The minister said this while addressing a press briefing in Chattogram

When asked about the progress of negotiation with the pirates, the minister said an all-out effort is underway to release the crew members.

"As negotiations have progressed a long way, we are hopeful that the crew members will be released soon," he stated.

He, however, said it is not possible to set a date for their release.



Low-cost facility for expats going unnoticed

Mohammad Belal Hossain, 50, came to Dhaka from Khulna to see off his son Mizanur Rahman, who transport facilities to and from the flew to Saudi Arabia on February

The duo had to stay at a hotel near Hazrat Shahjalal (HŚIA), International Airport spending over Tk 3,000.

Asked why they did not stay at the Bangabandhu Wage Earners' Centre, which has been set up for expatriate workers to stay at a cost of only Tk 200, Belal said they did not know about it.

Like them, many workers who come from different parts of the country to go abroad are unaware that they can avail temporary accommodation at low cost at the Bangabandhu Wage Earners'

The centre was built on 140 kathas of land in Barua Lanjanipara area of Khilkhet. It is around 6.5 kilometres from Dhaka airport. Built at a cost of Tk 30 crore, the centre was launched on March 18, 2022, on Bangabandhu's birth anniversary.

It has arrangements to accommodate 49 people, with 40 beds designated for male expatriate workers and nine for women. It also offers counselling, first aid, hospitalisation, and free internet facilities.

Amid this situation, Caab Chairman Air Vice Marshal M Mafidur Rahman yesterday held meeting with the contractor and others related to the project to evaluate the situation at the Caab headquarters in the capital's

"The contractor company requested us to extend the deadline by another six months," Mafidur Rahman said

The Caab chairman also said they have placed two proposals to the contractor company -- handover the building now and complete the remaining works by September, or have the contract extended by six months without any additional fund.

The contractor company is scheduled to sit with Caab on April 22 to decide on the proposals.

Around 95 percent of the works of HSIA Terminal-3 has been completed. The remaining works include testing, calibration and setting up of some equipment, he

Embezzling Tk 30 crore from banks with fake NIDs DB arrests four including a staff at NID server

The police's detective branch (DB) has arrested four syndicate members, including an outsourcing staff of the NID server, for embezzling Tk 30 crore from various banks using counterfeit National Identity cards.

The arrestees are identified as Joynal Abedin alias Idrish, 42; Pallab Das, 36; Rafiqul Islam Khan, 38, and Alif Hossain, 20.

Pallab, the central figure in the scam, was employed as an outsourcing staff at the NID server in Rangpur. Pallab would access the server to produce NID cards with varying numbers, maintaining the accuracy of names and identities. These falsified cards were subsequently provided to Joynal, who utilised them to obtain loans from multiple banks.

Joynal had planned to take another Tk 50 crore bank loan using fake documents and NIDs, after which he was going to flee abroad with his family.

Harun Or Rashid, additional commissioner of the DB police, made the disclosure yesterday while addressing reporters at the capital's Mintoo Road.

The DB chief said, "Joynal was a shopkeeper of imitation goods, but he lost the business and became involved in fraud. Joynal would take these loans through dishonest officials of different banks with those papers."

"Joynal had 10 effective NIDs. With these, he used to apply for loans in different banks. The name and SEE PAGE 4 COL 6
