



## DHAKA'S TOXIC AIR High levels of cancer-causing elements found

The concentration of cancer-causing arsenic, lead and cadmium in Dhaka air is almost double the permissible limit set by the World Health Organization, a new study has found. Informal lead-acid battery and e-waste recycling industries, brick kilns contribute to higher concentrations of the chemical elements, the study said. It also detected high concentration of cobalt, another element that can cause cancer, in the city's air. The research conducted in 27 locations

"Dhaka is the only site where the combined carcinogenic risk exceeds the benchmark for both adults and children," says the study conducted in 27 different locations across the world

## UNGA backs Palestinian bid for membership

Recommends UNSC to 'reconsider the matter favourably'; US, Israel oppose the move

The United Nations General Assembly yesterday backed a Palestinian bid to become a full UN member by recognising it as qualified to join and recommending the UN Security Council "reconsider

the matter favourably."

The vote by the 193-member General Assembly was a global survey of support for the Palestinian bid to become a full UN member - a move that would effectively recognise a Palestinian state - after the United States vetoed it in the

UN Security Council last month.

The assembly adopted a resolution yesterday with 143 votes in favour and nine against - including the US and Israel - while 25 countries abstained. It does not give the Palestinians full UN

## Country to see another spell of heatwave

The Bangladesh Meteorological Department (BMD) predicts a spell of mild to moderate heatwave in the second half of May after the current pre-monsoon rains subside. "We expect the heatwave to begin around May 16," said Bazlur Rashid, a meteorologist at BMD. "However, it will be milder than the severe heatwave we experienced in April." The BMD considers temperatures above 36 degrees Celsius for at least two consecutive days as heatwaves. Temperatures between 38 and 39.9 degrees Celsius are considered as moderate heatwaves while temperatures between 36 and 37.9 degrees Celsius are considered as mild heatwaves.

## 'City tolls' now an easy way of extortion

Having driven his truck all the way from Chattogram, Kashem Mia reached Swamibagh in the capital around 1:00am on March 27, when a group of young men appeared on the road and waved desperately. To Kashem, it appeared that the men needed help. He stopped the truck and ended up paying Tk 70 "toll". The men gave Kashem a receipt bearing the Dhaka South City Corporation (DSCC) logo, and the truck started moving again. However, there are no leases handed out by the DSCC to collect tolls from trucks in this particular area. In fact, trucks that enter the capital after 9:00pm have to leave by

6:00am the following day. The DSCC can only charge parking fees, and that too at two specific locations.

"Extortion in the name of collecting city tolls is a regular practice. If we do not pay the money, they beat us with rods and sticks," Kashem told these correspondents, who were present at the spot.

At least 60 cases were filed over illegal toll collection in 2023, say sources in police.

The correspondents witnessed similar instances of extortion at Kajla intersection, Gulistan, Tikatuli, Demra staff quarters, Kaptan Bazar, and Dolairpar, during a visit in the first week of April.

Hundreds of trucks and pick-up trucks cross these areas daily, and groups such as those seen in Swamibagh collect huge sums from the vehicles. This racket springs into
