PM warns Bangladeshi diaspora

Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina has urged all to thwart the conspiracies of anti-liberation forces, emphasising the importance of unity in sustaining the nation's progress towards prosperity.



"We have been taking Bangladesh ahead towards prosperity. The progress must go on. Stay alert so that no one can push the country back and make it the country of Razakars," she said.

The prime minister said this while addressing a reception accorded by the Bangladeshi diaspora in Germany at Hotel Burgerhaus Garching at Munich on Friday.

She also asked all to stay alert against conspiracies against the people of Bangladesh.

She reiterated her commitment to build Bangladesh as a secular state, where people of every faith will enjoy equal rights.

"We will materialise the dream of the Father of the Nation to transform Bangladesh into a prosperous, developed and smart Sonar Bangladesh in the spirit of the Liberation War and secularism," she said.

The prime minister said her goal is to serve every citizen of the country.

"Before my personal needs, I always think of what I can do for the betterment of the country and its people," she said.

Country sees Covid death for 2nd straight day

For a second consecutive day, Bangladesh witnessed another Covid-19 death in the last 24 hours till 8:00am yesterday.

A patient died at a private hospital in Dhaka. With this, nine Covid-related deaths were reported this year, according to the Directorate General of Health Services.

The number of fatalities now stands at 29,486 since the beginning of the Covid 19 pandemic in 2020, taking the overall fatality rate to 1.44 percent.

Another 48 new cases have been reported in last 24 hour and the total number of confirmed cases now stands at 20,47,844.

The Covid-19 infection rate slightly dropped to 7.48 percent yesterday from Friday's 9.03 percent. The overall positivity rate currently stands at 13.08 percent.

'Now govt trying to take over Yunus' orgs'

Alleges BNP leader Selima Rahman

The government, not satisfied with the harassment of Nobel laureate Professor Muhammad Yunus, is now trying to take over his organisations, alleged BNP standing committee member Selima Rahman yesterday.

"Today, people are seeing the government's authoritarian side. How the organisation of a Nobel laureate is being occupied. Not only have they harassed him... they have also fully taken control over his Grameen Telecom... rural organisations," Selima said at a rally in front of Jatiya Press Club.

Pointing fingers at the government's use of state apparatuses to silence critics, she said, "You cannot say anything to the police, you cannot say anything to Rab. You won't get justice anywhere."

Speaking as chief guest, she said prices of commodities continue to spiral out of control, making it difficult for people to feed their families.

"How can a common man feed his family? I belong to a middle-class family but I also feel that we have become helpless," she said.

"The government says every day that prices will come down. I say they won't come down... their syndicate will

Fateh Ali Chowdhury no more

Fateh Ali Chowdhury, a freedom fighter and one of the members of the Crack Platoon, passed away yesterday afternoon. He was 75.

"Crack Platoon", as the squad was known, conducted extremely dangerous operations on army convoys and important installations in Dhaka lawlessly during the Liberation War. Each successful operation demonstrated that the long-cherished independence was just a matter of time.

He died from old-age complications and pneumonia at a Dhaka hospital, said Habibul Alam Bir Pratik, a fellow freedom fighter.

57 'members' of teen gangs held in Dhaka, Savar

The Rapid Action Battalion claimed to have arrested 57 suspected members of teen gangs from Dhaka and Savar areas.

Of them, the Rab-2 arrested 36 teen gang members from Mohammadpur, Adabar and Hazaribagh areas in the capital on Friday, said Rab-2 Commanding Officer Additional DIG Md Anwar Hossain.

Among them, five are from "Patali" and "Lou Thyala" groups each, six from "Level High" and "Chan" groups each, seven from "Maura Imran" group and remaining seven are members of other groups.

During the raid, local weapons including machetes and knives were seized from them.

The Rab official said that the "Patali group" has been operating for a long time under the leadership of Sujon Mia alias Forma Sajib. Now they are divided into two-three groups due to infighting among themselves. The "Level High" group is led by Sharif alias Mohan.

They used to carry out extortion, robbery and other criminal activities in Mohammadpur, Adabar, Beribadh and Dhaka Udyan areas, he added.

Meanwhile, the Rab-4 arrested 21 members of teen gangs from Mirpur, Darussalam and Savar.

Shraddha of Preeti Urang held

The "Shraddha" of Preeti Urang, 15, from Moulvibazar's Kamolganj upazila, who died after falling from the eighth-floor flat of The Daily Star's Executive Editor Syed Ashfaquul Haque on February 6, was held yesterday.

The rites are performed between the 11th and 31st day after death.

The ritual was observed at her birthplace in the Halki village of Mirtinga Tea Garden.

As part of the rite, the male family members of Preeti, according to their rituals, shaved their heads while all the family members took a bath at a river.

Besides, people from the Urang community of the district visited her house.

The case over Preeti's death is being investigated by the Detective Branch of police.

Ashfaquul and his wife are now in DB custody.

No alternative to adequate climate funding

There is no alternative to strong global partnerships, collective action and more fund to developing nations to deal with climate change impacts, Foreign Minister Hasan Mahmud said yesterday.

He said the flow of climate financing for the developing countries is gradually shrinking but it is the need of the hour to ensure adequate funding for these countries to reach climate goals.

The minister made the call while speaking at an event titled "Cause and Effect: A Two Front Battle against Climate Change" held on the sidelines of the Munich Security Conference last evening.

He said Bangladesh is one of the most vulnerable countries, despite being the country with one of the lowest carbon emissions (0.48 percent of global emissions).

At the same time, he said, Bangladesh is also identified as a unique example to the world in dealing with climate change.

Norway's International Development Minister Anne Beathe Tvinning, Pakistan's Foreign Minister Jalil Abbas Jilani, United Arab Emirates' Minister of Climate Change and Environment Mariam Binte Mohammed Saeed Almhairi and other panelists reiterated the importance of global concerted efforts to deal with the climate issues.
