Harmful waste generation set to jump Warns UN

Waste produced by the public will surge by 2050, causing hundreds of billions of dollars of damage through biodiversity loss, climate change and deadly pollution, the United Nations Environment Programme (Unep) said in a report yesterday.

The report said unless urgent measures were taken global waste generation would soar, driven largely by fast-growing economies, including in Asia and sub-Saharan Africa where many countries are already struggling to manage current production levels.

Unep projected the cost at USD640 billion annually by the middle of the century, representing a more than 75 percent increase compared to 2020, when the world produced an estimated 2.1 billion tonnes of municipal solid waste, which excludes industrial waste.

Of the total, USD443 billion would be externalities, including biodiversity loss, climate-altering gases produced by the breakdown of organic waste and pollution that contributes to between 400,000 and one million deaths per year, the report said.

The report, released during this week's UN Environment Assembly in Kenya, warned humanity has "moved backwards" over the past decade, "generating more waste, more pollution and more greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions."

Waste prevention measures and improved waste management could reduce those costs.

SWEDEN'S NATO ACCESSION

Moscow says will take military-technical steps

Use frozen Russian profits to arm Ukraine, EU chief asks

Russia said yesterday it would adopt unspecified military-technical and other counter measures to protect itself against Sweden joining Nato, a move it cast as aggressive and as a mistake.

Sweden cleared a last hurdle towards Nato accession on Monday after Hungary's parliament approved membership of the traditionally neutral country.

Meanwhile, European Commission President Ursula von der Leyen yesterday said that the European Union should consider using profits from frozen Russian assets to buy military supplies for Kviv.

"It is time to start a conversation about using the windfall profits of frozen Russian assets to jointly purchase military equipment for Ukraine," she told the European Parliament in a speech urging the EU to do more on defence policy.

"We will closely monitor what Sweden will do in the aggressive military bloc, how it will realise its membership in practice ... based on this, we will build our response with retaliatory steps of a militarytechnical and other nature," Maria Zakharova, a spokesperson for the Russian Foreign Ministry, said.

"Sweden's accession to Nato is accompanied by the ongoing fuelling of anti-Russian hysteria in the country, which, unfortunately, is encouraged by the Swedish political and military leadership, but its main source is abroad. It is not the Swedes themselves who are making the choice; this choice has been made for the Swedes."

Sweden's move to join Nato was fuelling tensions and militarisation, she added. Russia's embassy in Stockholm had also spoken of unspecified military and technical counter measures on its Telegram account on Tuesday depending on the extent of Nato troops and materiel deployments inside Sweden.

Swedish PM Ulf Kristersson said Russia's comments were not surprising and indicated his country was unfazed.

"That's what they said when Finland joined Nato," as well," news agency TT reported Kristersson as saying during a trip to the town of Trollhatten in southern Sweden. "It is well known that Russia doesn't like the fact of either Sweden or Finland being Nato members, but we make our own decisions."

THREATS OVER GAZA

UK boosts lawmakers' security

The UK government announced a multimillion-pound package yesterday to boost the security of elected lawmakers who say they face increasing threats.

The £31 million (\$39 million, 36 million euros) in extra funding over the next year comes as some British MPs have been targeted over their stance on the Israel-Hamas war.

It also comes with the country due to head to the polls in a general election expected later this year.

Under the new provisions, lawmakers will have access to a dedicated police contact to discuss security while those most at risk could seek bodyguards, the interior ministry said.

"None of us should have to accept that enduring hate crimes, harassment, or threats is part of the job," interior minister James Cleverly said in a statement.

British MPs have expressed growing concerns about their safety amid a surge in anti-Semitic and Islamophobic incidents since the conflict in Gaza broke out on October 7.

Prime Minister Rishi Sunak said MPs had been "verbally threatened and physically, violently targeted", with "legitimate protests hijacked by extremists".

Conservative MP Mike Freer, who represents a large Jewish area, revealed last month that he would not seek re-election because of a spate of threats and an arson attack on his office.

South Korea, Japan birth rates fall to all-time low

South Korea's birth rate fell to a record low last year, the government said yesterday, despite having poured billions of dollars into efforts to encourage women to have more children and maintain population stability. The country has one of the world's longest life expectancies and lowest birth rates, a combination that presents a looming demographic challenge. Neighbouring Japan is grappling with the same issue, and on Tuesday the fast-ageing nation announced that the number of births there had also dropped to a new low in 2023. South Korea's fertility rate the number of children a woman is expected to have in her lifetime -- dropped to 0.72 in 2023, down nearly eight percent from 2022, according to preliminary data from Statistics Korea. This is far below the 2.1 children needed to maintain the current population of 51 million, which at these rates will nearly halve by the year 2100, experts estimate. The government has spent vast amounts on trying to encourage more babies, offering cash subsidies, babysitting services and support for infertility treatment. But the birth rate has continued its chronic decline.

'ABUSE OF POWER' Malaysia reinstates charges against exPM Muhyiddin

A Malaysian appeal court yesterday reinstated charges of abuse of power against opposition leader and former Prime Minister Muhyiddin Yassin, state news agency Bernama reported. A Kuala Lumpur high court had thrown out the four charges and acquitted Muhyiddin in August, ruling those had not detailed his alleged offences. Muhyiddin, who led Malaysia for 17 months between 2020 and 2021, had pleaded not guilty and had called the charges politically motivated. However, a three-member Court of Appeal bench yesterday unanimously ruled that the case against Muhyiddin be returned to a sessions court for further action, Bernama reported. The court found the charges were unambiguous and there was no necessity to give further details on the alleged offences. Muhyiddin's office did not immediately respond to a request for comment on the decision.
