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Shakib's sister embroiled in Indian betting scandal!

Bangladesh all-rounder Shakib Al Hasan's sister Jannatul Hasan Ritu's name came up in the Mahadev App investigation - an online betting scandal in India – according to a couple of Indian media outlets.

The media outlets said that Jannatul was a business partner of one of the high-profile arrestees of the investigation who was recently nabbed by the law enforcement agency.

India Today reported yesterday that Enforcement Directorate (ED), the agency which has been investigating the scandal, arrested Girish Talreja and Suraj Chokhani, close associates of one of the promoters of Mahadev

app, Hari Shankar Tibrewal, on Friday. According to ED, Chokhani invested in an app called 11wicket. com in Bangladesh and Jannatul was one of his partners.

Shakib or his sister are yet to give a statement about the issue.

Dengue meanest this lean period

Experts fear situation may worsen if immediate steps not taken

The number of dengue cases recorded this January and February is higher compared to the first two months of the previous 23 years, raising the spectre of another deadly outbreak of the mosquitoborne disease.

The total number of cases logged in January and February this year was 1,454 and that of deaths was 17. Till March 7, the cases rose to 1,455 and deaths to 18.

Experts fear the number may rise further in the months to come if effective steps are not taken to contain the menace.

According to the Directorate General of Health Services (DGHS). 1,055 dengue cases and 14 deaths were recorded this January, and 339 cases and three deaths in February.

Last January, the numbers of cases and deaths were 566 and six. Last February, they were 166 and three. The country saw the first dengue outbreak in 2000, when 5,551 cases and 93 deaths were recorded. Last year, the total number of cases was 3,21,179 and deaths 1,705.

According to DGHS data, since 2000, outbreaks took place in 11 three in February 2016, 59 in separate years, including 2024. One dengue case was recorded in

January 2005, 13 in January 2016, 92 in January 2017, 26 in January 2018, 38 in January 2019, 199 in January 2020, 32 in January 2021, 126 in January 2022 and 566 in January 2023.

Meanwhile, seven dengue cases were recorded in February 2014, February 2018, 18 in February 2019, 45 in February 2020, nine in

February 2021, 20 in February 2022 and 166 in February 2023.

No dengue cases were recorded in the years apart from the aforementioned ones.

Entomologist Manzur A Chowdhury said it is alarming that the number of cases and deaths in these two months is almost double compared to January and February of last year. "However, this is the lean period and it is the right time to take effective measures to stop the number from getting any higher."

The authorities concerned, he said, have to identify Aedes mosquito - localities with active transmission - by collecting the addresses of the patients currently suffering from the infection.

"Identifying clusters is very important during the lean periods to control dengue as during this time it is easy to find clusters and neutralise them. But when it spreads during the rainy seasons, it becomes very tough to control."

Conducting anti-mosquito drives by using larvicide and adulticide, along with cleanliness drives and awareness campaigns in the identified localities, is a necessity now, he said, adding that unfortunately there is no sign of such efforts yet.

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JP splits again, Raushan new faction chief

Around five thousand councilors and delegates elected the new leadership and approved the new committee of Jatiyo Party.

Archeologists in Turkey say they have discovered the world's oldest known bread, dating back to

A largely destroyed oven structure was found in an area called "Mekan 66," where there are adjoining mudbrick houses, at the archeological site of Çatalhöyük in the southern Turkish province of Konya, according to Turkey's Necmettin Erbakan University Science and

Technology Research and Application Center (BİTAM). Around

archeologists found wheat, barley, pea seeds and a palm-sized, round, "spongy" residue, it said in a press release Wednesday. Analyses determined that the organic residue 8,600-year-old, uncooked, fermented bread. "We can say that this find

at Catalhövük is the oldest bread in the world," archeologist Ali Umut Türkcan, head of the Excavation Delegation and an associate professor at Anadolu University in

Turkey, told Turkish state news outlet Anadolu Agency Wednesday. "It is a smaller version of a loaf of bread. It has a

finger pressed in the center, it has not been baked, but it has been fermented and has survived to the present day with the starches inside. There is no similar example of something like this to date," he added. Scanning electron microscope images showed

air spaces in the sample, with the sighting of starch grains "eliminating our suspicions," biologist Salih Kavak, a lecturer at Gaziantep University in Turkey, said in the release.

Almost half the positions in BR vacant

Struggles to deliver quality services

Despite hiring over 5,000 employees over the last 15 months, the Bangladesh Railway (BR) is functioning with half the workforce it needs, which is significantly limiting its ability to deliver quality services to passengers.

According to BR data, the state-owned rail transport agency currently employs 24,403 people out of a total of 47,637 authorised positions, leaving 23,234 posts vacant. Of the vacant posts, 20,666 are for third- and fourthgrade employees, who make up the majority of the BR

workforce, officials said. BR began hiring non-gazetted staff members for the third and fourth grades in 2022, around five years after the recruitment process was suspended due to a lack of recruitment rules. The move came after new recruitment rules for BR were approved in November 2020.

However, because of the staffing gap created as many senior employees went into retirement in the meantime, BR is still operating with only half of its approved workforce, despite this initiative.

The manpower crisis deepened after the launch of several new trains in the last few years as part of BR's plans to expand its service, officials said.

The situation will further deteriorate when BR starts SEE PAGE 7 COL 2

Tigers lose series as Lankan rivalry fuels

Bangladesh succumbed to a 28-run defeat against Sri Lanka in the third and final T20I in Sylhet yesterday, failing to win their first-ever T20I series against the island nation. However, the rivalry between the two teams has gained new grounds ahead of the ODI series.

The visitors, who restricted the hosts to 146 all out after posting 174 for seven, brought out a 'timed-out' celebration while posing with the trophy -- pointing to their wrists in reference to Angelo Mathews' dismissal against Bangladesh in last year's ODI World Cup.

Following such Bangladesh skipper Najmul Ĥossain was asked whether the team would want to be aggressive going forward to the ODI series, beginning on March 13.

"There is nothing to handle aggressively. I feel that what they had done with the 'timed-out
