53pc rise in allocation for debt servicing

Spiralling amount will put strain on reserves, say experts

The government's allocation to repay foreign debts may reach Tk 57,000 crore in the next budget, a 53 percent rise from the current year, putting further pressure on the country's dwindling foreign currency reserves.

The interest payments for increasing levels of foreign loans in recent years and the tumbling value of the taka against the US dollar have forced the government to set aside more for debt servicing.

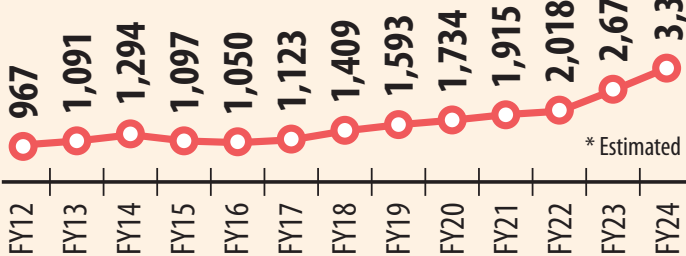
Allocation for foreign debt repayment has been Tk 37,076 crore in the current fiscal year, according to the finance ministry.

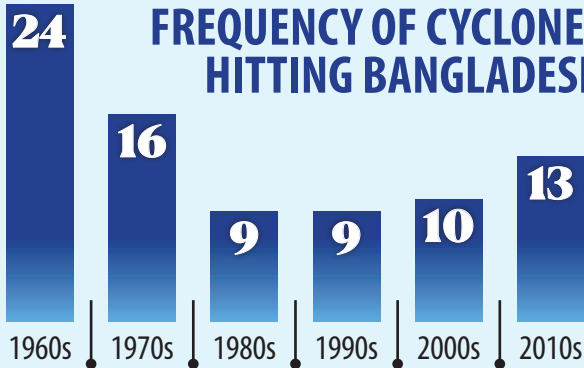
The dollar traded at an average of Tk 109.97 in FY24, according to Bangladesh Bureau of Statistics.

Considering this exchange rate, the government has paid \$3.36 billion in the current fiscal year and will require \$5 billion in the next fiscal year of 2024-2025.

However, an official of the Economic Relations Division (ERD) said the actual amount of the repayment would depend on the exchange rate between the taka and the dollar at the time of repayment.

Bangladesh's foreign debt service requirement has increased over the years, with the amount crossing the \$1 billion-mark for the first time

Fewer but fiercer since the 90s

Says DoE study

Though Bangladesh is experiencing fewer cyclones than in the 1960s, their intensity has increased, a recent study has found.

In the 1960s, the number of cyclones hitting the Bangladesh coast was 24, which came down to 13 in the 2010s, according to a study conducted by the Department of Environment with the help of

the Center for Environmental and Geographic Information Services (CEGIS).

The country did not experience any super cyclones -- a cyclonic storm which at least packs wind speed of 222kmph -- between 1960 and 1989. However, between 1990 and 2020, at least three of them hit the coast.

BENAZIR, FAMILY'S 114 ACRES

All bought while he helmed Rab and police

Show ACC documents

Former IGP Benazir Ahmed and his family members acquired almost all their land during his tenure as the chief of the police and Rab, according to property records listed by the Anti-Corruption Commission.

ACC documents show that Benazir and his family bought 114 acres through 83 deeds. A total of 112 acres of that land were bought when Benazir served as the inspector general of police and the director general of the Rapid Action Battalion.

They purchased 63.97 acres via 50 deeds during Benazir's tenure as the IGP from 2020 to 2022. Another 48.15 acres were bought through 27 deeds between 2016 and 2019 when he served as the Rab DG.

Hitmen were never paid

Say investigators

The assailants who killed Jhenaidah-4 MP Anwarul Azim Anar were not paid the hefty sum they were promised by Aktaruzzaman, who hired them, investigators say.

Aktaruzzaman, known as Shaheen Mia in his hometown Jhenaidah, may have promised them Tk 5 crore or more for killing Azim, said an investigator, adding that the exact amount will be known after he is arrested.
