### Workplace safety still a far cry

#### Speakers tell roundtable

Speakers at a roundtable yesterday called upon the authorities concerned to include workers' security-related provisions and trade union rights in labour laws to ensure workplace safety.

Solidarity Center Bangladesh organised the roundtable titled "Creating a Path Forward for Health, Safety, and Trade Union Rights in the RMG Sector and Beyond", marking the 11th anniversary of the Rana Plaza Tragedy, at a Dhaka hotel.

"Still today, thousands of workers in the ready-made garment sector, and also in a wide range of other sectors, do not have access to safe and healthy workplaces," said Monika Hartsel, deputy country programme director of Solidarity Center Bangladesh.

"Trade leaders and workers, who stand up for their rights on the job, are often subjected to violence and harassment. The past years were a painful reminder that the industry is not safe yet," she added.

Addressing as the chief guest, former lawmaker Shirin Akhter said everybody has to work to quickly resolve the cases related to the Rana Plaza tragedy.

"The victims should be identified and rehabilitated, and the reasons behind the incident should be unravelled to ensure that it does not happen again in the future," she added.

In April last year, Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina directed the authorities concerned to include women's household work in the calculation of GDP. #### It feels like the house As the scorching summer sun beats down on Korail slum, the tin-shed houses feel like stifling ovens. Inside one such residence we met Asma

Akhter. She wiped sweat from her forehead, her clothes all damp.

"It feels like the house is always on fire -- just touching the walls burns your hand."

Entering the kitchen feels like stepping into hell, she said. The heat from the cooking stove coupled with hot air makes it insufferable.

"My whole body feels like it's burning," she sighed. The relentless heat had taken its toll she has been suffering from fever and headache for a week now.

Asma's story is similar to the plight of countless slum dwellers during this brutal heatwave.

Cramped conditions inside the tin-shed homes further exacerbates their misery. Asma, her husband, their two children, and a cousin, all have been sharing a single-room for nearly five years. "There's barely any space," she

feels like stepping into hell. My whole body feels like it's burning.

said. "We all have to sleep on one bed, and even the single fan we have fails to cool the entire room. The children sleep closest to it, but none of us get a good night's rest." Fatima Akhter, another Korail resident, echoed her.

"Because of the lack of sleep at night, my husband cannot work properly as a day labourer. After working for 3-4 hours, he gets sick," she said.

visited six slums in the capital Korail, Sattola in Mohakhali, alongside Dhamal Court, Abuler Goli, Benaroshi Polli, and Culvert in Mirpur.

During the visit to the Korail slum, they saw that most people were resting on the streets. Many women who cannot afford to buy water have to walk long distances in search of it.

#### Verdict in Sohel Chy murder case May 9

A Dhaka court yesterday set May 9 for the delivery of the verdict in Sohel Chowdhury murder case.

Judge Arunav Chakravarty of the Speedy Trial Tribunal-2 of Dhaka fixed the date after closing arguments.

During the trial, 10 prosecution witnesses testified before the court.

During yesterday's hearing, Ashish Rai Choudhury, Tariq Sayeed Mamun, Adnan Siddiqui, Faruque Abbasi and Sanzidul Islam Emon were present at the tribunal among the accused.

Four other accused -- Aziz Mohammad Bhai, Afakul Islam, Selim Khan and Harun-Or-Rashid alias Leather Liton -- are now absconding.

On December 18, 1998, actor Sohel was shot dead by some unidentified criminals at Trumps Club in Abedin Tower on road 18 at Banani.
