Gaza's hungry await aid

Crowds of men ran through rubble-strewn Gaza City streets past fires and bullet-riddled cars in hope of reaching a rare aid convoy, risking their lives to get food for starving families as famine looms five months into Israel's military campaign.

Last week the Palestinian health ministry in Hamas run Gaza said Israeli forces killed 118 people trying to get aid from a convoy near Gaza City with survivors saying they were shot at.

The deaths drew a new focus on what has gone wrong with aid in Gaza, where the UN complains of "overwhelming obstacles", while Israel says it is doing all it can and that the UN is ultimately responsible for delivery.

"Is there a father in the world who can see his children writhing in hunger in front of him and remain silent, even if the price is risking his life?" said Ahmed al-Talbani, looking for the aid in Gaza City, shouting and gesticulating as he spoke in a video obtained by Reuters. Trucks have crushed people, tanks crushed people, shells rained down on people, machine guns were fired over people's heads. Does this satisfy anyone," he said. Despite hunger approaching catastrophic levels in parts of Gaza, and large quantities of aid sitting waiting in warehouses to be delivered, the flow of supplies has slowed to a trickle.

Some convoys have been seized by people seeking food, and any convoys moving into northern Gaza require Israeli coordination for safe conduct through checkpoints and areas with fighting. "All we are asking for is safe passage so that we can deliver aid," said Jenny Baez, emergency response officer at UNRWA. Before the conflict, Gaza relied on 500 trucks entering daily. The Palestinian refugee agency UNRWA said on Friday that during February an average of nearly 97 trucks were able to enter Gaza each day.

Detentions foil Delhi protest Indian farmers say

Dozens of protesting Indian farmers were detained en route to New Delhi yesterday, forcing them to call off their plan to converge on the capital in their demand for higher crop prices, protest leaders said.

Protest leaders had planned to resume the protest yesterday. Farmers started moving towards Delhi but had been stopped by police in some states, said a statement from the Samyukta Kisan Morcha (Non-Political), or United Farmers' Front, one of the two groups leading the protests.

Fifty farmers from one district in the northern state of Rajasthan were taken into custody on Tuesday night while others travelling to Delhi by train from the same state were detained at a police station yesterday, farmer leaders told reporters. Rajasthan police denied detaining any farmers.

7 killed in occupied Ukraine Says Moscow, jails journalist for criticising offensive, dismisses ICC arrest warrants

Seven people were killed yesterday in separate incidents in the eastern Ukrainian region of Lugansk under Russian control, Moscow-installed authorities announced.

Five civilians were killed when the bus they were travelling in hit a mine and two more were killed by alleged Ukrainian shelling, authorities said.

"There was a tragedy in the city of Kirovsk in the Lugansk People's Republic a bus travelling to a cemetery exploded on a mine," governor Leonid Pasechnik said.

"Five people were killed," he added in a comment on social media.

Another official said separately that Ukrainian forces had shelled the town of Kreminna around 70 kilometres (43 miles) further north, killing two civilians.

Russian forces. It is one of four regions that Moscow claimed to have annexed in 2022, in votes not recognised by Kyiv or its allies.

Meanwhile, a Russian court sentenced a journalist to seven years in prison for criticising the Ukraine offensive in social media posts.

Roman Ivanov, 51, was found guilty of spreading "false information" about Russia's armed forces and punished under Moscow's strict military censorship laws.

Moscow has used laws against "discrediting" the armed forces or publishing "false information" to stamp out public criticism of its full-scale military offensive on Ukraine.

"Peace and freedom," Ivanov shouted as he left the courtroom after the sentence. The Kremlin yesterday said it did not Court's arrest warrants for two senior Russian officers over their actions in the Ukraine conflict.

The court accused lieutenant general Sergei Kobylash and navy admiral Viktor Sokolov of targeting Ukraine's power infrastructure with strikes between October 2022 and March 2023.

"We don't recognise this," Kremlin spokesman Dmitry Peskov told reporters. Russia is not a party to the Rome Statute that established the ICC, he said.

President Vladimir Putin in March last year, a ruling that Moscow called "void". Russia levelled its own warrant against the ICC's president in response.

2023 deadliest for migrants in 10 years: IOM

At least 8,565 people died on migration routes worldwide in 2023, making it the deadliest year since records began a decade ago, the UN's International Organization for Migration said yesterday.

