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### TREATMENT ABROAD Govt to decide on Khaleda's plea by Mar 25 Says law minister

The government will take a decision by March 25 on the application seeking extension of the suspension of BNP Chairperson Khaleda Zia's jail sentence and permission for her to go abroad for treatment, the law minister said

"I have read the application. But I have not yet given my opinion on the application as I am thinking about this issue. The decision on the matter will be given by March 25," Law Minister Anisul Huq told The Daily Star.

On Monday, the law minister told reporters at his Secretariat office, "You will have to wait till Tuesday [yesterday] to know the decision on the application." He said the application and relevant

files reached him on Monday. Khaleda was freed from jail on March 25, 2020 after the government suspended her jail sentence for six months.

### Hong Kong passes tough national security law **Introduces penalties** for crimes related to treason, insurrection

Hong Kong legislators unanimously passed a new national security law yesterday, introducing penalties such as life imprisonment for crimes related to treason and insurrection, and up to 20 years' jail for the theft of state secrets.

The law, which the United States, Britain and the European Union have warned could further curtail freedoms in Hong Kong, was fast-tracked through the legislative process.

"Today is a historic moment for Hong Kong," city leader John Lee said after the vote, adding the law would come into effect Saturday.

The government's previous attempt to introduce Article 23 -- as it is commonly referred to -- was in 2003, but it was dropped after half a million Hong Kongers took to the streets in protest.

## Ship with futuristic sails saves tonnes of fuel in first test

A cargo ship equipped with high-tech sails saved up to 11 tonnes of fuel per day, according to findings from a six-month test of the technology.

The Pyxis Ocean, owned by Japanese automaker Mitsubishi, was retrofitted with two WindWings sails in August 2023 and has since passed through the Atlantic Ocean, Indian Ocean and Pacific Ocean.

"In near optimum sailing conditions, during an open sea voyage, the Pyxis Ocean achieved fuel savings of 11 tonnes per day," said John Cooper, chief executive of BAR Technologies, who developed the sails.

"And while the Pyxis Ocean has two WindWings, we anticipate the majority of Kamsarmax vessels will carry three wings, further increasing the fuel savings and emissions reductions by a factor of 1.5."
