bangladeshi, and hurt four others in a grenade attack when the villagers tried to stop them from entering," he said.

One of the locals, named Anwar,

was taken to Cox's Bazar Sadar Hospital in a critical state. It is unclear which group these men belong to, he said.

Shamim Hossain, officer-in-charge of Ukhiya Police Station, said some of the men could be from the Rohingya refugee camps.

As of last night the 24 men were detained at the Union Parishad In Bandarban district, which has borders with Myanmar, officials turned Ghumdhum Government Primary School into a makeshift

shelter for families who were forced to flee their homes because of the fighting at the borders. The fighting rages on and mortar shells and bullets have been

crossing the border in recent days.

4 die as bus goes against traffic, runs over threewheelers, bike

At least four people were killed and six others injured when a bus, going on the wrong side of Dinajpur-Rangpur highway, ploughed into pedestrians and hit two rickshaw vans and a motorcycle in Ranirbandar area of Chirirbandar, Dinajpur, yesterday.

The people who died are Abdul Mozid, 50, and Nazrul Islam Nazu, 40, of Chirirbandar; Lataiya Chakma, 52, and Myndo Chakma, 45, of Teknaf upazila of Cox's Bazar, said Tariqul Islam, officerin-charge of Doshmile Highway Police Outpost.

Two of the deceased were on a rickshaw van.

He added that the injured, including a woman and child, were sent to hospitals in Dinajpur and Rangpur.

The people of the Chakma community were visiting the area for business purposes, police said.

Personalities dominate Pakistan polls

Pakistan goes to the polls tomorrow with the jailing of popular former prime minister Imran Khan, the winner of the last national election, dominating headlines despite an economic crisis and other woes threatening the nuclear-armed country.

The South Asian nation of 241 million people is reeling from decades-high inflation and an economy that has come to a grinding

halt as it navigates a tough International Monetary Fund (IMF) bailout programme.

Islamist militancy is on the rise and relations with three neighbours India, Afghanistan and Iran - are frayed. But these matters have been mostly absent from the election fray, in which the parties of Khan and Nawaz Sharif, another former prime minister, are the main rivals.

"This election cycle has had little discussion of issues," said Husain Haqqani, a former Pakistani ambassador to the US, currently a scholar at Washington's Hudson

But despite being in jail and his party decimated by legal cases, Khan and his candidates. running on independent platforms, remain a force.

Institute. "It has been a campaign dominated by personalities." Millions of supporters of the jailed Khan are looking to rally behind him despite what they call a military-backed crackdown on him and his party.

The military wields enormous power in Pakistan but maintains it does not interfere in politics. Analysts say Sharif is being backed by the
