Power shortage more acute in rural areas

Some districts see 25pc supply shortfall due to gas crisis

With the weather getting warmer, power crisis is growing across the country and some rural areas have been experiencing prolonged loadshedding since last week.

Residents of different divisional cities are facing at least an hour of power cuts every day. It is six to seven hours in some rural areas as the mercury hovers around 36 to 38 degrees Celsius in some districts.

The power shortages have also started to affect businesses and irrigation.

As of 3:00pm yesterday, Bangladesh Power Development Board (PDB) generated around 12,700MW electricity against the demand for 14,300MW, which is about 1,600MW shy of the demand.

The situation was similar last week, with highest 1,826MW loadshedding reported on Tuesday, PDB data show.

PDB officials said they are prioritising Dhaka and other divisional cities to supply electricity.

"Except for the two distribution companies in Dhaka [DPDC and DESCO], all five distributors are getting less electricity compared to their demand," a top PDB official told The Daily Star, wishing anonymity.

Bangladesh Rural Electrification Board (REB), the largest power distributor which supplies electricity in rural areas, is getting around 25 percent less than its demand.

More than half the country's consumers are under REB coverage.

The commission now seeks the power to investigate the disciplined forces itself and has

proposed that the law be amended to that end. The founding law of the organisation, National Human Rights Commission Act-2009, restricts the commission from investigating any disciplined forces, including police and Rab.

The law only allows the NHRC to request reports and information from the home ministry, or recommend that the ministry conduct investigations.

Since 2012, the NHRC had made 122 such requests to the home ministry for reports, of which only 44 were adequately responded to, shows the commission's annual report.

Metro rail users will probably have to pay more as the National Board of Revenue is going to impose 15 percent VAT on the fare from July 1.

NBR wants to slap

15pc VAT on Metro

fare from July 1

The NRB yesterday wrote to the metro rail authorities, saying that they will not extend the exemption of 15 percent VAT, supposed to be imposed on December 28, 2022, when the metro rail launched.

The metro authorities said once VAT is imposed, it is going to affect the commuters. They said they will request the NBR to reconsider its decision.

The country's first metro rail service was opened to public partially in December 2022 and fully from November last year.

Around 2.95 lakh people used the trains daily before Ramadan and the metro rail authorities earned around Tk 1.5 crore daily, according to officials of Dhaka Mass Transit Company Ltd (DMTCL).

The fare from Uttara to Motijheel is Tk 100 and the minimum fare is Tk 20.

The NBR, in a letter to the DMTCL, said various development projects are underway to attain the goal of becoming a developed nation by 2041.

The government must ensure funds to implement the projects, which are mainly coming from direct and indirect taxes.

The revenue administration said tax benefits are given to various sectors on different occasions to promote the development of domestic industries, reduce import dependency, and support small SEE PAGE 6 COL 4

JEWELS OF THE JUNGLE

A male Kalij pheasant spotted roaming the grounds at Chittagong University recently. These hen-sized birds can be found in forests and thickets in the Himalayan foothills, from Nepal and Pakistan to Western Thailand. They prefer mostly forested areas in hilly or mountainous regions, which is why they can be seen often in Sylhet and Chattogram hill tracts. While the males are considered strikingly beautiful due to the navy blue-black plumage and a glaring red around the eyes, the females are more mundane brownish-grey. Like most pheasants, the Kalij pheasant is also omnivorous, with a diverse menu of plants and small insects or reptiles. Considered generally sedentary, these birds are known to perform only seasonal movements for food or mating and roost on trees. However, if frightened, not only can they fly but can scurry away on foot from danger. Though the Kalij pheasant is in the "Least Concern" category of the IUCN, there have been reports of decline in their populations in many areas due to hunting and habitat loss. PHOTO: NOBLE CHAKMA
