Low turnout a worry for Modi's campaign

A lower turnout so far in India's long general election has rattled Prime Minister Narendra Modi's campaign managers, raising into question whether his Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) and its allies can achieve the landslide victory predicted by opinion polls just one month ago.

The lack of momentum has been partly blamed on apathy among party workers believing victory is assured and seems to have prompted Modi to change tack in his campaign speeches to try to fire up the Hindu majority, the party's support base, and get them out to voting stations, political analysts said.

The last major opinion poll had predicted that the BJP and its allies could win three-fourths of parliament's 543 seats at stake on the back of Modi's popularity, strong economic growth, handouts and



the inauguration of a Hindu temple on a contested site in Hindu majority country.

At the last election in 2019, the BJP won 303 seats and its allies won around 50 seats. Its slogan before this year's election began was "Āb ki baar, 400 paar" or "This time, above 400".

More than half a dozen BJP leaders and political analysts that Reuters spoke to said a lack of momentum in the two initial phases of the seven-phase election have dampened hopes of a huge majority for the party, although they said it was still likely to retain power in the world's most populous nation.

What could be affected is the BJP's aim to get a two-thirds majority in the chamber, or 362 seats. "The fall in polling turnout is mainly due to apathy among party workers and voters," said Sanjay Sharma, one of the members of the BJP's campaign committee in Haryana.

Rebuilding bombed Gaza homes may take 80 yrs: UN

Rebuilding homes in the Gaza Strip could drag into the next century if the pace follows the trend of previous conflicts, according to a UN report released yesterday.

Nearly seven months of Israeli bombardment have caused billions of dollars in damage, leaving many of the crowded strip's high-rise concrete buildings reduced to heaps, with a UN official referring to a "moonscape" of destruction.

Palestinian data shows that around 80,000 homes have been destroyed in the conflict. Israeli strikes have killed tens of thousands of Palestinians.

The assessment, released by the UN

Development Programme, said Gaza UNDP Administrator Achim Steiner. needs "approximately 80 years to restore all the fully destroyed housing units".

However, in a best-case scenario in which construction materials are delivered five times as fast as in the last crisis in 2021, it could be done by 2040, the report said.

The UNDP assessment makes a series of projections on the offensive's socioeconomic impact based on the duration of the current conflict, projecting decades of ongoing suffering.

"Unprecedented levels of human losses, capital destruction, and the steep rise in poverty in such a short period of time will precipitate a serious development crisis that jeopardises the future of generations to come," said

In a scenario where the offensive lasts nine months, poverty is set to increase from 38.8 percent of Gaza's population at the end of 2023 to 60.7 percent, dragging a large portion of the middle class below the poverty line, the report said.

Meanwhile, the United Nations Mine Action Service (UNMAS) said on Wednesday that Gaza is filled with more debris and rubble than Ukraine, with the mammoth task of clearing it made all the more costly and dangerous by the sheer amount of asbestos and unexploded ordnance.

Six months into the offensive, the UNMAS estimated the amount of debris in the Gaza Strip at 37 million tonnes in mid-April, or 300 kgs per square metre.

Gaza mourns death of over 140 journos in Israeli attacks

At least 141 Palestinian journalists and media professionals have been killed and 70 others injured in Israel's ongoing offensive in the Gaza Strip, the government media office said vesterday. In a statement marking the World Press Freedom Day today, the media office said at least 20 journalists are still held in Israeli prisons, reports Anadolu news agency. "This is part of the genocidal war waged by the Israeli occupation army against civilians, especially children and women in the Gaza Strip," it added. The media office held Israel and the US "fully responsible for the Israeli crimes against journalists and media professionals." It called on the international community to "protect Palestinian journalists and pressure the Israeli occupation to stop its genocidal war against journalists, civilians, children, women, and the Palestinian people." Israel has waged an unrelenting offensive on the enclave since a cross-border attack by Hamas last October. Nearly 34,600 Palestinians have since been killed amid mass destruction and shortages of necessities.

POST-COUP MYANMAR Grid meeting half of power needs amid conflict: junta

Myanmar is producing about half of the electricity it needs each day, the junta has said, blaming scant rainfall for hydropower, lower natural gas yields and attacks by its opponents on infrastructure. Rolling power cuts have battered an economy already reeling from unrest sparked by the military's 2021 coup, most recently causing misery across the country as it bakes in a heatwave. Myanmar's electricity grid is producing only 2,800 megawatts of the required 5,443 megawatts needed each day, said the junta's information team late Wednesday. Domestic power production from natural gas was about 446 megawatts less than the normal daily

COPYRIGHT VIOLATION

US newspapers sue OpenAI, Microsoft over AI chatbots

Eight US newspapers sued OpenAI and Microsoft in a New York federal court Tuesday for violating their copyright to train the technology behind the ChatGPT and Copilot chatbots.

The newspapers, which include The New York Daily News and The Chicago Tribune, are owned by Alden Global Capital, a Florida-based investment firm that created the second-largest US newspaper group behind USA Today owner Gannett when it bought the Tribune publishing chain in 2021.

This lawsuit arises from defendants purloining millions of the publishers' copyrighted articles without permission and without payment to fuel the commercialization of their generative artificial intelligence products, including ChatGPT and (Microsoft's) Copilot," according to the filing.

"As this lawsuit will demonstrate, defendants must both obtain the publishers' consent to use their content and pay fair value for such use," the filing said. OpenAI and its Microsoft backer were also accused of offering up verbatim excerpts of full articles as well as attributing misleading or inaccurate reporting to the publications in certain requests.

Other newspapers involved in the suit were The Orlando Sentinel, The Sun Sentinel of Florida, The San Jose Mercury News, The Denver Post, The Orange County Register and The St Paul Pioneer Press.
