CONTROLLING COMMODITY PRICES

Ensure fair competition in market: experts

Ensuring market competitiveness is necessary to control the spiralling price of commodities instead of government's intervention, said speakers at a discussion yesterday.

They also said flawed market management or syndicate of the merchants are not the only reason for hike in price of commodities.

They made the remarks at a roundtable discussion on "Commodity prices, market management and competition," organised by Bangladesh IP Forum at Azimur Rahman conference centre of The Daily Star Centre yesterday.

The price of daily essentials can rise due to various reasons, such as inflation, increase in dollar price, increase in price of raw material, fuel, or inclement weather conditions such as heavy rain or drought, said Prof Md Helaluddin of economics department at Dhaka University.

"Product pricing, market regulation, fair competition and protection of consumer interest are very important for the economic growth of the country. Producers, suppliers and consumers can all benefit from a strong market ecosystem by ensuring supply of products stay equal

with market demand, and maintaining a competitive environment," he also said.

He said the market will become automatically stable in one stage if it is allowed to run on its own instead of intervention.

If the market system works properly, the price of commodities does not increase without effective reasons, such as cost of production, he also said. He added that a strong market system will reduce poverty, increase investment, and generate employment.

Prof Helaluddin alleged that policymakers and regulatory bodies often take decisions without understanding market behaviour, which in turn brings negative impact in the market and ultimately the consumers suffer.

Around 80 percent of people in the country are hit hard by the ongoing hike in commodity prices, said Md Khaled Abu Naser, former director of Bangladesh Competition Commission.

If the market syndicates can be rooted out then most of the problems can be solved, he opined.

However, in some cases, high prices encourage investors and create new entrepreneurs, which help generate

Bangladesh Federal Union of Journalists and Dhaka Union of Journalists yesterday demanded release of journalist Shafiuzzaman Rana of Sherpur.

On March 5, a mobile court jailed the Nakla correspondent of Dosh Ruptantor for six months for "misbehaving" with a government official while he was trying to collect information through the RTI Act from the UNO office.

In joint statement signed by BFUJ President Ruhul Amin Gazi, Secretary General Kader Gani Chowdhury, DUJ President Md Shahidul Islam, and General Secretary Khurshid Alam condemned the incident expressing concern over the sentencing.

Such repression not only curtails the journalist's right to information but is also an obstacle to press freedom, said the statement.

C-section: When exception becomes a norm

Around 45pc of country's total births are being done through emergency procedure; 84pc done in private clinics

Caesarean sections or C-sections, a lifesaving procedure which is done in special cases during birth, have become a norm in Bangladesh, especially in private clinics, data show.

Of the 3.6 million babies born in Bangladesh in 2022, over 1.6 million or nearly 45 percent were born through C-sections, according to data from the National Institute of Population Research and Training, putting both the mothers and the children at unnecessary health risks.

In 2004, the rate was only around four percent, according to statistics from the Bangladesh Institute of Development Studies.

According to Save the Children, between 2016 and 2018, the number of C-sections rose by 51 percent, a rise that experts blamed on the lack of regulation and profit-mongering of private clinic owners.

In 2021, around 84 percent of total C-sections were performed in private hospitals and clinics, according to a report of Bangladesh Demographic and Health Survey in 2022.

To put things into perspective, the rate of C-section was 21.5 percent in neighbouring India as of 2021. Similarly, C-section rate ranges between 16 percent and 22 percent in Pakistan, Nepal and Myanmar.

The World Health Organisation (WHO) recommends that C-sections should not exceed 10 to 15 percent of total births in any nation.

According to Save the Children, between 2016 and 2018, the number of C-sections rose by 51 percent, a rise that experts blamed on the lack of regulation and profit-mongering of private clinic owners.

