# 'Left behind, left unsafe'

Study says male overseas migration disrupts traditional family structures

The impact of male overseas migration from traditional societies on their leftbehind families is often overlooked, despite Bangladesh being the 6th largest migrant-sending country globally, with 95 percent of migrants being male.

A recent study highlights the potential negative impacts of male migration on family structures and functions, despite its conventional economic benefits.

Nearly 80 percent of children from migrant worker families in rural areas are at risk of joining juvenile gangs, the study

Titled "The Other Side of Development: Men's Overseas Migration and Disruption in Family Dynamics in Migration-Prone Regions of Bangladesh," the study was presented at the 1st Development Studies International Conference in Dhaka, held at a city hotel yesterday.

Prof KS Farid from the Department of Rural Sociology at Bangladesh Agricultural University, Mymensingh presented the paper.

He conducted interviews with 44 stay at-home wives of migrants, 14 community leaders, teachers, NGO workers, and 18 members of local government, as well as local people, journalists, and former expatriates of Chouddagram upazila in Comilla, known as the most migrationprone district in the country.

The large-scale migration of men abroad often leads to the formation of single-parentlike families. This makes it harder to take care of kids. siblings, and parents who stay behind and puts wives at risk of facing more pressure to follow traditional roles.

## People bear over 68pc of healthcare costs

Says analyst

Out-of-pocket payment accounts for about 68.8 percent of total health expenses in Bangladesh, said an analyst

The government spends US \$54 per capita for health, which is less than the WHO recommendation of US \$88, added Prof Syed Abdul Hamid of Institute of Health Economics at University of Dhaka.

The other sources of health financing are -- general tax revenue (23 percent), NGO (two percent), development partners (seven percent), and others, including health insurance (one percent).

Hamid shared this information at the 1st Development Studies International Conference held at a city hotel yesterday. This event is jointly organised by the Development Studies department of Dhaka University and Daily Bonik Barta.

Prof Hamid said the annual government allocation for the health sector in FY 2022-2023 is around Tk 36,864 crore -- around 23 percent of total health

The health allocation is 5.40 percent of the national budget, much lower than the 15 percent allocation recommended by WHO.

#### Why shouldn't eco-friendly laws be formulated? HC issues rule

#### Two die as bus hits pick-up

Two people were killed after a bus rammed a pickup in Dhaka's Matuail area earlier yesterday.

One of the deceased was identified as Babul Chisty, 45, driver of the pick-up.

Police said when Babul attempted a U-turn on Dhaka-Chattogram highway near Institute of Child and Mother Health around 1:45am, a bus of Tuhin Paribahan rammed into the pick-up.

They died at Dhaka Medical College Hospital, said SI Abu Sayem of Jatrabari Police Station.

Some passengers of the bus suffered minor injuries as the vehicle veered off the road and landed in a nearby waterbody after hitting the pick-up, he added.





### Why can't road crashes be curbed?

High-level meeting tomorrow to find answers

The Road Transport and Highways Division has called a meeting tomorrow with the divisional commissioners and deputy inspector general of ranges to find out why the number of road crashes cannot be controlled.

Road Transport and Highways Division Secretary ABM Amin Ullah Nuri will preside over the meeting, where the chairs of BRTA and BRTC, chief engineer of Roads and Highways Department, all additional secretaries and joint secretaries of the division and the additional inspector general of highway police are

Upon receiving their suggestions, the authority will go for tougher action to reduce road crashes and bring discipline to the roads, officials of the road ministry

Road crashes and fatalities increased by 60.28 percent and 40.33 percent respectively in the first three months of this year compared to last year, as per Bangladesh Road Transport Authority data. At least 1,477 people were killed and 1,920 injured in 1,630 road crashes between January and March

this year. The numbers were 1,051; 1,440 and 1,017 respectively in the first three months of 2023. On April 16, a head-on collision between a bus and a pickup in Faridpur claimed 15 lives. The bus had no route permit, fitness certificate, or tax token, while the

pickup carried people illegally. The following day, a truck ploughed through several vehicles in Jhalakathi, killing 14 and injuring 12 others.
