A new chapter for Tareen

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Bangladeshi actress Tareen, widely acclaimed for her roles in television dramas over the years, is set to make her debut in Indian Bengali cinema with the film *Eta Amader Golpo*. Tareen's popularity spans generations, and adding to repertoire, she is also a skilled dancer. Last year, she received applause for her role in the film 1971 Shei Shob Din.

In an exclusive interview, Tareen shared insights about her debut in the upcoming film, set to release in Kolkata today.

You've ventured into Indian Bengali cinema for the first time. How did this opportunity come about?

Eta Amader Golpo has been directed by Manasi Sinha, a well-known actress. Manasi didi had visited Bangladesh long ago, and that's when we first met. Later, she contacted me with a proposal to act in her film after our initial conversation. I liked the story she narrated. That's how it all came to be.

The film is set to release today. How are you feeling ahead of its premiere?

I'm having a wonderful time in Kolkata. Yesterday, Mansi didi and I attended a promotional event for the film at Didi No 1 Studio. It's a new experience for me, and I'm enjoying the promotional activities.

What can you tell us about the story of the film? It's a heartfelt love story involving two elderly people. It portrays their journey of love. The film touches upon the loneliness that elderly people sometimes experience when their children move away or become occupied with their lives. It emphasises that love knows no boundaries set by age. If an elderly person finds love instead of solitude during the later years of their life, it makes the moments truly precious for them. The film beautifully portrays the essence of family, loneliness, and love.

How was the reception from the local artistes and crew during your stay in Kolkata?

I've received tremendous love and support from everyone on the set. The hospitality extended to me unforgettable. For was instance, let me share a story: Kharaj Mukherjee, a prominent actor in India, shared bthe screen with me in the film. One day, he said, "You are our guest. You have come from Bangladesh. What do you

like to eat?" I

told him that I

liked vegetables. The next day he cooked vegetables for me and brought it to the set.

Another day, I was shooting with Saswata dada, and suddenly, he asked me, "Tareen, do you have any shooting scheduled for tomorrow?" When I replied no, he said, "Come tomorrow. We all will have lunch together on the set". Despite my initial reluctance, I ended up going and having lunch with everyone. I will always remember these moments. I won't forget the love and warmth I received while working in Kolkata.

What can audiences expect from your role in the film?

Audiences will see me portraying a Bangladeshi girl who gets married in Kolkata, which forms the central theme of the film. The narrative highlights the dynamics of relationships within a family. I had the opportunity to portray the theme through my character. I believe the engaging storyline and the collective team effort will resonate well with the audience.

Could you share your overall experience of shooting in Kolkata? The professionalism and punctuality on set were exceptional. If one had a call for a shoot at 7am, it meant the person would be there at that exact time. Everyone valued time immensely, which I truly appreciated. The collaborative spirit and dedication of the team made it a great experience for me.

Censor board halts release of film allegedly based on Sagar-Runi murder case



The release of the Raihan Rafi's directorial film Omimangshito has been halted by the Bangladesh Film Censor Board as scenes of brutal killings were found in it. The board argued that there is a fusion of reality with the narrative, rendering it unsuitable for public viewing.

Shahidul Alam Sachchu, deputy director of Film Censor Board, conveyed this decision on Wednesday in a letter addressed to the makers of the film.

Following the teaser's release in February, some viewers speculated that the web-film was inspired by the infamous murder case of journalist couple Sagar and Runi. However, neither the film nor the censor board directly mentioned the couple's names.

Paoli Dam to star in Bangladeshi film



Indian actress Paoli Dam is set to star in the government-funded film Neel Jochona, adapted from Mostak Ahmed's parapsychology novel Neel Jochonar Jibon.

Portraying the female protagonist, Dam's casting was confirmed via an official agreement signed by the film's

director Fakhrul Arefeen Khan in Kolkata on last Wednesday. However, the makers are yet to cast the male co star alongside Paoli in the film.

"Earlier in 2019, the film's production was halted due to the Covid and my involvement in JK 1971. However, we have now resumed the work, and hope to begin filming by the end of May,' revealed Fakhrul.

"As long as that solution remains out of reach, all our efforts at regional integration. connectivity. and prosperity will continue to be marked by a missing puzzle. Let us redouble our efforts to put that puzzle back in place," she said.

Hasina said when thousands of Rohingyas from Myanmar fled to Bangladesh in August 2017, Bangladesh offered them temporary shelter.

"With an ever growing population, this has now become one of the largest humanitarian situations in the world," she said.

In the backdrop of the ongoing armed conflicts in Myanmar, the Rohingya repatriation is also getting delayed, which is creating serious security risks within and beyond Bangladesh's territories, the PM said.

She called upon the Asia-Pacific countries and forums, especially ASEAN, to play a proactive role in resolving the volatile situation in Myanmar.

Hasina said that the Asia-Pacific region must stand united against its common enemies of poverty and hunger.

She said Bangladesh has reduced poverty from 41.51 percent to 18.7 percent between 2006 and 2022.

The country also reduced extreme poverty from 25.1 to 5.6 percent during the same period, the PM said. "We remain confident about eradicating extreme poverty by 2030.'

Hasina said Bangladesh's current priority is to address inequalities through income distribution, asset ownership, and social protection.

She said Asia-Pacific region must put up a united front in tackling the climate crisis, biodiversity loss, and transboundary pollution.

"We need to push for ambitious climate financing goals beyond 2025 at COP-29. We need to cooperate on cross-border water management and air quality improvement. We must all prepare for growing extreme weather events," the premier said.

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"This marked the highest food inflation for over a decade, stemming from the country's reliance on the Russian Federation and Ukraine for imports of fuel, essential food commodities like wheat, and fertiliser and livestock feed. The war in Ukraine disrupted supplies of these commodities, which, coupled with steep currency depreciation and decreased foreign reserves, drove up the cost of producing domestic cereals at a time of lower cereal imports," the report said.

Meanwhile, atypical monsoon floods in 2022 impacted over 7 million people and displaced over 2023.

2 million mainly in the northeast region of Bangladesh, the report said, adding that the victims claimed widespread asset loss and damage which weakened their households' ability to cope with shocks in 2023.

The report also highlighted the severe flash floods and landslides in Chattogram (including Cox's Bazar) and Sylhet divisions, which affected 1.3 million people.
