Woman gangraped for 25 days in Mohammadpur

A 23-year-old woman had been shackled and gang-raped for 25 days in Mohammadpur.

She was rescued on Saturday after she managed to get the attention of locals by screaming. The locals then called in the police.

The woman shared a flat with a roommate who was allegedly complicit in the crime.

Three men took turns to rape her over the 25 days. They forced her into sexual acts and taped the abuse with the intent to release the footage, the victims said in the first information report.

She was shackled the entire time and only unchained when she had to be fed or use the toilet.

Mahfuzul Haque Bhuiyan, the officer-in-charge of the Mohammadpur Police Station said, "The victim is currently undergoing treatment and forensic examination at a hospital."

A case has been filed against her roommate, and suspects Saan, 26, Rocky, 29, and Himel, 27.

According to the FIR, her roommate introduced her to Saan. The five hung out on February 21 and on February 23, the three men visited the victim's flat around 4:30pm.

According to the FIR, Saan entered the victim's room and tried to establish a sexual relationship with her. After being refused, he promised to marry her and then raped her, the FIR read.

The three then left for the day.

Saan returned on February 27 and raped her again. On March 5, the trio returned to the victim's flat

RESERVE FOREST Bid to stop soil theft costs forest officer his life

A dumper truck carrying stolen earth from a reserve forest crushed a forest officer to death in Cox's Bazar early yesterday when the official tried to stop the vehicle.

Sazzaduzzaman, 30, of Munshigani's Gajaria upazila, was a beat officer of Dochhari Forest Beat of Ukhiya range under Cox's Bazar South Forest Division.

Forest guard Mohammad Ali, who was also injured in the incident, was undergoing treatment at the Cox's Bazar Sadar Hospital.

Sazzad and Ali went to Harinmara reserve forest in Ukhiya on a motorcycle around 3:00am. The earth was being taken away from a hill in the forest, said Shamim Hossain, officerin-charge of Ukhiya Police Station, Sazzaduzzaman quoting forest officials.



The two signalled the truck to stop. Instead of stopping, the vehicle crushed them and sped away, said the OC. Sazzad died on the spot, he added.

Gazi Shafiul Alam, officer of Ukhiya range forest department, said the body of Sazzad was sent to the Cox's Bazar Sadar Hospital morgue for an autopsy

Police seized the truck in the evening, he said. "We have identified four to five people involved in the smuggling," he told The Daily Star.

The process of filing a case was underway.

The High Court yesterday ordered the authorities concerned to ensure that the top three executives of Transcom Group can surrender without any hindrance to the court within 72 hours after returning home in a case filed with Gulshan Police Station on March 22.

The HC bench of Justice Md Khasruzzaman and Justice KM Zahid Sarwar gave the order after holding a preliminary hearing on a

writ petition. The three executives are Transcom Group Chairman Shahnaz Rahman, Chief Executive Officer Simeen Rahman, and Head of Transformation Zaraif Ayat Hossain.

Awami League lawmakers, the so-called ALindependent MPs, and AL leaders yesterday blamed each other for friction within the party over upazila

AL lawmakers pointed at the AL leaders, who ran and won as independents in the national polls, for creating feuds in the party while the independents blamed the AL MPs for creating groups of their followers, weakening the party, said sources.

Some ruling party leaders also alleged that the lawmakers were trying to shore up support by backing candidates in the upazila election, the first phase of which is scheduled for May 8.

A meeting was yesterday held between presidents and general secretaries of the party's organisational districts of Chattogram division and central leaders at the AL office in Tejgaon. The party's MPs and ALindependent lawmakers of the Chattogram division were also present.

At the meeting central leaders asked the grassroots to be united and not make the internal feuds worse centring the upazila polls, said sources.

The grassroots leaders, however, told the meeting that the friction within the party would worsen with multiple AL leaders running against each other in the upazila polls. They said this feud started ahead of the national polls.

Some meeting participants proposed extending party support to a single candidate in every upazila.

This year's Eid-ul-Fitr is expected to fall on April 11. The government earlier declared April 10-12 as Eid vacation. For most, the holidays will be extended by two days automatically as April 13 falls on Saturday and April 14 is Pahela Baishakh.

Scientists invent laser that could uncover hidden planets

Undiscovered planets may soon be revealed, thanks to a technological breakthrough by scientists.

Physicists based at Heriot . Watt University in Edinburgh Cambridge University have developed form laser system that allows astronomers to observe tiny changes in the

colour of starlight,

revealing hidden planets

in the process.

Researchers say the technology could also improve understanding of how the universe naturally expands. While astrocombs have been used by

scientists studying the cosmos for several years, they were previously limited mainly to the green-red part of the colour spectrum.

However, the breakthrough will allow scientists to utilise the ultraviolet to bluegreen part of the spectrum, which means they will be able to discover even more secrets hidden in space.

Gaza truce talks to resume in Cairo

77 more Palestinians killed in Israeli strikes

Israeli strikes killed 77 Palestinians in Gaza in 24 hours, health authorities said yesterday, as Egypt hosted an Israeli delegation for a new round of talks in a bid to secure a truce with Gaza's Hamas rulers.

The Israeli military said it killed a senior Islamic Jihad leader in a strike on a command centre in the courtyard of the Al-Aqsa Hospital in central Gaza. There was no immediate comment from Islamic Jihad.

Palestinian health officials and Hamas media said the strike hit several tents inside the Al-Aqsa Hospital, killing four people and wounding several, including five journalists.

32,782 least Palestinians have been killed in Israel's military offensive in Gaza since October 7, according to the health authorities.
