HANIF FLYOVER Hit by autorickshaw, Indian national dies

An Indian national, who was visiting relatives in Dhaka, died after a CNGrun auto-rickshaw hit him on the Mayor Hanif Flyover in Tikatuli area yesterday afternoon.

deceased The identified as Dwijendra Lal Chowdhury, 60, a resident of Nadia district in West Bengal, said his nephew Pradip Roy Chowdhury.

Pradip said Dwijendra left his ancestral Chandpur residence many years ago and settled in India.

arrived Bangladesh a month ago to visit relatives here and was supposed to return to India today, he said.

The man got down from a bus on the flyover and was crossing the road around 2:30pm when an autorickshaw hit him, leaving him injured, Kawshik Roy, a passerby, said.

He was rushed to Dhaka Medical College Hospital where doctors declared him dead, said Kawshik who took him to the DMCH.

Inspector Bachchu Mia, in-charge of the DMCH Police Outpost, said the body was kept at the hospital morgue for autopsy.

DSCC extends deadline once again

Mayor says work to complete by next month

Despite extending the deadline four times in last five years, Dhaka South City Corporation has fixed yet another new deadline to complete the renovation work of the capital's Osmani Udyan.

DSCC Mayor Sheikh Fazle Noor Taposh, at a programme recently, announced to complete the work by next month, as new contractors

September last year with a new order they have already started working. deadline has been fixed July 2024 in the new

Before that, the renovation work, which was supposed to be completed in 2018, remained halted for around two years due to the contractor, Builders Limited's, work order getting cancelled in 2022, with the allegation of breaching contract.



The deadline was first extended to June 2019, was later extended twice to June 2020 and June 2021 and was again extended until June 2022, according to DSCC sources.

was initially fixed at Tk 58 crore, was later increased to Tk 86 crore, according to DSCC.

After the new work order, the new cost to complete the remaining work has been fixed at around Tk 61 crore.

Saleh Ahmed, then chief engineer of DSCC, said they fined the previous contractor around Tk 3.5 crore for their failure to complete the project.

FLOODS IN NORTHEAST 772,000 children affected: Unicef

Over 20,00,000 people, including over 772,000 children, are already affected by flash floods in the north-eastern region and in urgent need of assistance, said Unicef Representative in Bangladesh Sheldon Yett yesterday.

Yett said Unicef is "deeply concerned" about the $devastating \ flood \ situation \ unfolding \ in \ Bangladesh.$ "The rivers are flowing dangerously high, and the situation is expected to worsen over the next 24 to 48 hours," he said.

"As waters rise, children are the most vulnerable, facing heightened risks of drowning, malnutrition, deadly waterborne diseases, the trauma of displacement, and potential abuse in overpopulated shelters," Yett said in a statement.

He said their priority is to ensure the safety and well-being of children and adolescents. In coordination and partnership with the government of Bangladesh and local stakeholders in the field, they have already distributed safe water to reach more than 100,000 people for over

5 days, and while these efforts continue. We have also distributed more than 3,000 tenliter water containers. We are urgently bringing in additional emergency supplies to the affected

communities in case the situation worsens," he said. Over 810 government schools in the Sylhet division have been flooded and almost 500 are being used as flood shelters. In addition, almost 140 community clinics are also affected by flood waters.

"Child Protection Social Workers are offering support to mitigate potential violence and counseling to help children overcome trauma during this difficult time," Yett said.

419 hajj pilgrims return home

The first return hajj flight of Biman Bangladesh Airlines carrying 419 pilgrims landed in Dhaka's Hazrat Shahjalal International Airport from the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia early yesterday

The flight landed at the airport around 5:40am, said a media release signed by Boshra Islam, general manager of Public Relations of the Biman Bangladesh Airlines.



The return hajj flights will continue till July 22. Biman Bangladesh Airlines took 40,967 hajj pilgrims to the KSA by 107 flights.

For the post-hajj period, the airlines will operate 125 flights to bring the pilgrims back to Bangladesh.

The first hajj flight departed on May 9. The flights to Saudi Arabia continued until June 12. A total of 218 flights were operated for hajj pilgrims. They included 106 flights operated by Biman, 75 by Saudi Arabian Airlines, and 37 by Flynas.

A total of 21 Bangladeshi pilgrims have died so far. Of them 18 were men and three women. Sixteen died in Makkah, four in Madinah and one in Jeddah.

Conspiracy on to make AL look corrupt

Quader tells rally

Awami League General Secretary Obaidul Quader yesterday alleged that a conspiracy is being hatched to portray AL as a corrupt party to the people of the country.

"Stay alert; Fakhruls are spreading rumours. Allegations of corruption are being brought against Awami League. The police force is being attacked in a generalised way, and they have the intention to do the same against the army," said Quader.

He was addressing a brief rally prior to a procession brought out marking AL's 75th founding anniversary, starting from in front of the Institution of Engineers in the capital's Ramna.

He also alleged that some media outlets are also

involved in anti-AL propaganda. The AL second-in-command also stated that they should think about whether the plot to label the party as corrupt is part of a conspiracy to oust it from the government.
