## World resource extraction could surge 60pc by 2060 **UN warns**

Extraction of Earth's natural resources could surge 60 percent by 2060, imperilling climate goals and economic prosperity, the UN said yesterday, calling for dramatic changes in energy, food, transport and housing.

Enormous expansion of infrastructure, energy demand and consumer consumption over the last half century, particularly in wealthier countries, has driven a tripling of the world's use of materials, according to the 2024 Global Resource Outlook by the UN Environment Programme's International Resource Panel.

And the hunger for natural resources -- everything from food to fossil fuels -- keeps growing by an average of more than 2.3 percent per year, it said.

People in wealthy countries drive most of that demand, using six times more materials and responsible for ten times more climate impacts than those in low-income countries, according to the analysis.

Extraction and processing of the huge amount of resources accounts for over 60 percent of planetwarming emissions, the report said, as well as devastating ecosystems and harming human health.

Lead author Hans Bruyninckx said the current trajectory would cause the world to far exceed the temperature limits set out in the 2015 Paris Agreement, in which countries agreed to cap global warming "well below" two degrees Celsius and preferably at 1.5C.

But he acknowledged that natural resources will be needed "to turn things around", both to boost development in poorer nations and to provide the minerals and metals needed for the energy transition.

The report follows an agreement by countries at UN climate negotiations last year in Dubai, to triple global renewable energy capacity this decade and "transition away" from polluting fossil fuels.

# Pakistan parliament elects speaker amid pro-Imran protests

Pakistan's new parliament elected a speaker yesterday, despite protests from lawmakers loyal to jailed ex-prime minister Imran Khan three weeks after an election they claim was brazenly rigged.

Sardar Ayaz Sadiq of the military-backed Pakistan Muslim League-Nawaz (PML-N) party was elected by parliamentarians from his party and a handful of others in a coalition pact shutting Khan's followers out of power.

The 336-seat National Assembly convened on Thursday for the first time since Pakistan's February 8 elections, and the alliance is slated to vote in PML-N's Shehbaz Sharif as prime minister on

## Over a billion people worldwide are obese WHO study says

More than a billion people globally are now considered obese, a condition linked to an increased risk of numerous serious health problems, according to updated estimates from the World Health Organization and an international group of researchers. Obesity is so prevalent it has become more common than being underweight in most nations, including many low and-middle income countries that have previously struggled with undernourishment. "A staggering number of people are living with obesity," said Majid Ezzati, senior author of the paper published in The Lancet on Thursday and a professor at Imperial College London. The findings, considered among the most authoritative of independent estimates, are based on data from more than 220 million people in more than 190 countries. While obesity rates are plateauing in many wealthier countries, they are rising rapidly elsewhere, Ezzati added. "In the past, we have been thinking of obesity as a problem of the rich. Obesity is a problem of the world," said Francesco Branca, head of nutrition at the WHO, in a press conference. Obesity rates for adults more than doubled between 1990 and 2022, and more than quadrupled among children and adolescents aged 5-19, the paper said.

### **MYANMAR'S RAKHINE STATE** 12 killed in market shelling Says rebel militia

At least 12 civilians were killed in Myanmar when artillery shells landed in a busy market in western Rakhine State, as the ruling military and anti-junta forces traded blame for the latest violence to rock the Southeast Asian country. The insurgent group Arakan Army (AA) operating in Rakhine State, which borders Bangladesh, said that a military warship off the port city of Sittwe fired shells into Myoma market on Thursday, killing 12 and injuring more than 80 people. The junta published a statement on state TV channel Myawaddy, claiming the shells were fired by the AA. It did not confirm the number of casualties. Reuters was not able to independently verify the incident. Sittwe and other towns in Rakhine are facing information blackouts as the junta has reimposed internet and mobile data curbs in the state.

The bomb disposal team of the Counter Terrorism and Transnational Crime unit of police also visited the scene.

Its chief Rahmat Ullah Chowdhury said, "Power cables in the entire building are burnt. This usually happens when power lines short out

and cause a fire.' He added that the cables he saw did not have the capacity to supply power to the seven restaurants and many other shops.

Over time, these wires weaken due

to overload, he said.

We had not seen any exploded gas tanks during the inspection. But some of the tanks must have leaked, causing the fire to spread rapidly. We are investigating, and maybe we will be able to give a clearer explanation Chowdhury, chief of the five-member probe body of the Fire Service and Civil Defence, said the fire was first noticed at a cafe called Cha Chumuk, and the plastic pipe used for gas transmission was found there.

"We suspect there was an illegal gas connection to the cafe. We requested Titas Gas to check it.'

There were a large number of cooking gas tanks, that had probably leaked, worsened the situation, he added.

There was neither an emergency exit nor fire extinguishers in the

building, he said. Selim Miah, general manager

(operations) of Titas Gas Transmission and Distribution Company Limited, said, "A team is checking whether there was an illegal gas connection to the building."
