

Prevent misuse of power

President tells judges

UNB, Dhaka

President Mohammed Shahabuddin yesterday urged all judges to closely monitor and prevent any misuse of power.



"Power and responsibility are coined together. Power must be exercised to perform duties. Again, showing responsibility is a must in exercising power," he said.

He was addressing the inaugural session of the International Conference on South Asian Constitutional Courts in the Twenty-First Century: Lessons from Bangladesh and India at the inner courtyard of Supreme Court in Dhaka.

Chief justice of India Dhananjaya Y Chandrachud spoke at the session as the guest of honour, while Chief Justice of Bangladesh Obaidul Hasan presided over the programme.

Law, Justice and Parliamentary Affairs Minister Anisul Huq, Attorney General Abu Mohammed Amin Uddin, President of Momtaj Uddin Fakir also spoke at the event.

Bangladesh sees one more Covid death

Bangladesh saw another Covid-19 death in the last 24 hours till 8:00am yesterday, reports UNB.

So far, DGHS has reported 11 Covid-related deaths this year.

With the new numbers, the country's total fatalities rose to 29,488 and caseload to 2,048,149, according to the Directorate General of Health Services (DGHS).

The daily case test positivity rate stood at 11.12 percent as 289 samples were tested, said the DGHS.

The recovery and death rates remained unchanged at 98.39 percent and 1.44 percent, respectively.

Due to a sudden rise in infection rate from the beginning of this year, the government has decided to administer Covid-19 vaccines again.

Advising people to use masks as a precaution at high-risk places such as hospitals or medical centres, DGHS in a press release said the new type of Covid-19 Jn.1 infection has increased in several countries around the world.

DNCC receives approval for land to construct a multi-storey truck terminal, says mayor

Honking horns blend with frustrated shouts of office goers, students and patients stuck at gridlocks – this is the daily reality of the Mayor Anisul Huq Road (Tejgaon-Satrasta).

money, as rickshaws barely move through that. Besides, the lanes have narrowed down the road further, increasing traffic jams rather than solving it.

Also, trucks and pick-ups parked on the road have extensively damaged the dividers set up to

hand of the truck terminal, said truckers start parking on the main road at 7:00pm and usually keep them till 8:00am.

Tofazzal Hossain Mazumdar, president of Bangladesh Truck Covered-Van Owners Association, said every day around 5,000

Mayor Atiqul Islam announced plans to construct a multi-storey truck terminal and held a meeting with the leaders of truck owners' association to solve the problem.

It has been eight years since the late mayor made efforts to clear the road of illegally parked trucks, but the owners and workers remain undeterred.

Trucks of all sizes, from lumbering giants to nimble pickups, line both sides of the road throughout the day, contributing to congestion. The status quo only worsens after dusk.

A separate rickshaw lane, supposedly constructed to reduce traffic on the road, has only turned out to be a waste of

create the lanes, leaving them essentially non-functional.

Trucks are parked on the road, due to lack of space at the truck stand near it. When Dhaka North City Corporation conducts drives against illegal parking, truckers clear the road but return soon after, said Md Helal Uddin, owner of six trucks.

Mohammad Kasem, a helping

trucks come to the terminal, but they can accommodate only 3,000 of them, and the rest remain on roads adjoining the terminal.

He said if the government provides them land to keep trucks, they will not keep them on the roads.

PROMISE OF PERMANENT SOLUTION
On December 30, 2020, DNCC

The Daily Star that it will not be possible to keep the road clear until DNCC cannot provide a permanent solution.

"I informed the prime minister that without obtaining land for a truck terminal, a permanent solution cannot be achieved," said the mayor.

"Around 3.5 acres of BTRC land and 1.5 acres of National Housing Authority land are currently available. The premier has approved us to use those

DNCC demolishes 10-storey building

It occupied 70pc of Lautola canal land

The Dhaka North City Corporation yesterday demolished illegal structures including a 10-storey under-construction building on the bank of Lautola canal at Mohammadpur's Basila in Dhaka.

The under-construction building occupied 70 percent of the canal, said DNCC officials.

DNCC zone-5 regional executive officer Motakabbir Ahmed led the eviction drive in presence of Mayor Atiqul Islam.

Besides, 1,500 volunteers of BD Clean, a voluntary organisation, assisted DNCC in cleaning the canal at the same time.

Regarding encroachment, the mayor said anything constructed within 100 feet of the canal will be demolished. "The canals will be restored to their previous form by freeing them from pollution and encroachment," he said.

Apart from the under-construction building, two other one-storey buildings were also demolished. Mohammad Mahe Alam, chief property officer of DNCC, said the eviction drive will continue.

144 irregular migrants return home from Libya

The government yesterday brought back 144 irregular Bangladeshi migrants from north African country Libya.

A chartered flight of Buraq Air carrying the migrants landed at Hazrat Shahjalal International Airport in the capital around 4:00am, the foreign ministry said in a press release.

With them, a total of 1,390 Bangladeshis has been brought back home from Libya since July last year, it added.

These migrants had been "detained" at various locations, including "detention centres" in Tripoli and Benghazi, the release adds.

They were brought back home with the support of International Organisation for Migration (IOM). Upon their arrival, officials from the foreign ministry and IOM greeted them at the airport.

Besides, IOM provided Tk 6,000 each and some food to the returnees.

Attending the repatriated migrants at the airport, Mostofa Jamil Khan, director (welfare) of the foreign ministry, stressed generating awareness among people to avoid irregular paths of migration.

US keen to deepen ties with Bangladesh

'Bangladesh needs to realise dynamics of ongoing conflict'

Bangladesh needs to understand the dynamics of the ongoing conflict within the Chin and Rakhine states of Myanmar, said speakers at a discussion yesterday.

Bangladesh Institute of Peace and Security Studies (BIPSS) hosted the policy circle discussion titled "Is Myanmar Unraveling? Implications for Bangladesh and the Region" at a hotel in the capital.

"We need to understand the overall developing situation or conflict situation in Myanmar with a particular focus on Rakhine and Chin," said BIPSS President Maj Gen (ret'd) ANM Muniruzzaman.

Rakhine is not only important for Bangladesh, but it is also important for China, India, and other major powers in the world, he added.

"The reason it is important to China is because they have a deep sea port in Kyaukphyu, which is vitally important to China for its energy security. For India, it has got the Kaladan Multi-Modal Transit Transport Project, for which the bordering

states of Chin and Rakhine are vitally important," said Muniruzzaman.

Shafiqat Munir, BIPSS senior research fellow, highlighted the urgency of understanding the dynamics in the neighbouring country beyond the Rohingya crisis.

Md Touhid Hossain, former foreign secretary, characterised the ongoing situation in Myanmar as a nascent civil war, with the Tatmadaw facing both armed insurgencies and civilian opposition.

Touhid also emphasised the strategic importance of resource control and the Rohingya issue for Bangladesh.

Addressing the event, Maj Gen Md Shahidul Haque, former defence attaché to Myanmar and former ambassador to Libya, asserted that Myanmar would not disintegrate, contrary to some speculations.

Instead, he envisioned a scenario where the Tatmadaw would eventually renegotiate with the EAOs, emphasising the importance of understanding the