However, C section rate is high in many of the developed nations as well. For example, nearly 32 percent of all institutional deliveries in the US are done through a C-section, while this figure is 33 percent for Australia, 28 percent for Canada and 35 percent for China. In Bangladesh, C-section deliveries cost

\$250, roughly equivalent to Tk21,121, on average, while a normal delivery costs only \$60 or roughly Tk5,069, according to a 2019 report published by the International Centre for Diarrhoeal Disease Research, Bangladesh.

Such out-of-pocket expenditures are a huge burden on the poor, the study added.

WHY C SECTIONS ON THE RISE

Despite the risks and monetary burden, C-sections are booming uncontrollably in the country.

The influences of brokers and a class of doctors are encouraging people to have caesareans, according to the 2022 report of BIDS. The rate of Caesarean delivery was 52 percent in private medical facilities, while it was 10.6 percent in public medical facilities.

Other factors like maternal age, maternal and paternal education, working status of the mother, and wealth status among others contribute to rising C-sections, it added.

"Some unscrupulous doctors encourage patients for C-sections only to derive financial benefits," Dr Ishtiaq Mannan, neonatal

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3.80cr have kidney diseases in country

Even though there are an estimated 3.8 crore people with kidney diseases in the country, the awareness on how to prevent the disease is still low, physicians told a discussion yesterday.

National Professor AK Azad Khan, president of the Diabetic Association of Bangladesh, said people often ignored the messages spread through awareness campaigns on kidney health, diabetes and high blood pressure.

People may pay heed to the campaign messages if they are told properly. Research should be done to figure out how these campaigns can be done so as to make an impact on the people, he said.

The discussion was organised by Kidney Awareness Monitoring and Prevention Society (KAMPS) at Jatiya Press Club.

The government has taken an initiative to detect patients in villages, the speakers said, urging the government to introduce insurance for kidney patients.

The prime minister's personal physician Prof ABM Abdullah said, "Uncontrolled blood pressure and diabetes lead to kidney diseases. Special emphasis should be given on preventing measures."

Prof Robed Amin, line director (non-communicable disease control) at the health directorate, said according to an estimation made two years ago, there were 3.8 crore people with kidney diseases. Of them, 40,000 to 50,000 people have kidney failure.

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Of honey-trap, abduction, and ransom

6 arrested, 1 victim rescued

The Detective Branch (DB) of Dhaka Metropolitan Police claimed to have arrested six members of a syndicate involved in abducting and extorting the country's wealthy individuals, and rescued a victim.

Harun Or Rashid, additional commissioner (DB) of DMP, disclosed the arrest and the activities of the syndicate yesterday at a briefing.

The arrestees are: Jewel Rana, 37, the ringleader; Mahmud Hossain, 34; Golam Rabbi, 30; Masum Sarker, 28; Lavli, 37; and Syma, 18.

The syndicate employed women to lure their targeted persons in a honey-trap, and bring them to a pre-arranged location in the name of meeting in-person, before confining them.

The syndicate members would then make a clone copy of the victim's phone number and communicate with his family for ransom, asking for payment in cryptocurrency through dollar payment.

The DB claimed to have unearthed the syndicate during a shadow investigation into the abduction of Liton Mia, 40, a garment trader, who came to Dhaka from Brahmanbaria on February 27, following a complaint filed with Dhaka's Kotowali Police Station in this connection.

The detectives first arrested Jewel from Uttara. Based on information gleaned from him, they arrested three others and rescued Liton 10 days after the abduction,

UAE keen to strengthen bilateral ties

Says foreign ministry

The United Arab Emirates (UAE) has expressed its keen interest in transforming bilateral ties with Bangladesh into a partnership level.

UAE Foreign Minister Sheikh Abdullah bin Zayed Al Nahyan showed this interest at a bilateral meeting with his Bangladesh counterpart Dr Hasan Mahmud on Friday evening at the royal palace in the city of Al Ain in Abu Dhabi, a foreign ministry press release said yesterday.

During the meeting, the UAE foreign minister emphasised signing the Comprehensive Economic Partnership Agreement (CEPA) between his country and Bangladesh and activating the Joint Business Council (JBC) with Dhaka to build the economic partnership.