"The 2023 death toll represents a tragic increase of 20 percent compared to 2022, highlighting the urgent need for action to prevent further loss of life,' the IOM said in a statement. Last year's total surpassed the previous record reached in 2016, when 8,084 people died

during migration. Mediterranean The ocean crossing continues to be the deadliest route for migrants, with at least 3,129 deaths and disappearances registered last year.

Slightly more than half of the total migrant deaths in 2023 came as a result of drowning, with nine percent caused by vehicle accidents, and seven percent in violence.

Repatriate 'IS bride' **UN experts urge Britain**

A group of United Nations experts yesterday urged Britain to repatriate a woman stripped of her citizenship after leaving the country aged 15 to marry an Islamic State fighter. Shamima Begum, now 24 and living in a refugee camp in northern Syria, lost an appeal last month against the decision to remove her British citizenship. A group of five UN special rapporteurs voiced deep concern at the February 23 ruling, and urged Britain to provide Begum with protection -- including repatriation and review the decision to revoke her citizenship. "Begum remains stripped of her citizenship, vulnerable, and denied assistance and protection as a possible victim of trafficking," the experts said. "Protections owed to victims of trafficking and those at risk of trafficking, especially children, must be respected to be meaningful," they said. Begum, whose family is of Bangladeshi origin, left her east London home for Syria with two school friends in 2015.



The fire service classifies buildings as "highly risky' or "risky" based on certain criteria, such as the number of staircases for entries and exits. width of the staircases, the number of fire extinguishers present, availability of fire hydrants, and the capacity of water reservoirs.

Bangladesh Government (BG) Press High School was marked "highly risky".

Located in Tejgaon the industrial area of the capital -- the school has two buildings, one with three floors and another with four. Around 1,200 students

of the school use a single staircase in each building.

During a visit on Tuesday, correspondents these found no fire extinguishers, fire emergency exits, buckets, or fire hydrants on the school campus, though the school was listed as "risky" for potential fire hazards since 2017.

Anjuman Ara Laiju, the school's headmaster, was surprised that the school regularly. was listed as risky.

known earlier.' Lt Col Mohammad Tajul Islam Chowdhury, director (operation & maintenance) of the Fire Service and Civil Defence, said there was no way the school authorities were not informed as the inspection itself requires approval from them.

Dinomoni Sharman, deputy director of the fire service, reiterated, "It's not possible to issue letters to all the institutions. But we describe the risky condition in the presence of the headmasters during our inspection.

We try to make them aware of the safety measures [that need to be taken] like multiple staircases, presence of fire extinguishers and fire buckets.

In 2018, Ahsanullah University of Science and Technology in Tejgaon was also marked "highly risky". There are over 6,000 students and around 2,500 of them attend classes

Although the university "We were unaware of the has fire extinguishers, a number of those were found with no expiry date stickers.

supervising the structure, told The Daily Star, "May be the stickers aren't there, but all the extinguishers have expiry dates. "There was also no central

fire safety alarm earlier. We have already submitted an updated fire safety plan to the fire service. Once it's approved, we will take

proper steps." Lt Col Tajul Islam said, "We don't have the authority to conduct drives by ourselves. We do it jointly with Rajuk and the city corporation concerned.

"We are working tirelessly to create awareness among students by providing training at different schools and colleges.

The Daily Star found two government schools Narinda Govt High School and Dhaka Govt Muslim High School in Laxmibazar with fire safety equipment. fire The service issued warnings to these institutions five years ago, but no measures were taken.

Md Delowar Hossain Mazumder, chief engineer at Education Engineering Department, told The Daily

school and college buildings around 20 to 25 years ago. Fire safety issues like stairs. entries, and exits were not on the list nor discussed.

"However, these measures will be taken during the constructions of new school buildings.'

Education The Engineering Department tasked with the development of educational infrastructures.

About taking measures in the older buildings, he said, "Once we hand over a building, the sole responsibility to maintain it lies with the school authorities. We can provide technical support if they seek our assistance.'

Delowar also said they have informed the Rajuk about the fire safety issues in school and colleges. "Rajuk will now see whether the building needs complete re-construction or retrofitting is enough."
