Cybergangs now selling 'genuine' NIDs

They provide people's personal data, location, financial records too; cops bust one such gang

Imagine someone ordering and taking delivery of your personal data -- national identity card information, phone call records, and statements from your mobile financial accounts – as conveniently as ordering food online. Astonishingly, this is what is going on.

Cybergangs in connivance with a section of unscrupulous staffers at the Election Commission and other government offices have been selling people's personal data.

They even offer "services" like providing a genuine copy of an NID card, changing one's information in the NID server and even locating a person by phone triangulation. Anyone can avail themselves of these "services" via

websites, Telegram channels, WhatsApp and Facebook groups for money. Counter Terrorism and Transnational Crime Unit of police arrested two members of one such cybergang on

Pilot dies as **BAF** training jet crashes in Ctg

A pilot died after a YAK130 trainer fighter jet of Bangladesh Air Force (BAF) crashed into the Karnaphuli river in Chattogram's Patenga yesterday morning.

Squadron Leader Asim Jawad, 32, died at the Navy hospital at BNS Patenga after he was taken there in critical condition, said a press release of the Inter-Services Public Relations Directorate (ISPR).

UPAZILA POLLS AL sweeps amid lowest turnout since 2009

The first phase of the upazila parishad polls was an Awami League show, with most other political parties boycotting

According to the results, leaders from the ruling party and its associate bodies have secured the most wins.

They won the chairman post in around 119 upazilas out of the 139 that went to polls on Wednesday.

However, the overall voter turnout was 36 percent -the lowest since 2009, when it was 70.57 percent.

The figure fell to 61.23 percent in 2014. In 2019, the turnout was 43.31 percent in the first phase of the election, in which 78 upazilas participated. It was 41.25 percent in the second phase, 41.41 in the third, 36.54 in the fourth, and 38.62 percent in the last phase.

Combined, the average turnout that year was 40 percent. Speaking to reporters at the EC office yesterday, Election Commissioner Md Alamgir said the turnout was only 36 percent as a major political party did not participate. Meanwhile, many labourers went home after a general holiday was announced for the election.

He also blamed the rain on polling day and paddy harvesting for the low turnout.

According to EC sources, there was over a 60 percent turnout in nine upazilas, while more than 75 percent voters did not vote in 12.

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Will BB steps build up reserves? Not so soon

Bangladesh Bank's steps to boost the country's foreign currency reserves will not yield any positive results overnight.

According to the government and IMF projections, the reserves will not increase until June next vear despite the latest measures taken in line with International

Fund Monetary prescriptions.

Bangladesh's net international reserves (NIR) will be between \$14 billion and \$16 billion till March next year, according to the projections.

June year, the NIR might be close to \$20 billion. This means the country's gross

reserves could be around \$25 billion at that time.

The NIR refers to gross reserves (based on the International Monetary Fund method) minus the central bank's forex liabilities and reserves earmarked for quasi-fiscal activities that involve

state-owned banks and enterprises.

Speaking at a press briefing in the capital on Wednesday, IMF mission Chris Papageorgiou said Bangladesh will need some time to get the expected results from the BB steps.

He said the authorities have now taken "bold actions", a package of reforms.

"So, all of the measures, I think, more will create flexibility, more We return. see Bangladesh slowly coming out of these challenges,"

added. Talking to The Daily Star, Ahsan H Mansur, executive director of the thinktank Policy Research

Institute (PRI), said it might take six to nine months to get the expected results from the BB's new measures given that the policy is implemented properly.

Opposition Leader GM yesterdav Quader parliament criticised the government for its failure to properly control the banking sector.

"NRBC Bank is an example of the country's banks that are going bankrupt. This bank is sinking under the weight of corruption," he said delivering while winding up speech for the second session of the 12th parliament.

He said 13 directors of NRBC Bank wrote to him on April 30, saying that the bank was "drowning in corruption".

Nobody can isolate me from people

PM tells JS

Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina yesterday told parliament that nobody would be able to isolate her from the people as the people trust her.

While delivering winding up speech for the second session of the 12th

House said her government has been working for the welfare of the people. People are now enjoying the benefits of her

government's activities, she said, calling upon her critics to admit it.

"You can't isolate me from the people." She said people have confidence in her.

"This confidence and trust is the only asset of mine. I move with this asset."

On load shedding and power generation, the premier said the power production was once only 1,600 megawatts, but today the capacity is more than 16,000MW.

Rural food inflation hit 15% in Dec: study

Food inflation remained at around 15 percent in rural areas in December last year, which was much higher than the overall inflation rate in the country, according to a study conducted by the Bangladesh Institute of Development

Studies (BIDS). The national food inflation rate in the same month stood at 9.58 percent, data of the Bangladesh

Bureau of Statistics shows. "The key driver contributing to higher inflation was the price of fish. It increased by 20 percent," said Binayak Sen, director general of BIDS.

SOHEL CHOWDHURY MURDER

Aziz Mohammad Bhai, 2 others get life in prison

Verdict comes 26 years after the killing; judge says witnesses tried to hide facts

A Dhaka court yesterday said prosecution witnesses tried to hide facts while giving their statements in film actor Sohel Chowdhury's murder case.

Judge Arunav Chakraborty of the Speedy Trial Tribunal-2 of Dhaka made the observations while sentencing


accused businessman Aziz Mohammad Bhai, Afakul Islam alias Bunty Islam and Adnan Siddiqui -- to life imprisonment in



also fined Tk 2 lakh each, in default of which they will have to serve six months more in jail. The court also issued conviction warrants against them.

On December 18, 1998, Sohel was shot dead by some unidentified criminals at Trumps Club in Abedin Tower on Banani's Road-18.

On the same day, his brother Towhidul Islam Chowdhury filed a murder case with Gulshan Police Station against some unidentified people.
