Digital finance can ensure double-digit **GDP** growth

Say speakers at seminar organised by Star and PRI

Bangladesh's economy can grow by double digits through the inclusion of unbanked people by way of digital financial services, said speakers at an event.

Only 34.4 percent of total private investment was financed by the formal financial system, while 61.4 percent came from non-formal channels such as own savings and informal borrowing, said Bazlul H Khondker, chairman of the South Asian Network on Economic Modelling (Sanem).

"So, there is a huge percentage of people out of the formal financial services," he said at a roundtable discussion on "Economic and social impact of digital financial inclusion," jointly organised by The Daily Star and the Policy Research Institute at The Daily Star Centre yesterday.

The average rate of interest on borrowing from informal sources is 40 percent, which is higher than banks, non-bank financial institutions, non-governmental organisations and microfinance institutions.

Borrowers can avail loans easily from informal sources, said Khondker, also a director of PRI.

The Bangladesh Bank increased funds for digital nano loans to Tk 500 crore from Tk 100 crore in 2023 to bring the unbanked people under the digital financial umbrella.

However, people are still unaware about the digital nano loan that is being disbursed by bkash in partnership with City Bank, Dhaka Bank and Bank Asia.

If digital financial inclusion is ensured, it would increase employment by 1.8 to 3.04

million and investment in rural areas by 15.8 percent, he said. On the other hand, the poverty rate will come down to 15.8 percent from the existing 18.7 percent, Khondker added.

The DFS was a new horizon with a sophisticated model, said Mashiur Rahman, the economic affairs adviser of the Prime Minister.

"We are always keeping the informal sector out of the discussion. But the informal sector is most important in terms of GDP growth. If the relationship between the informal sector and the formal sector is 20 percent, that will be a huge jump in terms of GDP," he said.

TROOP DEPLOYMENT IN UKRAINE Putin warns West of nuclear war risk

President Vladimir Putin warned yesterday of a "real" risk of nuclear war if the West escalates the conflict in Ukraine, offering a defiant and emboldened stance in his annual speech to Russians.

Speaking in Moscow, Putin said his soldiers were advancing in Ukraine and warned the West of "tragic consequences" for any country that dared to send troops to Kyiv.

"They have announced the possibility of sending Western military contingents to Ukraine... The consequences for possible interventionists will be much more tragic," he said in his address to the nation.

"They should eventually realise that we also have weapons that can hit targets on their territory. Everything that the West comes up with SEE PAGE 2 COL 6


Police have found preliminary evidence that Murad Hossain Sarkar, a teacher of Vigarunnisa Noon School and College, sexually harassed a student.

Three previously unknown moons discovered

Astronomers have discovered three previously unknown moons around Uranus and Neptune, the most distant planets in our solar system.

The find includes one moon spotted orbiting Uranus - the first discovery of its kind in more than 20 years – and two detected in Neptune's orbit.

"The three newly discovered moons are the faintest ever found around these two ice giant planets using ground-based telescopes," said Scott S Sheppard, astronomer at the Carnegie Institution for Science, in a statement. "It took special image processing to reveal such faint objects."

Malaysia to repatriate workers sans documents Several hundred **Bangladeshis held**

Malaysia begins its Repatriation Migration Programme (MRP) today, enabling undocumented migrant workers to be sent back to their home countries without facing prosecution.

Malaysia took up the programme amid crackdowns against the irregular foreign workers.

Immigration The Department arrested 14,361 such migrants from Jan 1-Feb 23, its directorgeneral Ruslin Jusoh told the Malaysian newspaper, The Star.

The department will continue its crackdown on undocumented migrants,

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
