

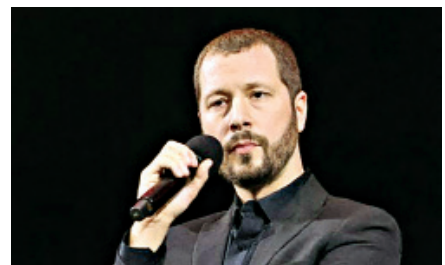
## 'Would exchange Oscar for no war' Says Ukrainian director after academy award win

Ukrainian director Mstyslav Chernov, who on Sunday won the first Academy Award for his country for the "20 Days in Mariupol" documentary about the Russian siege of the port city, said he would rather have no Oscar and no war waged against his country.

Chernov, a video journalist for The Associated Press, shot the film during the first days of Russia's 2022 invasion in Ukraine when trapped in Mariupol with a team of journalists. On Sunday, the film won the Oscar for best documentary feature.

"This is the first Oscar in Ukrainian history, and I'm honoured," Chernov said in a powerful acceptance speech to



a standing ovation.

"But probably I will be the first director on this stage who will say I wish I never made this film. I wish to be able to exchange this to Russia never attacking Ukraine, never occupying our cities... but I cannot change history. Cannot change the past."

Mariupol became a byword for horror during a nearly three-month-long Russian siege of the strategic port city between March and May 2022, with trapped civilians forced to bury their dead by the roadside.

At least 8,000 people were killed by fighting or war-related causes during the siege, one of the biggest battles of the nearly two-year war between Russia and Ukraine, the Human Rights Watch said in February.

# Russia producing thrice more than US, Europe for Ukraine

Russia appears on track to produce nearly three times more artillery munitions than the US and Europe, a key advantage ahead of what is expected to be another Russian offensive in Ukraine later this year.

Russia is producing about 250,000 artillery munitions per month, or about 3 million a year, according to Nato intelligence estimates of Russian defense production shared with CNN, as well as sources familiar with Western efforts to arm Ukraine. Collectively, the US and Europe have the capacity to generate only about 1.2 million munitions annually to send to Kyiv, a senior European intelligence official told CNN.

The US military set a goal to produce 100,000 rounds of artillery a month by

the end of 2025 — less than half of the Russian monthly output — and even that number is now out of reach with USD 60 billion in Ukraine funding stalled in Congress, a senior Army official told reporters last week.

"What we are in now is a production war," a senior Nato official told CNN. "The outcome in Ukraine depends on how each side is equipped to conduct this war."

Officials say Russia is currently firing around 10,000 shells a day, compared to just 2,000 a day from the Ukrainian side. The ratio is worse in some places along the 600-mile front, according to a European intelligence official.

The shortfall comes at perhaps the most perilous moment for Ukraine's war effort since Russia first marched on Kyiv

in February 2022. US money for arming Ukraine has run out and Republican opposition in Congress has effectively halted giving any more.

Ukraine is struggling not just with ammunition but also growing manpower shortages on the front lines.

"The number one issue that we're watching right now is the munitions," the Nato official said. "It's those artillery shells, because that's where Russia really [is] mounting a significant production advantage and mounting a significant advantage on the battlefield."

Russia is running artillery factories "24/7" on rotating 12-hour shifts, the Nato official said. About 3.5 million Russians now work in the defense sector, up from somewhere between 2 and 2.5 million before the war.

## LATAM FLIGHT 50 injured as passengers 'flew through cabin'

At least 50 people travelling in a LATAM Airlines LTM flight from Sydney to Chile via Auckland suffered injuries yesterday after a "technical problem" caused a "strong movement", the New Zealand Herald reported, citing the airline. It landed at Auckland airport as scheduled last afternoon, according to FlightAware. The newspaper quoted a passenger who said she experienced a "quick little drop" during the flight.

One person is in a serious condition while the rest had suffered mild-to-moderate injuries, a spokesperson for healthcare services firm Hato Hone St John, which treated roughly 50 people at the airport, said. The aircraft is an eight-year-old Boeing BA.N 787-9 Dreamliner, according to flight tracking website FlightRadar24, and stops in Auckland on its way to Santiago. Boeing said it was working to gather more information and will provide any support to the airline. A spokesperson for the South American airline told the Herald there had been a "technical problem" on flight LA800.

## Chinese research vessel spotted off India

A second Chinese research vessel in two months has been spotted near India's coast, adding to New Delhi's anxiety over possible military intelligence-gathering in its backyard. The two Asian superpowers have uneasy ties, with a military standoff on their Himalayan border since mid-2020 and a war fought between them in 1962. The Xiang Yang Hong 01 was seen off India's eastern coast over the weekend, according to an Indian security official, a geo-intelligence researcher and ship tracking information. It follows a similar ship's docking at a Maldivian port last month. Both are owned by units of China's natural resources ministry. Beijing says the vessels carry out ocean-bed surveys for peaceful scientific reasons only and dismisses any concerns as ungrounded fear-mongering. But Indian officials worry the vessels could also gather information that may be of use to China's military, including for submarine deployments.

## 'CATASTROPHIC' CLIMATE RISKS

# Europe must do more: EU

Europe could suffer "catastrophic" consequences from climate change if it fails to take urgent and decisive action to adapt to risks, a new EU analysis warned yesterday.

Areas in southern Europe are most at risk, the European Environment Agency (EEA) said in its first report on the risks the continent faces from climate change, driven by human burning of fossil fuels.

The dangers include fires, water shortages and their effects on

agricultural production, while low-lying coastal regions face threats of flooding, erosion and saltwater intrusion.

"Many of these risks have already reached critical levels and could become catastrophic without urgent and decisive action," the agency said.

That doesn't mean northern Europe is spared the negative impact, as floods in Germany and forest fires in Sweden have demonstrated in recent years.

"Extreme heat, drought, wildfires, and flooding, as experienced in recent

years, will worsen in Europe even under optimistic global warming scenarios and affect living conditions throughout the continent," the EEA warned.

"These events are the new normal," EEA director Leena Yla-Mononen told a press briefing ahead of the report's release.

"It should be the wake-up call. The final wake-up call," she added.

The report lists 36 risks related to climate in Europe, 21 of which demand more immediate action and eight were "particularly urgent."

## China, Russia, Iran hold joint naval drills

The navies of China, Russia and Iran are staging joint drills in the Gulf of Oman this week, Beijing said yesterday.

The military activities — conducted from yesterday through Friday — are aimed at "jointly maintaining regional maritime security", according to a statement published on social media platform WeChat by China's defence ministry.

"China will send... guided-missile destroyer Urumqi, guided-missile frigate Linyi and comprehensive supply ship Dongpinghu to participate in the exercise," the statement added, without providing further details.

Drills in the area were held in March last year between the same three countries under the name "Security Bond 2023".

This year's round of joint exercises coincides with soaring tensions in the region as the war in Gaza rages and Iran-backed Huthi rebels in Yemen have launched a flurry of attacks on ships in the Red Sea.

Russian state media reported that a detachment of ships from the country's Pacific Fleet, led by the Varyag cruiser, arrived at the Iranian port of Chah Bahar on Monday ahead of the drills.

"The practical part of the exercise will take place in the waters of the Gulf of Oman in the Arabian Sea," Russian news agencies cited the defence ministry as saying.

"The main purpose of the manoeuvres is to work out the safety of maritime economic activity."
